Public Hearing Policy Updates

The Town welcomes public input at board meetings! There are a variety of ways the public may share comments with the Town.

General Public Comment

A general public comment period is held at Board of Commissioners meetings during the first meeting of every month. Members of the public are able to address Commissioners on any topic. Each speaker is allowed 3 minutes. Prior to the start of the hearing, any person wishing to address the Town Board during the public comment portion of a public hearing shall register on a sign-up sheet stationed by the meeting room door. The sign-up sheet will be collected by 5:45 p.m., and the Mayor will recognize speakers in the order that they registered. For Planning Board, general Public Comment is held at each meeting.

Public Comment during Public Hearings

In order to ensure members of the public who wish to share comment during public hearings are given equitable opportunity to do so, the Town Board recently adopted a new Public Hearing Policy. The full policy can be found at mooresvillenc.gov/agendas.

Prior to the start of the hearing, any person wishing to address the Town Board during the public comment portion of a public hearing shall register on a sign-up sheet stationed by the meeting room door. The sign-up sheet will be collected by 5:45 p.m., and the Mayor will recognize speakers in the order that they registered. Once the list has been collected, no names will be added to it. Beginning September 6, 2022, the Town will transition to an online sign-up process for speakers wishing to address the Town Board during the public comment portion of a public hearing. If a speaker is unable to sign up online, the speaker may contact the Town Clerk's office to sign up to speak during the public hearing. Speakers must be signed up by 4:30 p.m. the day that the public hearing is scheduled. Speakers will be addressed in the order that they registered.

A person may send written comments to the Town Clerk to be delivered to the Town Board. Written comments will not be read during the public hearing but will be provided to the Town Board in advance of the public hearing. Written comments regarding a public hearing must be submitted to the Town Clerk by 5 p.m. on Friday before the scheduled public hearing to publiccomment@ mooresvillenc.gov. For Planning Board meetings, communications should be directed to aburns@mooresvillenc.gov.

Key Points to Note

- The total time for the public comment portion of the public hearing will not exceed 30 minutes, or 10 speakers, whichever occurs first.
- Each individual speaker will be limited to 3 minutes during the public comment portion of the public hearing.
- Each speaker will only be allowed to speak once during the public hearing.
- In order to avoid repetition and delay, groups of people supporting the same position are encouraged to designate a spokesperson for their group.

Residents now have a new method to make Utility Payments—a new payment kiosk in Town Hall (413 N. Main Street) parking lot!

Using the payment kiosk, you can pay by:

- Check
- Cash in whole dollar amounts (no change given)
- Debit or credit card (Visa, Mastercard, Discover, AmEx)

At the kiosk, you can look up your account by name and service location or by Account and Customer Number. Once payment is made, you can receive a payment receipt via text, email, or printed copy. There is no convenience fee with transactions.

Thank you SROs for protecting our students!

It takes a special kind of police officer to be a School Resource Officer (SRO). With the school campus being their response zone, they are responsible for all incidents that happen on campus.

First and foremost, SROs are police officers, enforcing state laws and local ordinances. However, they also wear many hats. SROs are counselors and mentors to students, advisors to parents, and a source of legal reference to staff and the administrators. Because of the highprofile nature of their work, they serve as the first point of contact for any law enforcement issues involving students, staff, parents, and community members. One minute they could be responding to a criminal incident, and immediately afterwards they can be found mentoring students and mediating disputes. SROs are involved in every aspect of the operation of the school, but, most importantly, are responsible for the safety of our students.

There are currently seven Mooresville Police Department (MPD) SROs serving Mooresville High School, Mooresville Middle School, Langtree Charter Academy, Pine Lake Preparatory, N.F. Woods, East Mooresville Intermediate School, and Mooresville Intermediate School. In addition, MPD and Mooresville Graded School District share the goal to have an SRO in every school within the district in the near future.

The next time you see your student's SRO, take a moment to thank them for what they do. This assignment is indeed the most challenging, rewarding, and important of any in law enforcement, and MPD is extremely proud of the officers who answer the call to do this job.
