

Regular meeting of the Board of Selectmen convened at 7 p.m. on Tuesday, June 28, 2016 in Room 34, the Harry B. Butters Chambers, Norwood Memorial Municipal Building, with the Pledge of Allegiance, and a silent moment of prayer and reflection. Meeting is Recorded.

Appointments

7:00 P.M. – Concerts on the Common Committee

Concerts on the Common Chairman Paul Eysie thanked the other members of the committee and pointed out that this is the twenty-third year of the program. Mr. Eysie acknowledged the sponsors, who are all listed on the back of the concerts program. Mr. Eysie introduced Barbara Kinter, who is the chair of Fundraising, and Linda Thomas, Raffle Chair who could not attend. The first concert will be held July 3, 2016, the last will be August 28<sup>th</sup> and Pops night will be July 24<sup>th</sup>. Mr. Eysie expressed special thanks to Bernie Cooper for all he does and all he has done in the past.

Selectman Bishop thanked Mr. Eysie and the committee for all they do. It is so nice for people to go out on a warm night and listen to music.

Selectman Plasko said they are one of the many groups who work so hard to give us that community feeling and he looks forward to Pops night.

Selectman Donohue thanked all the volunteers from over the years and said they could always use more, so if you want to help just go to the Town Common at 6 p.m. on the evening of the concert.

Selectman Maloney said he looks forward to this season and Pops Night in particular.

Chairman Howard stated there is nothing like a summer evening mellowing out to big band songs down on the common. He thanked the committee for their hard work.

7:15 P.M. – Chief Anthony J. Greeley, NFD:

The Chief submitted his report of monthly activities and explained he has not been here since early May and a lot has happened. The department incident numbers are steady across the board. The workload changed a few weeks ago with the large fire on June 13<sup>th</sup>. The Chief reported healthy staff on all four groups. He said the promotions and staffing shifts have gone very well and the department made a strong and healthy transition.

Chief Greeley spoke in detail about the fire that occurred on June 13, 2016 at 11:31 p.m. and showed pictures of the fire which was fully involved when the firefighters arrived at the scene. According to Deputy Chief Maggio, this was the largest volume of fire he has seen in his thirty-six years in the department. There is a building off to the right of the site of the fire that could have been lost had the firefighters not made the right decisions within the first 120 seconds. The building of origin had been abandoned for over ten years. There were no utilities running to the building. Just this month the Fire Department went through ladder training and practice evolutions so they can jump into action immediately. There were no civilian or firefighter injuries, and the building of origin was lost with minimal environmental impact.

Chairman Howard said the firefighters did not lose this building, it was gone when they got there and the firefighters were just trying to save the buildings beside it. Chief Greeley said it is not typical to roll up to a fire of that magnitude, it could have been burning for some time and everything that could possibly burn was burning all at once. There is an investigation ongoing but it is leaning toward human involvement.

Chief Anthony J. Greeley, NFD-(cont'd):

There have squatters there and on April 10<sup>th</sup> there was a small unattended campfire there that was quickly put out. Chief Brooks has increased patrols in that area.

Selectman Bishop told Chief Greeley that the handling of this fire is a testimony of his leadership and that of the command staff and right down the line. Training is everything and thank you.

Selectman Maloney said he drove down Endicott Street at around midnight that night. That fire was completely involved and the ladder hoses were high, but they got it knocked down quickly. Chief Greeley said Deputy Chief Maggio is a man of few words, but when he speaks, we listen and he said that was the most volume of fire he had ever seen. The Chief thanked the mutual aid communities who were there to assist. He said Captain Mike Costello and Captain Hayes have pre-plans for these buildings and the next building was only about seventeen feet away.

Selectman Plasko agreed with Selectman Bishop's comments that training is important. Previous chiefs have been gone on training and Deputy Chief Maggio puts and emphasis on it.

Selectman Bishop addressed the environmental damage, stating the appropriate government agencies are working to rectify it. Chief Greeley has spoken with Assistant Town Manager Bernie Cooper about EPA and DEP reports and he and Ms. Reiss feel comfortable that the rain will wash away what is left. The red in the water was from dye that had soaked into the wood over the years. The temperature in the water and the PG in the dye did involve immediate fish kill.

The Manager talked about the draft of the ambulance receivables policy and on motion of Selectman Plasko, seconded by Selectman Bishop, voted to approve write off policy as presented.

Chief Greeley is requesting to move \$700 into personnel services for retirement buyouts. On motion of Selectman Plasko, seconded by Selectman Bishop, voted to approve internal transfer of the monies.

