Message from the Chief

On behalf of the men and women of the Red Bluff Police Department, we are pleased to present our 2016 Annual Report. This report provides comprehensive information and statistics on a wide variety of subjects including crime, staffing, and units within the Department. We hope this report provides insight into the invaluable personnel we have along with the variety and volumes of work they dealt with during 2016.

A year of growth and change is the best way to describe the Red Bluff Police Department during the past year. Five promotions occurred during the year and a total of nine new employees were hired; 4 sworn police officers, 4 community service officers (CSO's), and 1 records specialist. This alone generated considerable change as approximately 23% of the department's staff joined the organization during 2016.



Another noteworthy change was the introduction of CSO's to the patrol cadre. After considerable study and contemplation, the decision was made to hire three CSO's rather than two police officers. These CSO's were dedicated to handle low level patrol related calls such as thefts, vandalisms, and minor collisions. This decision has proven to be beneficial as data indicates the CSO's are handling 24% of the reports, thus fulfilling one of the primary goals which was to create some unallocated time for police officers.

As you explore this report, I would encourage you to take a moment to examine our "10 Year Statistical Comparison" section that will provide a snapshot of the crime in our City as well as insight into our agency and some of the statistical data associated with our work. As you read through these pages, it will reflect a high level of activity and a multitude of challenges. It will also demonstrate the quality and professionalism of the members of RBPD.

As you examine the report and statistical data, you may notice the continued trend of increases in many crime classifications. While 2016 resulted in an overall increase of 5.4% in UCR Part 1 Crimes, it was considerably less than the increase experienced in 2015 (12.6%). It is worth noting that Red Bluff is not alone in this regard as California as a whole continues to experience substantial increases in crime subsequent to laws such as AB 109 (enacted 10/1/2011), Proposition 47 (enacted 11/4/2014), and Proposition 57 (enacted 11/8/2016) that have changed the way we address crime and the consequences for criminal behavior. These laws have led to thousands of individuals remaining on our streets who formerly would have been incarcerated for the crimes they commit.

Despite these statistics, your police department is filled with honorable members who are motivated to work with you to combat crime and disorder. We look forward to working together in partnership with the members of our community to truly make Red Bluff a great place to live.

OPERATIONS DIVISION

CAPTAIN QUINTAN ORTEGA


The Operations Division is comprised of Sergeants, Corporals, Officers, and Community Service Officers (CSO) whose primary function is to deliver initial police services to the community. These uniformed personnel provide police response to calls for service as well as the initial response to an emergency 24 hours a day / 7 days a week.

Other personnel within the Operations Division include two fulltime School Resource Officers (SRO) and one traffic officer, when available. The Volunteers in Police Services (VIPS) also fall within the Operations Division. Programs associated with this division not previously mentioned include K9, COPPS, Field Training, Special Events, Professional Development, GREAT, and SWAT.

The Operations Division accounts for most of the Department's measurable workload and is the most visible in the community as they are usually the primary contact for persons seeking police services. All personnel within the Operations Division worked persistently throughout 2016 to address a year filled with challenges. These men and women routinely made sacrifices for the betterment of the Department and to improve the quality of life within the City of Red Bluff.




K9 PROGRAM





COMMUNITY ORIENTED POLICING PROGRAMS

The Police Department divides the City of Red Bluff into five different geographical regions (Areas of Responsibility) and designates each area with a sergeant and one or two officers for community oriented policing purposes. Each Area of Responsibility participates in Neighborhood Watch meetings and the Random Citizen Contact (RCC) program. The RCC program consists of an officer contacting a citizen randomly for no other reason than to connect with them and interact positively outside of a call for service.

FIELD TRAINING PROGRAM

During this calendar year, four Police Officers and four Community Service Officers (CSO's) were hired. All of them participated in a Field Training Program.

The officers start their field training program by participating in a two week orientation period. During this time, the officers are trained on various use of force options, computer use, weaponless defense trainings, first aid, CPR, RIMS computer system, vehicle operations and property and evidence processing. They are also required to review department policies and procedures. They are given a tour of the City (schools, hospital, courthouse, Alternatives to Violence) and are required to participate in some type of community service such as feeding the homeless.

After they complete the two week orientation period, the officers begin their fourteen week field training program. Each officer is assigned to a Field Training Officer during this time. The officers are taught report writing, vehicle operations, field interview and safety techniques, crime elements, case laws, court procedures and preparation, and how to handle the numerous types of calls for service this department handles. The trainees are heavily scrutinized during field training and have to meet department and P.O.S.T. performance standards before they are released on their own.

PATROL COMMUNITY SERVICE OFFICERS

The Patrol CSO's also participated in an orientation period prior to field training. This orientation period was unique in that it was a three week program, similar to a mini academy, complete P.O.S.T. Learning Domains specific to patrol related CSO duties. After the orientation period, each CSO participated in a nine week, field training program. During field training, the CSO's were assigned to a field training officer and were required to meet P.O.S.T. and department standards before completing the program.

The Patrol CSO's completed their training and began working autonomously in October 2016. During the last quarter of 2016, the three patrol assigned CSO's handled 24% of the reports solidifying their place on patrol.





