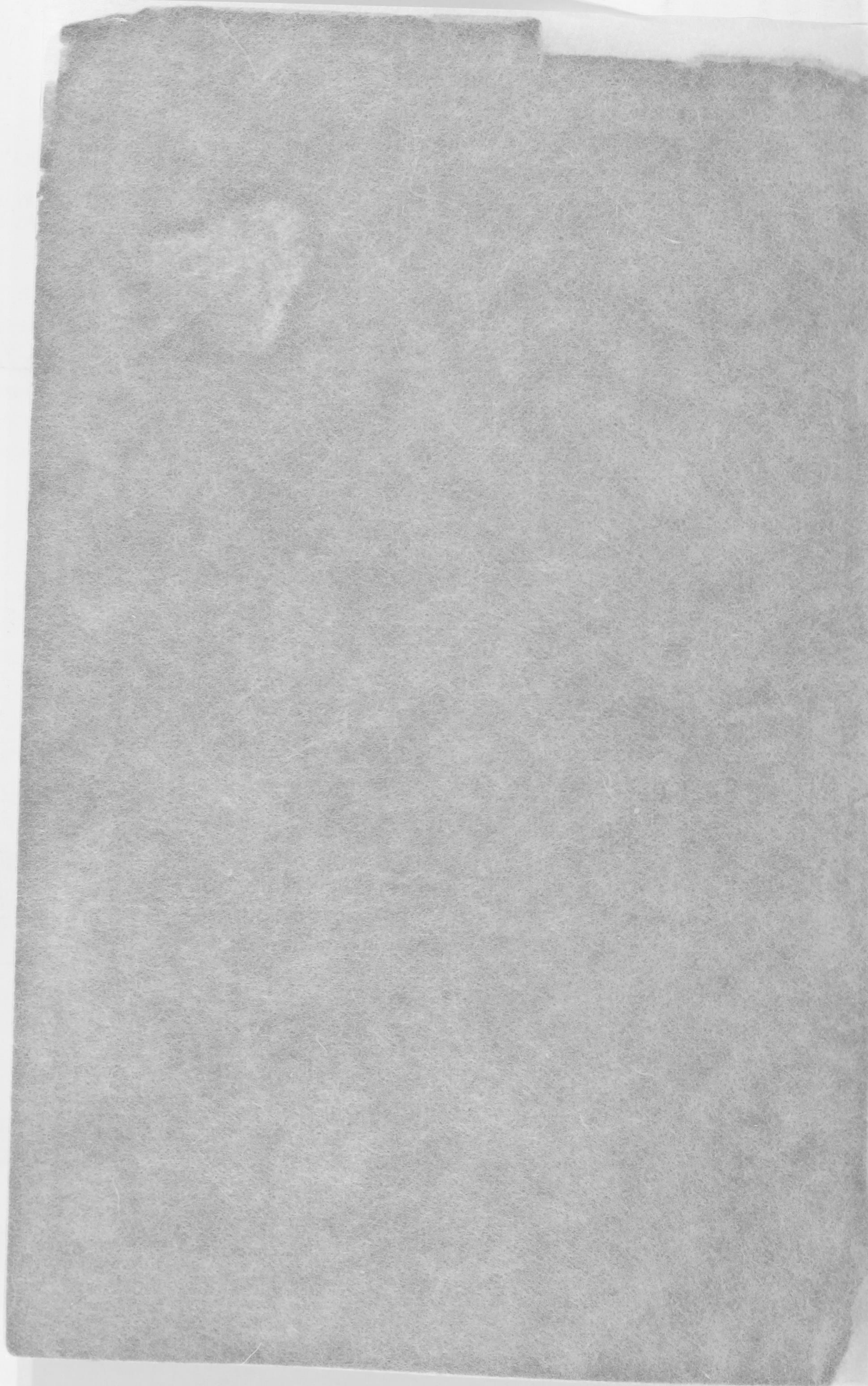

WARRANT FOR ANNUAL TOWN MEETING

---

MARCH 6th, 1933

Commonwealth of Massachusetts,

To either Constable in the Town of Norfolk, in said  
County,

GREETING:

