October is National Fire Safety Month!

Since the threat of house fires significantly increases with colder weather, October is a good time to concentrate on fire prevention and safety. But don't wait on cooler temperatures to be prepared! Mooresville Fire-Rescue reminds residents that **fire won't wait—plan your escape**. Having and practicing a home fire safety plan can save lives.

Home Fire Safety Plans

- As you consider your home fire safety plan, make sure addresses are clearly marked on mailboxes and your home.
- Practice home exit drills will all household members so that everyone knows what to do in case of emergency.
- Remember to have at least two ways out of every room in case one exit is blocked.
- Have an agreed upon meeting place outside, a safe distance from your residence.
- Once you get out, STAY OUT! Do not go inside a burning structure for anything! Even if re-entry appears possible, smoke and dangerous gasses can cause serious harm.

Smoke Alarms

Smoke alarms can provide life-saving time to react in case of a fire.

- Make sure your smoke alarms are working and have a good battery in them. Replace batteries every six months.
- If smoke alarms are older than 10 years, they need to be replaced, so check the manufacture date on the back of the alarm.
- Sleeping with doors closed can reduce the amount of smoke that can enter a bedroom, providing valuable time to escape or be rescued.

Fire Extinguishers

- Residential fire extinguishers should be ABC type and should be mounted away from the stove in an accessible location.
- Fire extinguishers should not be stored in cabinets or in the box they
 came in.
- At least once a year, turn your fire extinguisher upside down and hit the bottom with a rubber mallet to ensure that the powder inside remains loose and has not hardened.

Remember, fire safety is everyone's responsibility. Make sure everyone in your home knows what to do in the event of an unwanted fire. And as always, if you smell smoke or suspect a fire, call 911!


Crafter Dark: Tabletop Scarecrows October 29 | 11 a.m.-12 p.m.

PAINTING INDUSTRY Stormwater Best Management Practices



Storm drainage systems are designed to prevent flooding by collecting stormwater when it rains. This stormwater flows over surfaces, picks up pollutants, and eventually discharges into lakes, streams, and rivers. Unfortunately, there is no treatment process in the storm drain system to filter out pollutants before they reach downstream waters.

Products used in the painting industry including paints, solvents and adhesives contain chemicals that are harmful to humans and aquatic life. Improper disposal and handling of these products could result in contamination of our waterways, affecting our drinking water, recreation and aquatic life. It is important to understand how the painting industry can help keep our waterways clean by following Best Management Practices (BMPs) described in this flyer.

The quality of our waters depends on your actions. We can work together to protect our local water quality and comply with local, regional, and state regulations!

Dispose of paint the safe way!

The Town of Mooresville Sanitation Department will only collect dry paint. Please do not place paint cans in your Town issued trash can. On your collection day, please leave paint cans at the curb with the lid removed so staff can identify that the paint is dry before loading it into the truck. If paint has not yet dried, dirt or kitty litter can be added to the solution to dry it out.

Alternatively, paint can be saved and disposed of at the Household Hazardous Waste Collection Facility at the Twin Oaks Landfill in Statesville on the last Saturday of each month. These materials are taken free of charge at this facility.