SPECIAL EVENTS

Each year Police Department personnel work a variety of special events in the community. Some of these events require traffic control, while others only require additional patrol personnel or officers to be present. SWAT



The Tehama Inter-Agency SWAT Team consists of personnel from the Red Bluff Police Department, Tehama County Sheriff's Department, Corning Police Department and the Tehama DA Investigator's Office. The members train 12 times annually, meeting once each month on average for core competency training.

During 2016, the team conducted a variety of training, which included the following:

- Night Time / Low Light training

SCHOOL RESOURCE OFFICER

During the 2016 school year, Officer Lela Martinez was introduced to Red Bluff High School as their new School Resource Officer. Upon accepting this role, SRO Martinez completed trainings and participated in scheduled school events which

have aided in her role as a SRO.


SRO Martinez prepared a presentation on the warning signs of the Commercial Sexual Exploitation of Children, which she presented to the Red Bluff High School staff. SRO Martinez has also worked with the Department of Education and Tehama County Health Services in providing, "Stay off the Grass" classes to several students though out the year. These classes provide knowledge to our juveniles about the dangers and chemical effects of marijuana on their brains.

In late 2016, SRO Martinez contacted Vista Middle and Bidwell Elementary Schools and is coordinating presentations for parents and students, to promote awareness on current youth dangers i.e. Cyber bullying, the dangers of social media, and teen dating.

While performing her duties at the Red Bluff High School, SRO Martinez has also been successful in coordinating mentorship alliances between varying students. In 2016, SRO Martinez took six students, whom she had contacted for criminal action, to two separate community events. This allowed the students to see the benefits to being active in their community as well as having positive and encouraging contact with SRO Martinez.

For the 2016 school year, between January 1, 2016 & June 3, 2016, SRO Thomas took 52 reports and made 38 arrests. Between August 10, 2016 & December 31, 2016, SRO Martinez took 41 reports and made 19 arrests.

SRO /G.R.E.A.T. OFFICER

SRO Coker started at Vista Preparatory Academy in August of 2016. Detective Baxter is the primary GREAT Program Instructor; however, SRO Coker assists in the program as needed. SRO Coker has helped teach the GREAT Program for one semester and has helped teach more than 90 students in the program so far.

Between January 1, 2016 and December 31, 2016 SRO Coker took 156 criminal reports.

Of those 156 criminal cases only 2 of them included cases originating from incidents that took place at Vista Preparatory Academy.

There were NO gang related incidents during the Fall 2016 semester at Vista Preparatory Academy. This is one indication of the success the GREAT Program is having.

Detective Baxter and SRO Coker taught the GREAT (Gang Resistance Education and Training) classes during the fall 2016 semester to all of the Vista 7th grade classes.

- GREAT classes go for 13 weeks each semester one class a week 1 hour class times
- 90+ Seventh grade students completed the GREAT Program during the 2016 fall semester. More than 600 students have completed the GREAT Program with either SRO Baxter or SRO Coker at this time.
- There are a total of 7, seventh grade classes at Vista Preparatory Academy.
- Three classes were taught in the fall semester.
- Four classes are currently being taught this spring semester.
- Each of the seven classes planned/organized and completed a "Making Vista a better place project."
- Projects included: Positive message posters, a mural to be hung on campus and various Power Point proposals with topics designed to improve the school.

GREAT Classes include educating the students in the following life skills:

- The truth about gangs and violence
- How gangs and violence can affect their future
- Defining their roles in the school/community
- Development of goals and methods to obtain those goals
- Development of decision making skills
- Development of effective communication skills
- Development of effective refusal skills
- Developing skills and ways to deal with peer pressure
- Development of effective anger management skills
- Development of effective conflict resolution techniques

In addition to teaching the GREAT classes, SRO Coker has partnered with the Vista Preparatory Academy staff as well as the Red Bluff High school SRO. SRO Coker is also responsible for Jackson Heights School, Bidwell School Metteer School and the Community Day School. SRO Coker attended the yearly Safety Summit Meeting. SRO Coker is working with the health and safety personnel at the Red Bluff Union Elementary School District regarding improved safety and security at Vista Preparatory Academy.

SRO Coker is also a leading member of the interagency homeless activists and clean up team. That team is responsible for cleaning up illegal homeless camps while attempting to offer services such as mental health help, relocation and other resources to the residents of the camps. To date, the team has cleaned up more than 13 large camps which contained both health risks and large area of litter and hazardous debris fields.

SRO Coker has also become a certified ALICE active shooter instructor. Along with district and school staff, SRO Coker has begun the process of implementing the ALICE program into the Red Bluff Elementary Schools.

In addition to his SRO duties, SRO Coker has also worked closely with the investigations unit at the Red Bluff Police Department.



LIEUTENANT MATT HANSEN



This was Lt. Hansen's first full year in his new position and he was tasked with many projects. The first was to update the station with new floors, fresh paint and cabinetry. This project was done on a shoestring budget and its success is attributed to many of the police department employees that volunteered their time and talent to make it happen. The AB109 woodshop also helped

with the project by refinishing and building new cabinets.