You are hereby required in the name of the Commonwealth of Massachusetts to notify and warn the inhabitants of the Town of Norfolk, qualified to vote in town affairs, to assemble in the Grange Hall on Monday the sixth day of March, A. D. 1933 at 5:45 o'clock in the forenoon, then and there to act on the following articles, viz:

Article 1. To choose by ballot the following Town Officers, viz: one Moderator, for one year; three Selectmen, who shall act as Board of Public Welfare and Board of Health, for one year; one Town Clerk, one Town Treasurer, one Collector of Taxes, one Tree Warden, three Auditors, two Constables, each for one year; one Assessor of Taxes, one Trustee of Public Library, one School Committee, each for three years; one Trustee Josiah Ware fund for three years and one for one year to fill vacancy.

Article 2. To hear and act on the report of the Town Officers.

Article 3. To grant and appropriate money for all necessary Town expenses, as follows, viz:



1. Schools.
2. Town Officers.
3. Public Library.
4. Memorial Day.
5. Electric Lights for the Town.
6. Bonds for Town Officers.
7. Interest.
8. Removal of Snow.
9. Roads.
10. Public Welfare.

14. General Expense.
15. Extermination of Gypsy Moth.
16. To meet roller note.

Article 4. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Town Treasurer, with the approval of the Selectmen, to borrow in anticipation of the revenue of the coming year.

Article 5. To see if the Town will appropriate a sum of money for Chapter 90 Road Work to be used with an allotment from the State and County or from either.

Article 6. To see if the Town will vote to accept Mirror Lake Avenue in the Town of Norfolk as a Town road, and put said road in a safe condition for travel, or to take any other action in relation thereto.

Article 7. To see if the Town will vote to abandon King Street from Maple Street to the residence of Hans C. Fredericksen, and accept as a Town way his private driveway from Grove Street to barway of his open field or to take any action in relation thereto.

Article 8. To see if the Town will vote and appropriate the sum of One Hundred and Thirty Dollars (\$130.00) to cover the cost of complete installation of one Crouse-Hinds Cat. #T. F. W. four-lens Traffic Light to be installed at



junction of Main and Union Streets and Rockwood Road. Operating cost to be paid from Law Enforcement appropriation.

Article 9. To see if the Town will appropriate a sum of money to repair School Street or take any other action in relation thereto.

Article 10. To see if the Town will appropriate a sum of money to insure Firemen while on duty or take any other action in relation thereto.

Article 11. To see if the Town will choose any Committee or to hear or act on the report of any Committee or Town Officer, or to instruct any Committee or Town Officer.

## RECORD OF ANNUAL MEETING

MARCH 6, 1933

Pursuant to the foregoing warrant the Inhabitants met in the Grange Hall on the first Monday of March, it being the sixth day of said month, 1933.

The meeting was called to order by Moderator Sydney G. Carpenter, Jr., at 5:40 o'clock A.M., who took charge of the meeting. The warrant and Constable's return thereon were read by him.

The ballot box was examined and found to be empty. It registered 000.

The following named persons, having been appointed election officers, were sworn as such, namely: Charles W. Adams, Harold C. Hall, Fred Moreau, William Purdon, Catherine Buckley and Madeline Peterson. Douglas Rockwood was police officer.

All preliminaries required by law were complied with and at 5:45 o'clock the polls were declared open.

The ballot box was opened at 8, 8:55, 9:35, and 10:20 o'clock A.M. and at 4 P.M. and each time fifty ballots were removed for the purpose of counting.

The polls were closed at 6:32 P.M. and the remaining ballots removed. The ballot box registered 466. The ballots, upon being counted, and the names checked on the voting lists were found to agree.

The votes having been counted in open town meeting the following named persons were found to have been elected to the various town offices, viz:—

Auditors, for one year, Norman Day, Austin E. Greene, Freeman Hodgdon.

Trustee of Josiah Ware Fund, for three years, M. Gertrude Murphy.

Trustee of Josiah Ware Fund, for one year, Howard F. Mann.

Collector of Taxes, for one year, Charles A. DeMerritt.

Constables, for one year, Alvin Callahan, Douglas Rockwood.

Tree Warden, for one year, Edmund T. Buckley.

Voted to take up Article 4.

