2013 Junk disposal opportunity at the end of this month

Have you been hearing the sounds of birds chirping high in the trees these past few weeks? It can only mean one thing, and that would be that Spring is finally on its way. With the welcoming of Spring, many residents find it an opportune time to clean out the old as they welcome the new. The City is here to help you to do just that with the upcoming "Haul Your Own Junk Away Days" coming up at the end of the month, starting Friday, March 22 through Sunday, March 31.

To help you with your "Spring Cleaning" DPW has issued a reminder that the first of 2013's junk disposal opportunities will begin on Friday, March 22 and run through Sunday, March 31. During Junk Away Days, residents can take anything (with the exception of hazardous materials) to the parking lot north of the Library, where designated dumpsters will be located, unwanted items which do not qualify for curb side garbage or recycling pickup. understanding of the urban landscape and the water quality issues. He knows the topics of turf management, tree management and more. His presentations are substantive, informative, and entertaining! He approaches the topic in a serious way, and motivates the audience to THINK AGAIN about lawn care and the goal of a green, lowermaintenance lawn with earth-friendly fertilizer and little or no herbicide.

2013 Election Dates

The City of Oak Park will be conducting three planned Elections during the 2013 calendar year:

1. May 7, 2013	Berkley School District
2. August 6, 2013	Oak Park City Primary(if necessary)
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3. November 5, 2013 *Oak Park City General Election*

The electors of Oak Park will be voting for Mayor and two City Council seats in November. A City Primary will be required in August if there are more than four candidates running for City Council and/or more than two candidates running for the office of Mayor. Council Members serve for a term of four years, and the Mayor serves for two.

Candidate Information packets with filing instructions are available in the Clerk's Office for anyone interested in running for Mayor or Council and can be obtained during regular business hours.

This month, Emily Doerr is pleased to report that the City of Oak Park has been chosen to be a pilot Associate Community in the Oakland County Main Street program. This is excellent news as it brings momentum, resources, and best practices to Oak Park as we work to transition our commercial corridor of 9 Mile and Coolidge into a more traditional downtown. Robert Donohue, Principal Planner for Oakland County Main Street, is excited to work with the City of Oak Park. He explains that downtowns are important because:

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ones we already have.

While the last few years have been difficult to say the least, the City has avoided the extreme financial distress that so many communities across the nation are facing. Our City's mature economy and older housing stock were hit hard in the Great Recession of 2008; the fallout from which we're still dealing with here in the public sector. Coupled with reductions in State revenue sharing and rising legacy costs it's been extremely difficult to maintain quality public services and deal with rising demands. On top of that, I expect property taxable values in Oak Park to tumble another 8% next year. On the flip side, thanks to our residents who voted in favor of last November's millage increase, we have new life and expect to be able to withstand next year's decrease without drastically cutting services and personnel. That means you can count on us being there when you need us. Even better, I was able to retain three public safety officers with the matching funds through a federal COPS grant. That means I've been able to stabilize the ranks so there's not a repeat of layoffs.

As we move through this budget process, we know that an economic recovery in the private sector is underway. The bad news is that the same recovery has not yet reached the public sector.

That means we'll have to maintain our conservative budgeting approach in our projections for next year's budget mindful of the need for more public safety officers and resources. We'll be shooting for a 10% fund balance to guard against unforeseen circumstances and we'll be looking for additional ways to streamline operations and cut unnecessary costs. In one instance alone, I expect to save about a half million dollars in our health care costs compared to last year.

In mid-April, our draft budget will be made available for public input. Please let your voice be heard and join us as we craft our plan to stabilize our City and fine tune our operation.