Chief Greeley spoke about the appointment of a new firefighter, Justin Hitchcock, who is currently a police officer. FF. Turner retires on July 31<sup>st</sup> and Officer Hitchcock will start August 1<sup>st</sup>. Selectman Plasko stated concern about the concept of moving from police to fire after spending the money to train him as a police officer because now the police chief has to spend more money for a new hire. He is not sure what was taken into consideration when making that hire. Selectman Bishop pointed out that Officer Hitchcock was a member of the Navy, assigned as a Marine Corps medic and the town will benefit from his medical expertise. On motion of Selectman Donohue, seconded by Selectman Plasko, voted to make a special commendation to acknowledge Firefighter Turner's retirement.

7:30 P.M. – Supt. Mark Ryan, DPW/Town Engineer:

Mr. Ryan was present to submit the monthly report of department's activities. He spoke about the many things Public Works does behind the scenes. Every Saturday they work with different groups on car washes, the help blocking roads for block parties, the assist Concerts on the Common, Summerfest and the Farmers Market.

As for construction projects there is the annual resurfacing, and next week will start this year's project. Mr. Ryan reported that the sewer main lining project is ninety-five percent complete and sewer service lining is thirty-five percent complete. Each year they try to clean and line their own water main pipes. This year they will work on Nichols Street from Vernon Street to Winter Street and then Winter Street from Nichols Street to Prospect Street. As part of the annual resurfacing project they will be they will also be paving Dean Street from Pleasant Street to the bridge. They replaced water surfaces in May and June on Dean Street and that project is complete. Engineering has prepared plans and specifications to eliminate drainage problems at 53 Dean Street in front of the railroad bridge. In addition as part of annual

resurfacing they did wheelchair ramp work between Guild and Hoyle Streets where the wheelchair ramps did not meet the current code and have now been brought to code. Next week they will be repaving Washington Street from Guild Square to Hoyle Street. Mr. Ryan said the summer help employees have been great both for Public Works and Cemetery.

Selectman Donohue said yesterday afternoon she drove by the hospital where National Grid had been doing some work. They were some cones on the ground, but there was a square probably three feet squared, dug out, and maybe five inches deep and there was no one around. She asked if that is dangerous. Mr. Ryan said the Gas company comes out to do work, in this case looking for a leak which they found and repaired. They will wait for their paving crew to come and pave it. Selectman Donohue asked if there should be a police officer there and Mr. Ryan said they typically do and he will talk to Gas company about making sure the details stay around until the area is patched.

Selectman Bishop clarified with Mr. Ryan that 53 Dean Street is the address he had spoken to him about a year ago and also that the paving would be on Dean Street from Pleasant Street to the railroad bridge.

Selectman Plasko said he has referred to the DPW in the past as the lifeblood of the community and it is all those small things and the bigger things that people don't see and appreciate and that is where the tax dollars are; keeping things running smoothly and they don't even appreciate it. He thanked Mr. Ryan for pointing out some of the small things as well as the large things that get done. Selectman Plasko said this roadwork is infuriating.

The roadwork is infuriating and is going on everywhere in town, but that is how progress is made. One Street that is worse than anything else he has been on is Prospect Avenue. Mr. Ryan said the gas company is required to put permanent trench down which will be six feet wide and they will grind everything out and repave it, but Prospect Avenue itself is in tough shape. Selectman Plasko said if that street is not on the list to be done this year it should be on the top of the list for next year.

Chairman Howard referred to the patches by the gas company and he concurs at least as of last week up on Neponset Street they had put the second paving in on the long trench and it was very driveable. Selectman Bishop commented that he bottomed out on Prospect Avenue and a piece fell off his car.

7:45 P.M. – 4<sup>th</sup> of July Committee:

Maria Henry spoke on behalf of the committee, stating that this year the theme is liberty and introduced Martha Colamaria to speak about that. Ms. Colamaria spoke about the theme 'Liberty, a dream that became a country', the inspiration for which was the liberty bell and she gave a brief history of the Liberty Bell. Ms. Henry said the T-shirts will be gorgeous; the liberty bell with fire crackers coming off it. She announced the Grand Marshall of the parade will be the Challenger League, and Rick Reardon and his son will be in the first car. She gave the schedule of events for the day. Lee Leach will be reading a children's book at the carillon after the children's parade. Jim Henry will run the road race, which starts at 5 p.m. Deb and Ken Reddick will be working with John and Ethel Simeone and the military unit. Jack McCarthy and Jim Morris will be announcing the parade. Lou Harris will be helping out at the Middle School with the line-up. Asst. Town Manager Bernie Cooper said the Boston Crusaders will be coming, as well as the Cadets from Pennsylvania, the Colonial Boys, Colonial Pipers, St. Alfio's. Mr. Cooper spoke about the fundraising activities. Central Motors has been the largest single sponsor for the last three or four years and have been very generous. Some other sponsors are Lustra Cleaners and the Kinonian family, who are strong supporters of many activities in the town, Norwood Bank has been very generous, Women's Community Committee, Norwood Women's Club, Rotary Club, Masonic Lodge, Steel Art, Babel's, Poirier. Fundraising letter and parade schedule were inserted in a light bill also. The bands are mostly youth groups and are all non-profits. The parade banner is being constructed by ADJ as it was over twenty years old. Chairman Howard encouraged donations from the public. Mr. Cooper said the committee is getting old and they welcome new volunteers.