Article 4. Voted unanimously that the Town Treasurer with the approval of the Selectmen, be, and hereby is, authorized to borrow from time to time in anticipation of the revenue of the financial year beginning January 1, 1933, and to issue a note or notes therefor, payable within a year, any debt or debts incurred under this vote to be paid from the revenue of said financial year.

Voted to adjourn this meeting until March 20, 1933 at 7:30 P.M.

## ADJOURNED ANNUAL TOWN MEETING

MARCH 20, 1933

At a meeting of the Inhabitants of the Town of Norfolk qualified to vote in town affairs, held in Grange Hall on Monday, the twentieth day of March, A.D. 1933, pursuant to the foregoing adjournment, Sydney G. Carpenter, Jr., the Moderator, called the meeting to order at 7:30 o'clock P. M. and the business proceeded as follows, to wit:—

Article 2. Voted unanimously that the reports of the Town Officers, as presented in the town reports, be accepted.

Carl Frederickson, Norman Day, and William F. Sullivan were appointed tellers by the Moderator and sworn by the Town Clerk.

Article 3. Under this article it was voted to raise and appropriate the following, i.e.

1. Schools, twenty-seven thousand eighty dollars and it was also voted to instruct the school committee to endeavor to cut the salary of the Superintendent of Schools.
2. Town Officers, two thousand, two hundred fifty dollars.
3. Public Library, two hundred dollars and any money received from the dog tax refund.
4. Memorial Day, fifty dollars.
5. Electric Lights for Town, three thousand two hundred dollars, lights to be turned off April 1st.



6. Bonds for Town Officers, one hundred seventeen dollars and fifty cents.
7. Interest, two thousand dollars.
8. Removal of Snow, one thousand dollars.
9. Roads, four thousand five hundred dollars, the salary of the Superintendent of Streets not to exceed thirty-six dollars in any one week.
10. Public Welfare, six thousand, five hundred dollars.
11. Fire Department, two thousand three hundred dollars and two hundred dollars to be used in conjunction with the Board of Public Welfare, also that firemen be paid fifty cents an hour.
12. Law Enforcement, one thousand dollars.
13. Maintenance of Norfolk County Hospital, four hundred sixty-seven dollars and fifty-four cents.
14. General Expense, two thousand dollars.
15. Extermination of Gypsy Moth, seven hundred thirty-five dollars and twenty-seven cents.
16. To meet roller note, one thousand dollars.
17. Soldiers' Relief, eight hundred dollars.
18. Old Age Assistance, one thousand two hundred dollars; this appropriation and those of Public Welfare and Soldiers' Relief to be interlocking; any unexpended balances may be used toward an overdraft in either or both the other accounts.
19. Tree Trimming, two hundred dollars.
20. District Nurse, three hundred dollars.



Article 5. Voted that the Town raise and appropriate the sum of one thousand five hundred dollars to be used with an allotment from either the State or County or both, for Chapter 90 road work.

Article 6. Under this article it was voted to take no action.

Article 7. Voted to accept as a Town way the private driveway of Hans C. Frederickson from Grove Street to a barway of his open field.

Article 8. Under this article it was voted to take no action.

Article 9. Voted that the sum of three hundred fifty dollars be taken from the Roads appropriation and used to repair School Street.

Article 10. Voted that the Town raise and appropriate the sum of one hundred seventy-five dollars to insure firemen while on duty.

Article 11. Voted to instruct the Selectmen to grant a license to Henry A. Decker to sell gasoline.

## STATE AUDITOR'S REPORT

I submit herewith my report of an audit of the books and accounts of the town of Norfolk for the period from May 5, 1931, to September 12, 1933, made in accordance with the provisions of Chapter 44 of the General Laws. This is in the form of a report made to me by Mr. Edward H. Fenton, Chief Accountant of this Division.

Sir:

As directed by you, I have made an audit of the books and accounts of the town of Norfolk for the period from May 5, 1931, the date of the previous audit, to September 12, 1933, and submit the following report thereon:

The financial transactions, as recorded on the books of the several departments receiving or disbursing money for the town were examined and checked in detail.



The selectmen's records of charges against appropriations were analyzed, general ledger accounts were compiled, and a balance sheet, showing the financial condition of the town as of September 12, 1933, was prepared and is appended to this report.

