Mooresville Public Library Opens West Branch

In October, the Town of Mooresville opened the much-anticipated West Branch at 614 Brawley School Road conveniently located at the intersection of Brawley School and Williamson Roads. The West Branch Library offers many of the same services patrons have grown accustomed to, and some new services as well, including a hold pick up drive through, larger study rooms, and accessibly placed computers, copiers, and printers for library users to maximize their time.

Despite being 1/3 of the size of the Main Library in downtown Mooresville, this vibrant facility will meet the needs of the growing population. Special features are the retractable meeting room walls, mobile shelving, and open floor plan that allows for multi- purpose use, future growth, and flexibility in staging events. The eye-catching colors and inviting furniture create an environment that inspires collaboration and connections, as well as independent reading or productivity.

The West Branch is open Monday-Thursday from 10 a.m. to 7:30 p.m. and 10 a.m. to 5 p.m. on Fridays and Saturdays. The holds pickup drive through will end 15 minutes prior to closing.

Beginning early 2023, the meeting room space will be available to the community through the existing online reservation system. In January, library staff will begin presenting programming for all ages like those offered at the Main Library. A courier service will run Monday-Friday to ensure that items reserved from the Main Library will be available for pick up at the West Branch. Most library materials can be returned to either library location at the curb side book drops.


Career, College and Life Conversations: Paying for College November 29 | 6-7 p.m.

Adopt-A-Drain!

The Adopt-A-Drain program is an opportunity for residents of the Town of Mooresville to help improve water quality and decrease localized flooding. Make an impact in your community by Adopting a storm drain in four easy steps! Scan the OR code below to get started.

- **1.) Find a Drain**—Use the interactive map to find a storm drain in your neighborhood, near your work or along your favorite walking route.
- **2.) Join the Community**—To join the community, send a photo of the available storm drain(s) and all required documentation to the Adopt-A-Drain Program Coordinator.
- **3.) Clean Drain Regularly**–Utilize the Personal Protective Equipment provided in your Adoption Kit to safely clear debris from your adopted storm drain(s)
- **4.) Report Observations** Utilize the Adoptable Drains map to send your observations to the Town of Mooresville Stormwater staff in real time!

Participants in the Adopt-A-Drain Program make a oneyear commitment to be a steward for a storm drain in their community. Once a part of the program, participants are expected to regularly monitor their drain to ensure it is clear of debris and trash and report observations at least monthly.



What is Stormwater Pollution?

Stormwater is rainfall that runs off of impervious surfaces such as roads, streets, and parking lots. Stormwater picks up and carries a variety pollutants including litter, yard waste, salt, oils, fertilizers, oils, bacteria and sediment into our storm drainage system. Unlike wastewater, stormwater is not treated before it is discharged to local waterways. By disposing of trash and debris before it enters a storm drain, we can significantly reduce the number of pollutants that reach the sources where we fish, swim and obtain our drinking water from.
