Learn the Sounds of Fire Safety

October 3-9 is the NFPA's Fire Prevention Week



The National Fire Protection Association and Mooresville Fire-Rescue are raising awareness about "learning the sounds of fire safety" during Fire Prevention Week.

This year's theme is centered around knowing the difference between the sounds that your fire and carbon monoxide detectors make, and the actions you should take when you hear them. Below are a few tips on how you can listen and learn from your home detectors:

- A continuous set of three loud beeps means smoke or fire. Get out, call 9-1-1, and stay out.
- A single chirp every 30 to 60 seconds means the battery is low and must be changed.
- All smoke alarms must be replaced after 10 years.
- Chirping that continues after the battery has been replaced means the alarm is at the end of its life and the unit must be replaced.
- Make sure all of your alarms meet the needs of all your family members, including those with disabilities.



Iredell County is developing a countywide vision for its transportation system and is looking for your input!

The plan will identify needed improvements on key corridors to help manage congestion and improve mobility and safety; align jurisdictional goals and objectives; bridge the gaps between existing and recommended projects, facilities, and modes in local jurisdictions; and develop a prioritized list of transportation projects for implementation.

The process will be guided by a Project Technical Team (PTT) made up of stakeholders representing local jurisdictions and transportation agencies.

CALL FOR ARTISTS: Leave a legacy at the Golf Club



The Town of Mooresville Public Arts Commission is seeking an installation artist to create and install permanent artwork within the On the Nines restaurant entrance lobby, located at the Mooresville Municipal Golf Club (205 Golf Course Drive in Mooresville).

There are only a few days left to apply, as the deadline is October 5. The functional art installation should not only reflect the character of both the restaurant and the Town of Mooresville, but also serve to diffuse the light entering the bar and restaurant area from the lobby's semi-circle window. The installation will be permanent and become part of the Public Arts Commission's curated collection.

The installation should create a sense of place within the restaurant; reflect not only the identity of the restaurant, but also connect the restaurant to the Town of Mooresville; function to diffuse light entering the bar and restaurant area; allow for the free flow of pedestrian movement within the lobby; not jeopardize the safety of those walking underneath; and reflect the high standards of artistic ideation as well as installation practices. Artist's fees, engineering, materials, fabrication, transportation, documentation, and oversight of installation should not exceed \$7,000.

This call is open to emerging and professional artists, both working independently and/or with a team, within the state of North Carolina. It is suggested that applicants will have completed a project with a similar budget, scale, and scope. The artist must complete a statement of interest, include a resume or CV, show five images of past work (including at least two installations) and provide a description of the project idea for On the Nines.