The books and accounts of the town treasurer were examined and checked in detail. The recorded receipts were analyzed and verified by a comparison with the records of the several departments collecting money for the town and with the other sources from which money was paid into the town treasury, while the records of payments were checked with the selectmen's orders authorizing the treasurer to disburse town funds.

The cash balance on September 12, 1933, was verified by an actual count of the cash in the office and by a reconciliation of the bank account with a statement furnished by the bank of deposit.

The payments on account of debt and interest were checked with the amounts falling due and with the cancelled securities on file.

The savings bank books representing the investment of the Josiah Ware Fund in the custody of the town treasurer were examined. No income has been added to the bank books since 1930, and it was therefore necessary to obtain from the savings banks during the progress of the audit the income accrued from 1930 to 1933. It is recommended that the savings bank books be presented to the banks at least once annually, so that income may be entered thereon and that the actual condition of the fund may be printed in the town report.

The appropriations voted by the town appearing in the town clerk's records were listed and checked with the selectmen's appropriation accounts, and the aggregate amounts charged against the several appropriations were compared with the treasurer's records of orders paid.

Attention is called to the provisions of Section 15-A, Chapter 41, General Laws, which reads as follows:



City and town clerks shall, as soon as an order or vote appropriating money becomes effective, certify, in a city to the treasurer, assessors and auditor or similar officer, and in a town to the assessors and the town accountant, if any, otherwise to the treasurer, each appropriation in detail, and the provisions made for meeting the same, if specified in the appropriation order or vote.

The records of tax titles held by the town were checked with the deeds on file.

In examining the paid vouchers and pay-rolls, it was noted that an annual premium is paid for accident insurance to cover firemen. A town may vote to indemnify a fireman for expenses or damages sustained while in the actual performance of duty, in accordance with Section 100, Chapter 41, General Laws, but there is no provision of law authorizing payment for such insurance.

It was also noted that a number of prior years' bills were charged to succeeding years' appropriations. The practice of paying bills of prior years from appropriations provided for current year's expenses should be discontinued, since, in some cases, had the bills been paid in the year they were incurred, overdrafts would have resulted. Specific appropriations should be voted for unpaid bills of a prior year.

The road machinery fund, in addition to the appropriation of \$300 voted in 1932, was credited with receipts of \$1,405.70 in 1932 and \$2,235.95 in 1933; and expenditures of \$1,487.71 in 1932 and \$962.15 in 1933 have been made therefrom. The practice of using receipts without a specific appropriation is contrary to the provisions of Section 53, Chapter 44, General Laws, which reads as follows:

All moneys received by any town officer or department, except as otherwise provided by special acts and except fees provided for by statute, shall be paid by such officer or department upon their receipt into the town treasury. Any sums so paid into the town treasury shall not later be used by such officer or department without a specific appropriation thereof, except that sums allotted to towns for highway purposes by the commonwealth or a county, which shall be used only for the purposes



specified by the officials making the allotment or to meet temporary loans issued in anticipation of such allotment as provided in sections six or six A, shall be available therefor without any appropriation.

A deficit in the overlay account for the year 1930 of \$330.34, as shown on the balance sheet, should be raised by the assessors in accordance with Section 23, Chapter 59, General Laws.

The books and accounts of the tax collector were examined and checked. The taxes outstanding at the time of the previous examination were audited, and all subsequent commitments were verified by a comparison with the warrants issued by the board of assessors for their collection. The recorded collections were checked with the commitment books, the abatements were compared with the assessors' records of abatements granted, the payments to the treasurer were verified, and the outstanding accounts were listed and proved.

The outstanding accounts were verified by mailing notices to persons whose names appeared on the books as owing money to the town, the replies received thereto indicating that the accounts, as listed, are correct.

Attention is called to Section 2, Chapter 60, General Laws, which reads in part as follows:

Every collector of taxes . . . shall, once in each week or oftener, pay over to the treasurer all money received by him during the preceding week or lesser period on account of taxes and interest. . . .

The financial accounts of the town clerk were examined and checked. The receipts from dog licenses issued on behalf of the county and for sporting and trapping licenses, the proceeds of which are paid to the State, were checked with the records of licenses issued. The payments to the town, county, and the Division of Fisheries and Game were verified.