4<sup>th</sup> of July Committee-(cont'd):

Selectman Donohue thanked Lou Harris and Martha Colamaria and said she thinks the Challenger League being Grand Marshall is a great idea. Selectman Maloney said he loves the idea of the liberty bell theme. He asked Mr. Cooper where he had gotten his tie. Mr. Cooper said he got it from Tommy Riolo. Selectman Bishop thanked the committee and the Norwood Radio Club for their participation. Selectman Plasko said thank you for all the hard work all year long. The same people give every year. Mr. Cooper was brought up Concerts Committee with accolades and thanks for his assistance to them and here he is half an hour later doing the same thing. It would be nice for people to join the efforts. Chairman Howard said Christmas events at gazebo each year and Fourth of July parade are so exciting to be part of.

Steve & Toni Eosco, 14 Endicott Street:

A motion was made by Selectman Donohue and seconded by Selectman Maloney, to have Mr. & Mrs. Eosco in per her request to discuss the recent fire and forming a district five committee to look at the properties in that area. Selectman Plasko did not see a reason for this but does believe they should create a committee to work with property owners to look into concerns that public and town officials might have regarding contamination and public health and safety. The group should include residents in some fashion but the committee named here is too disorganized. It should be a Selectmen's Committee of five with representative from Selectmen, Manager, Board of Health, Planner and possibly one resident to focus on meeting with property owners and report back to the Selectmen to keep it focused. Other residents can be brought in for input but don't need to be members of the committee. Selectman Donohue said the reason to invite them in is they are sincerely interested in the neighborhood and quality of life and it is important to let them share thoughts. Selectman Maloney said he would be happy to have them in if the rest of the Board wasn't opposed but he is not in favor of the committee proposed by the Eoscos. Selectman Plasko said the committee needs to be focused and the property owners have no obligation to meet with the residents and the town officials will know what is needed going forward. Chairman Howard said the letter was explicit and explained what they are looking for, which is a committee to look into Norwood Commerce Center. Selectman Plasko said the concern going forward is commerce center activities in the future but part of this letter references a fire in the commerce center; the fire was actually in an abandoned building that had nothing to do with the commerce center. The vote on the motion was 3-2 opposed to having the Eoscos in. Selectman Plasko made a motion for a five-member committee including the Chairman of this Board or his designee, Manager, Board of Health Director, Planner, and one resident with invitation to Eoscos first. Selectman Donohue amended the motion to form a seven member committee and seconded and the board voted unanimously in favor. Chairman Howard appointed Selectman Maloney to represent the Board. The Chairman will appoint three residents to the committee.

Selectman Plasko said if the Board is going to approve this it is appropriate to take some time to table it where there is a lot of these and they have to go to the Finance Commission also and we don't want them to have to come out again just for one item if we can get these all collected together. He said he has been biting his tongue but Municipal Relief Transfers are supposed to be for small unforeseen things that come up at the end and some of these things are unforeseen, but every year we make this speech. We should be watching the budgets closer to eliminate or keep the municipal relief number down and it seems every year gets worse instead of better. Mr. Carroll said the number of requests are less this year than last year. Selectman Maloney asked about the dollar terms. Mr. Carroll said he did not know. Selectman Plasko said management needs a closer review of budgets toward the end of the fiscal year. Selectman Maloney pointed out there is \$15,000 for litigation, \$ 4800 for retainer and \$7500 for collective bargaining but later in the memo it seems the numbers are different. Selectman Plasko withdrew his motion to approve and on motion of Selectman Plasko, seconded by Selectman Bishop, voted to table.

Adjournment

No other business being presented for consideration, on motion of Selectman Bihstop, seconded by Selectman Plasko, voted to adjourn and the meeting was adjourned accordingly at 9:06 p.m.
