The City of Oak Park Recreation Department offers one of the best, complete summer programs in the region; and summer of 2013 will be no exception.

DAY CAMP – June 17th – August 23rd

How do you make happy campers? Enroll them in Oak Park Day Camp where they can experience daily arts, crafts and games; swim three days a week; and take exciting, weekly fieldtrips. This summer, the Recreation Department is offering 10 weeks of day camp for boys and girls, ages five to 12. Weekly camps run Monday – Friday, 9AM – 4PM. Price: \$85.00 per child/ per week. Also available: before-care \$20/week (7:30 – 9AM) and after-care \$25/week (4 – 6PM).

COMMUNITY POOL – Opens June 15th

Oak Park families find the cool City Pool irresistible on a hot summer's day. This year, the pool is open Monday through Saturday, 1 - 6PM. The City offers Adult-Only Lap Swim on Tuesdays and Thursdays, 11:30AM - 12:30PM, and on Saturdays, 9:15 - 10AM. Trained, certified lifeguards are on duty. Road Project: Paving the Way

The Department of Public Works will host an informational community meeting on Monday, June 10th from 5 – 7PM to discuss the upcoming road improvement project on Oak Park Boulevard.

Beginning in mid-June, the City of Oak Park will initiate a patching and diamond grinding project on Oak Park Boulevard, designed to remove and replace poor sections of pavement and result in a smoother roadway. During the project, traffic will be limited to one lane in each direction and parking will not be permitted. Marked driveways will be inaccessible for approximately one week. Some residents in the area also will have modifications made to sidewalks adjacent to their properties.

Community: A Most Notable Resident

The ancient, spring festival known as "May Day" now shares its date (May 1st) with a distinguished Oak Park resident. Mr. Manny Hauer celebrated his 102nd birthday this year on that date. On behalf of City Council, Mayor Marian McClellan celebrated the momentous occasion by recognizing Mr. Hauer with a proclamation declaring May 1st as "Manny Hauer Day" in the City of Oak Park.

Mr. Hauer, who was born in Poroskov, Czechoslavakia in 1911, trained in several trades as a young man including blacksmith, tailor, plumber and mechanic. He relocated to Detroit in 1939 and served as a highway construction engineer during WWII. Following the war, he managed an industrial laundry until his retirement at age 70. Afterwards, he developed a passion for race-walking, which has earned him several gold medals in the Michigan Senior Olympics, including his most recent accomplishment at the age of 101, when he completed the 1500 meter race-walk with a time of 17:08! Mr. Hauer and his wife, Helen, of 72 years, have three daughters and sons-in-law, five grandchildren, and three great-grandchildren. Mr. Hauer's advice for longevity is to "walk daily, eat healthy food, and avoid red meat." The City of Oak Park celebrates the life and times of Mr. Manny Hauer!