The records of the public welfare and old age assistance departments were examined and found incomplete. As con-



siderable income is received from the State and cities and towns as reimbursements for amounts expended, it is recommended that these accounts be properly kept.

In order that receipts from licenses issued may be properly audited, it is recommended that the board of selectmen keep a complete record of all licenses granted.

The accounts of the sealer of weights and measures were examined. The recorded receipts were checked with the records of weights and measures sealed and adjusted, and the payments to the treasurer were verified.

In addition to the departments mentioned, the available records of all other departments receiving money for the town were checked and the payments to the treasurer were verified.

The surety bonds filed by the several officials for the faithful performance of their duties were examined and found to be in proper form.

There are appended to this report, in addition to the balance sheet, tables showing a reconciliation of the treasurer's and the collector's cash, summaries of the tax and tax title accounts, together with a table showing the condition of the trust fund.

For the co-operation received from the several town officials during the progress of the audit, I wish, on behalf of my assistants and for myself, to express appreciation.

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#### REPORT OF SCHOOL COMMITTEE FOR THE YEAR 1933 —

To the citizens of Norfolk, the School Committee submits its annual report:

The regular meetings of the Committee are held at the Center School, on the Thursday evening before the fourth Monday of each month at 8 P. M.

Grade VIII is separate from other grades again this year, with over thirty pupils in the grade preparing for High School.



We have been very fortunate in being able to retain Mr. Edmund R. Sawyer, as teacher of this grade and as principal of the Center School.

Only one change in our teaching force has been necessary this year. Early in the fall Miss Louise Moser, our faithful teacher in the first and second grades for the past three years, resigned to accept a position in the schools of Salem, her home city.

Miss Doris Mann, a Norfolk resident and a teacher well prepared for these grades, was hired to fill this vacancy, and the school is progressing very favorably under Miss Mann's leadership.

To save expenses, the Committee felt it necessary and advisable not to continue with the Music Supervisor for this year.

One other change was made for the year, by an interchange of teachers, Mrs. MacBride assuming the duties of the Grammar room at City Mills, and Miss Jones taking over the duties at the Fire House School with the 4th Grade under her jurisdiction.

It was impossible to take care of all the extra children who had moved into Norfolk without the use of this Fire House School, and so the Committee felt the need of continuing the use of this room, and will probably have to use it again in the fall of 1934.

The halls at the Center School were painted during the summer vacation, and a new sink was placed in the City Mills schoolhouse. Recently painting has been done at both schools under the C.W.A. projects, and other repairs are in process of planning under these same projects.

Extra pupils have come in for High School for next year, and so necessarily our costs for Tuition and Transportation bills will be a little larger.

The Committee, as in the past, have tried to be economical and careful of the expense, and have endeavored to



manage all problems of these uncertain times without injuring the school system any more than possible.

## REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the School Committee of Norfolk:

The year 1933, with its depression, budget-cutting, extraordinary efforts for restoration and relief, its economies and large expenditures, has been one of relatively quiet, steady, fruitful effort in your schools. Some pupils, it is true, show more or less clearly the effects of the depression in the home, either in lack of what money would buy or in morale, through strained home atmosphere; yet in the main they have given their best efforts. Our equipment has been reduced, as shown in expenditures for texts, supplies, and repairs; yet our buildings are in sound condition and our equipment is not seriously impaired. Salaries were cut a second time; yet the teachers have been unremitting in their faithful service. You have reason to feel pride in what the schools have accomplished under temporary restrictions. At the same time it should be clearly realized that continuance of those restrictions would come inevitably to mean deterioration. The taxpayers should know definitely what the schools need and what that will cost; and when they say what they are able to appropriate, our schools will do the best they can with what is provided.

There have been few changes in teaching personnel this year. It was thought best to continue the work in music in the schools without the aid of the weekly visits of the Music Supervisor, Miss Nettie F. Hamant, who had served long and faithfully in that capacity. The work is being continued with undiminished effort by pupils and teachers. The experiment is being tried, also, of offering opportunity for instruction in instrumental music, without expense to the school or town and with the possible outcome of a band or orchestra. It is arousing enthusiasm and we hope much from it. Twenty-five pupils have already enrolled for it — twenty at the Center and five at City Mills.

