In 2020, she released her first LP poetry album, "The River Speaks of Thirst." Jaki Shelton Green is also the owner of SistaWRITE. She will appear at the library on September 30 at 6:30 p.m.




Wiley Cash is an award-winning and New York Times bestselling author who currently teaches fiction writing and literature at the University of North Carolina-Asheville. Cash's novel, "The Last Ballad," was an American Library Association Book of the Year. "When Ghosts Come Home," his next novel, will be available soon. Wiley Cash will appear on October 12 at 6 p.m.

"Pawsitive" tips from our Stormwater Department on cleaning up pet waste

Pollutants from improperly disposed pet waste may be washed into the storm drainage system by rain or melting snow, eventually decaying, using up oxygen, and sometimes releasing ammonia. Low oxygen levels and ammonia combined with warm temperatures kill fish. Pet wastes also contain nutrients that encourage weed and algae growth. Overly fertile water becomes cloudy and green, which is unattractive for swimming, boating and fishing. Below is some information and tips to keep our waterways clean!

The Iredell County Board of Elections has annouced changes to some polling locations, including ones that will affect Mooresville voters.

Southern Iredell County has grown exponentially in the last decade, resulting in overcrowding and insufficient parking at some polling places. The State Board of Elections has approved changes to some of the Iredell County precinct boundaries and polling sites.

Voter cards have been mailed to ALL voters affected by the changes. One of the changes being made is that Lake Norman Volunteer Fire Department will no longer be used as a polling location.

FACILITY HIGHLIGHT: The Mooresville Public Library



The Mooresville Public Library was intially created around 1890 by a group of town residents who donated their own books in order to form the Mooresville Lending Library. When it began, the donated books were stamped in the front with the cost to rent the book for a day. The library was housed in various locations around town because no permanent home for it was available at that time.

The Town of Mooresville eventually added the library as a department



and the name was changed to the Mooresville Free Library but continued to be without a permanent location.

In 1939, Mrs. Lutell Sherrill Williams learned that the library was occupying her former family home. Mrs. Williams decided to raze it and started construction on a new building. In December 1940, the new library opened to a crowd of 600 people, was deeded to the town, and incorporated with a Library Board consisting of community leaders.

In 1963-64, the original building of the library was expanded with a 900-squarefoot addition was added to the back of the building. In 2006, the library opened its second expansion of an additional 30,000 square feet.
