City in Transition During Stable Times

There are so many great things happening here in our City. From new infrastructure projects in various stages of planning to the momentum building around even more economic development projects, we are a City in transition; a transition towards an even more stable future.

The two largest indicators of more sustainable times ahead include our general fund balance, or "rainy day" fund, as well as our pipeline for new economic development projects.

With regards to our general fund balance or "rainy day" fund, we are as strong as we have been in almost 20 years. As of our recent audit, our "rainy day" funds exceed \$3.4 million. That means we are well protected against an unexpected circumstance that may come our way. In addition, we pre-fund our future retiree healthcare liability to the tune of approximately \$2 million. That is a feat that has not been accomplished in a very long time. Both of these measures ensure that services will remain steady and the City will remain viable.

We also managed to put together a steady economic development project pipeline. With your approval of Class C liquor licenses we believe we can locate approximately 15 new restaurants in our City over the next 5 years. We are also pursuing large retailers and small manufacturers to locate at various sites. These new businesses will grow our tax base and raise property values.

This is a truly monumental time. As always, we welcome your feedback and will do whatever we can to serve your needs at City Hall.

EMERGENCY SNOW REMOVAL: Policies, Procedures and Priorities for Snow Removal



Snow Removal Provisions

Contained in Chapter 66 Section 166-167 of the Code of Ordinance

- Snow and ice must be removed from all sidewalks.
- When it stops snowing during daylight hours, snow and ice must be removed within 12 hours.
- When it stops snowing during night time, snow and ice must be removed by 6:00 p.m. the next day.
- It is considered a public nuisance to allow ice and snow to accumulate on sidewalks.
- Failure to remove snow and/or ice from all sidewalks within the time frames above may result in citations being issued or City removal at the homeowner's expense.

WARMING SHELTERS: A Safe Haven From Chilly Temperatures

When the need arises, the City of Oak Park provides residents with temporary shelter to prevent injury related to exposure to the elements.

The Warming Center is operational when the weather forecast calls for low temperatures, or a combination of precipitation, wind chill, wind and temperatures that "feel like" temperatures of 10°F, or below. The Warming Center is located in the Community Center at 14300 Oak Park Blvd., Oak Park, Michigan. It is open 8 a.m. to 10 p.m, Monday to Thursday. Hours outside of normal Recreation Department operation will be announced and posted.

Warming shelters provide a haven from the elements, but they differ from shelters which typically provide overnight stays, food, counseling and resource assistance. Individuals utilizing the Oak Park Warming Center are required to comply with Community Center rules and policies.



During this time of year, a snow emergency may be declared to help facilitate snow removal Here are some answers to the most frequently asked questions

When is a snow emergency called?

A snow emergency is called when four or more inches of snow falls or other hazardous conditions necessitate. A snow emergency is declared for the purpose of safe and efficient snow removal and to allow access for police and emergency vehicles to respond to emergent situations.

What should residents do during a snow emergency?

For safe and efficient snow removal, parking is not permitted on City streets during snow emergencies. The City offers eight locations where vehicles can be parked during a snow emergency, see adjacent map for details. Voluntary compliance is appreciated, however the City reserves the right to ticket or tow vehicles that do not comply with City policy.

How do I know when a snow emergency has been declared?

The City of Oak Park will announce a snow emergency on their website's home page, social media (Facebook and Twitter), Comcast OPTV16, and through a Community eBlast (email). To enroll in Community eBlasts, visit http://bitly.com/OakParkBlastSignUp or email OakPark@ci.oak-park.mi.us. In addition, when a snow emergency is called, or called off, local television stations (ABC, NBC, Fox2Detroit, and CBS) and radio stations (WWJ and WJR) typically air a list of communities that are under snow emergency alert.

How are snow emergencies handled?

During snow emergencies the DPW assesses and prioritizes the snow removal process. In general, the City crews treat and plow roadways in the following order:

- **Primary Roadways** - Primary routes are the first priority for plowing and de-icing. Primary routes include major streets, snow emergency routes, school areas, and medical facilities. These roadways include the I-696 service drives, Greenfield, Coolidge, 11 Mile Road, and Nine Mile Road.

- **Secondary Roadways** - Secondary routes are main and heavily traveled thoroughfares. These include streets like Oak Park Boulevard, Scotia, Rosewood, Church, Capital, Lincoln, and Northfield.

- **Residential Intersections** - Tertiary priority is made to residential intersections so that vehicles can properly stop and proceed safely at intersections. Residential roadways are plowed when appropriate, typically when four or more inches of snow is present or other circumstances necessitate.

During snow emergencies, the Department of Public Works is in communication with the Department of Public Safety to address and respond to emergent and unsafe roadway conditions. MDOT PROJECT: 1-696 Plaza Reconstruction, Oak Park, Oakland County, MI. MDOT to reconstruct the ZO3 plaza bridge over I-696. This is the area below Victoria Park, located east and west of Church Street just north of 10 Mile Road in Oak Park. The project repairs drainage issues and improves safety for vehicular traffic.

MDOT to Undertake Extensive Bridge Repair This Spring

MDOT officials acknowledged before City Council on Monday, February 1, that beginning in April they are about to embark on a reconstruction project that "is as big as it gets." The problem lies under the overpass structure where leaks are causing hazardous driving conditions for vehicular traffic that travel I-696. In the winter months, large icicles form, then melt and fall on the expressway below.

"As a project manager for MDOT, I have worked on these bridges lots of times over the years," said MDOT Bridge Project Manager Raja Jildeh of MDOT's efforts to repair drainage issues. "But, as you know, just like water leaking on your roof, you repair one and then it leaks somewhere else. It's very difficult to get ahead of a problem like that. So this job, once-and-for all, should do it."

The reconstruction project involves removing everything above the bridge beams, including sections of Church Street, Victoria Park, the parking lot, sidewalks, trees, lights and play structure. The project will cost approximately \$4.4 million.

"We are pretty much destroying the whole thing and putting it back together again," said Nanette Alton, LLA, Landscape Architect for MDOT, disclosing that the intent is to replace everything in-kind. "What that basically means is that we are required to take everything that is there and bring it back to the level of where it was. But, in this case, I feel like we are bringing it back to a better level."

ENHANCEMENTS INCLUDE:

• A new play structure that meets the 2010 Americans with Disability Act Standards for Accessible Design and the American Society for Testing Materials guidelines for safety and accessibility.

• A rubberized poured-in-place playscape surface, or PIP, will replace the wooden mulch that currently collects and holds moisture.

• Over 175 new trees will be planted. They will be species that can thrive in new soil conditions. Existing trees were not thriving.

• Structural soil will be used to provide more oxygen, flexibility in compacting and layering, and improve drainage.

• Mindful that the City of Oak Park is a walking community, the pedestrian walkways will remain intact, however the existing walkways have large radius curves causing a longer walk than is necessary. The new walkway radius will be smaller.

• Fourteen benches will be placed along walkways and below tree species that will mature into shade-bearing trees.

• Lighting will receive an upgrade to LED technology.

• Updated garbage receptacles will be installed.