In September Miss Louise Moser was called to a more attractive position in Salem; in her place Miss Doris I. Mann was secured and she has taken hold of the work well.



The reductions already mentioned have effected some change in the taxes assessed for schools and have also made our handicap as compared with other towns somewhat greater, although they have not seriously altered the favorable ratios shown in my report one year ago. The local tax levied for the support of schools in 1932 was reduced to \$11.89 per \$1000. — a drop of \$1.42 or a total saving of \$7.10 to a taxpayer whose property was assessed at \$5000. This is a relatively large reduction, as the whole State averaged 37 cents and our group of small towns without high schools only 15 cents. 1933 should show further reduction in the school tax rate. Our appropriation in March 1933 was reduced by nearly 9%; the consequent reductions in expenditures are only partially shown in the following figures for the school year 1932-33.

To meet the cut our gross high school costs per pupil have been lowered from \$175.19 to \$163.62 — a drop of \$11.57 per pupil as compared with an average drop of \$3.68 in towns of our group. This represents a decrease in both tuition and transportation rate. The net cost per pupil of our High School education, after State reimbursement, is \$65.22 in place of \$67.96, so that our net cost is now lowered from 66% to 62% of the net cost in similar towns and to about 2/3 of the average cost to towns and cities of the entire State.

Elementary school reductions were accomplished in various ways; for example, salaries of teachers were cut to \$41.45 per pupil as against \$51.38 in the first eight grades throughout the State (we pay 81% of the average rate); purchase of new text books was limited to less than 40 cents per pupil, where the State averaged 98 cents. \$1.81 was spent for papers, pencils, and supplies for each pupil, where the State averaged \$2.10; and repairs cost \$2.01 per pupil instead of \$3.14.

Our Trade School costs we cannot foresee or control. They have been high while four attended but are low now that all but one are at work. Some, not all, have made excellent use of their opportunities; all have profited in some measure.



Increased State reimbursement in 1932 further reduced our local burden. \$36.76 per pupil was received in place of \$29.13, so that the State actually returned 34 cents of every dollar we appropriated, instead of 26 cents as in 1931. The actual cost of schools to Norfolk is again far less than the amount the town actually appropriates in Town Meeting.

It is clearly evident that school costs are a relatively heavy burden to Norfolk, due to its relatively small valuation; also that it receives relatively large assistance from the State, this being devised for the very purpose of equalizing in a measure the educational privileges of small and of large towns. It is clear also that Norfolk has cut deep, especially when it is remembered that these figures show only expenditures through last June. Can Norfolk afford to continue these drastic cuts temporarily made? It seems inevitable that continuance will be bound soon to cripple our work for our children. In my report a year ago I showed that the town during the period of prosperity had never developed its educational system as much as larger places had done. I should now add that more and more often it will continue to happen that increased cuts will mean added costs instead of savings to our taxpayers; we shall forfeit more dollars in State reimbursements than we save in appropriations.

I should not do my whole duty to Norfolk if I did not again call attention to the matter of school accommodations. Last year I advised against taking steps toward a new school building until prospects of increased school population become more definite. While those prospects may not yet be assured, there have nevertheless been developments which should be considered. There have been fluctuations in school membership, including both additions and losses. At the present time our seven rooms in three separate buildings are all comfortably filled. Each can take a few more pupils but none can take many and an overflow in two or three rooms would necessitate considerable revision of seating and transportation plans.

The federal Public Works Administration program was designed to help just such situations as this. If it is not now too late the town could, by providing such site as is now owned or has recently been considered and by submit-



ting plans such as are now practically ready, secure Federal aid in construction after due approval by State and Federal authorities. The Federal government would give outright 30% of the construction cost; the balance would be loaned by the Federal government at 4% interest or could be provided by the town under its borrowing capacity and funded to spread over a period of twenty years. Such help is never likely again. It is timely, since building costs have already risen 10% or 15% over those at the time when the Millis building was constructed and are now rising. If it is objected that higher than present labor rates are required on such construction it need only be said that no building such as Norfolk would build could be completed by local labor alone. It would necessarily be built on contract; and since much would have to be under wages prescribed by code, no part could be done except under code rates.

