This August, the City of Oak Park's Arts & Cultural Commission will host the first art fair in the City since 1999. The OPA! Fair (otherwise known as the Oak Park Art Fair) takes place from 10:00AM – 5:00PM on Saturday, August 3rd in the Oak Park Community Center.

"This event has many layers – all of them fun – including artists, music and food, much like a more intimate version of Royal Oak's Arts, Beats & Eats," commented Dawn Sketch, an Arts & Cultural Commission member since December 2012. The event is designed to help promote, both, businesses and the arts in Oak Park. About 20-30 artists will be selling drawings, paintings, photography, jewelry, glass art and sculptures.

In partnership with the Arts & Cultural Commission and the Oak Park Recreation Department, the Ferndale Area Chamber of Commerce will also host "Oak Park Summer Splash" at the Community Center on the same day. The family-themed event will include music, food vendors, pool time, putt-putt golf, inflatables and other activities for the kids at the Oak Park Recreation Complex on Oak Park Boulevard.