It may well be that when prosperity returns all State and local units will feel the burden of heavy Federal taxation to repay the present heavy borrowings; but even so it will make no difference in our share of that taxation whether Norfolk has or has not profited by these present expenditures. Furthermore, if such Federal taxation is burdensome it will then further prevent the town from building which then may seem imperative but then must be wholly at our own expense. Add to that fact the prospect that present consolidation from three buildings into one should increase the efficiency of our schools even at present cost of maintenance. All sections of the town would through consolidation have equal opportunities, a more closely graded system be possible, and many advantages be offered which are now impossible.

Altogether this subject is worthy of careful consideration and definite decision at this time. Norfolk should consider right now both permanent equipment and present running costs. What do we want for our pupils? The daily and monthly and yearly work cannot be deferred; what is not done now cannot be done next year, for the children keep right on growing up. Let Norfolk determine what is the best it can do of all it wants to do and the schools and teachers will do their best with what can be



provided. To the teachers and to your Committee, to all citizens and taxpayers I offer my sincere thanks for all cordial support given.

In spite of the depression and several changes in the teaching force, the drawing here is progressing steadily. Both schools made a fine showing in the annual S. P. C. A. poster contest. This was our only effort at outside competition last year, in the interests of economy, as poster material is expensive. Although Norfolk has been liberal with supplies, we have tried to cut out the more costly types of work and there has been a serious attempt to use smaller and less heavy paper wherever possible. Altogether the work here is going very well. It is much to the town's credit that their children have suffered so little in this way during these difficult times.

Exhibitions were held at both Center buildings as usual, in June. City Mills had the same kind of exhibit too. Both affairs were well attended in the afternoon and evening.

We have gained greatly in the sewing this past year, although the classes were so large that it seemed best for the others, to omit the fifth grade. Since Miss Tarbox has been helping us in this work, the children get more individual attention. We have widened the range of study in our sewing notebooks by taking advantage of a large amount of free advertising matter sent us by the "Home-



makers' Educational Service." The girls are very enthusiastic about this part of their sewing work. Their notebooks are quite original. A contest was held for the best three dresses, and another for the best three doll's dresses. The McCall Pattern Co. furnished free patterns and three prize ribbon badges for each. They enjoyed this so well that we will probably make it an annual project.

The City Mills girls made cretonne curtains for the windows in the entrance hall and the teachers bought some shades, while the boys made window boxes for the front of the building and helped fix up the yard. This school is looking much better this fall, and the children have enjoyed their part in the change. The little school at the Center has also been improved.

Manual training had a bad start at the Center this year. The building had been moved and we had to wait three weeks for it to be made ready; and then there were so many boys that we had to make four classes instead of three, with less time for each group. They are trying hard to make up for the loss of time, however, and it certainly is fine to have the building so comfortable. The City Mills group is very promising this year and they are farther ahead than usual at this time, in spite of the time spent in improving the school. Of course, we are stressing the importance of making materials go as far as possible. Many of the boys have contributed sandpaper, wood and stain from home to help out.

Norfolk has done well for her schools during these difficult times. The fairness and consideration of the School Committee has given the teachers an incentive to keep their standards high in spite of personal discouragement.

I thank all who made it possible for the children to continue this valuable part of their school training and hope for wisdom to make it even more worth while in the future.

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## REPORT OF SCHOOL NURSE

To the Superintendent of Schools:

The year 1933 was, as usual, a busy one. Besides our usual health program we held two successful health clinics — one in June for three days and one in December for two



days. At these clinics 117 children received treatments, including cleaning of teeth, extractions, and filling of permanent teeth. We feel that this work is most important and, with the co-operation of the parents, hope to continue it in the Spring.

We plan to have milk in the schools after Christmas and are also thinking of having hot soups for the bus pupils during cold weather.

The year has been very free from illness among the children, barring two cases of scarlet fever which developed in April during vacation; the School Committee and Board of Health then deemed it wise to close the school until the end of the incubation period, thus preventing the spread of the disease in the schools.

Our Pre-school clinic, in charge of our School Physician, was held in June. It is hoped, should we have another this year, that all children who are to enter the first grade in September will attend.