In 2016, three new RBPD patrol SUVs were purchased and placed into service. The funds for this purchase were allocated from the public safety tax voters approved.

Homeland Security grant funds were also obtained and put to use to purchase new dispatch radios which were "end of life". This project was completed prior to the necessary upgrade to the 911telephone equipment which is scheduled to occur in 2017.

With the help of Community Service Russ Tyndall, Lt. Hansen proposed a new property and evidence building to improve the integrity and space necessary for the storage of evidence, found property and property held for safekeeping. This building is currently in the design phase and it is anticipated public safety funds will be used to complete this project in 2017.

Sadly, many of the cases RBPD detectives investigate are sex crimes. Fortunately, the Sexual Assault Felony Enforcement (SAFE) grant provides some funds to RBPD to help offset the cost of investigating these crimes and to purchase equipment to facilitate the investigation of sex crimes. In 2016, the RBPD was able to obtain a supplemental appropriation of SAFE grant funding in order to help purchase a new vehicle for the sex crimes detective. The grant covered 75% of the cost of the vehicle and 25% came from the general fund.

2016 continued to be a busy year in the Investigative Unit. This year Sgt. Graham was added as a detective sergeant. Sgt. Graham is responsible for overseeing the day-to-day operations of the detective unit. Sgt. Graham also has the responsibility of supervising the RBPD Field Training Program.

Sgt. Graham and Sgt. Busekist were selected and trained to be crisis negotiators in 2016. They will a valuable addition to the Tehama County Interagency Crisis Negotiations team which has been reactivated after a long period of dormancy because of a lack of trained personnel.

The RBPD Support/Special Services Division continues to look for new and innovative ways to fight crime in the City. In 2017, the police department will begin to use license plate reader technology and Intelligence Led Policing to guide the efforts of patrol officers so crime can be impacted in ways that improve the quality of life and increase the safety and security for residents.






COMMUNICATIONS CENTER

RECORDS / COMMUNICATIONS MANAGER CINDEE SPURGEON

Welcome to Red Bluff Police Department's Communications Center. When fully staffed, it consists of six dispatchers and a manager who supervises the center. The center is staffed 24 hours a day, 365 days of the year. The dispatchers work rotating 12 hour shifts, and there are usually one or two dispatchers on duty at any time.

The Communications Center is the primary PSAP (Public Safety Answering Point) for the City of Red Bluff. This means that all 911 calls originating in the city are routed to the center, including wireless calls. The dispatchers' primary responsibilities include answering

seven 911 emergency telephone lines, 4 business telephone lines and several inter-department telephone lines that must be routed properly. They keep track of all on-duty patrol officers, detectives, sergeants, community service officers, and other miscellaneous personnel. They monitor Red Bluff PD's primary radio channel along with other radio channels such as the Tehama County Sheriff's Department, the California Highway Patrol, The Red Bluff Fire Department and Red Bluff Public Works so they are aware of incidents that may require police assistance. Dispatchers use a Computer Aided Dispatch system to input calls for service and to keep track of on-duty units. They prioritize these calls for service quickly and efficiently and dispatch appropriate unit(s) to in progress or cold calls. Besides answering emergency phone calls and radio dispatching, RBPD dispatchers inquire and update into CLETS databases, complete data entry on pawns, citations and other miscellaneous paperwork, and also scan documents into cases and incidents.

RECORDS UNIT



Welcome to Red Bluff Police Department's Records Unit. When fully staffed, it consists of two Records Specialists and a Records Manager who supervises the unit. The Records Unit is open from 8am-4pm during the weekdays.

During 2016, the Records Unit processed 6,890 original and supplemental reports. They review each report for statistical and routing accuracy, create working files for patrol, detectives and community service officers, and prepare all paperwork that is sent to the Tehama County Superior Court, Tehama County District Attorney's Office and other allied agencies.

In addition to report review and dissemination, Records staff is also responsible for answering records-related phone calls, assisting citizens at the front counter, processing records requests from citizens, criminal justice agencies, insurance companies and other, processing all traffic, criminal and parking citations, pawn slips, handling bicycle registrations, completing paperwork associated with sex, arson, narcotic and gang registrations, and a myriad of other duties.






SUPPORT DIVISION - COMMUNITY SERVICE OFFICERS

Case Highlights

The following represents <u>only a small percentage</u> of the hard work and dedicated service provided by the professional staff at the Red Bluff Police Department. These case highlights are provided to demonstrate the various types of cases handled by RBPD personnel and is not intended to represent all significant cases, but rather to provide a snapshot of a small number of cases handled during 2016.

Case Number: 16-309

On 01/25/16, Officers from the Red Bluff Police Department and Deputies from the Tehama County Sheriff's Office responded to Red Bluff Outdoor Power (490 Antelope Blvd.) for a report of an alarm activation. Upon arrival, officers discovered an unknown suspect had pried open the front security gate before smashing both front door windows. The unknown suspect(s) stole multiple Stihl and Husqvarna chainsaws and several Honda generators with an estimated loss of approximately \$17000. The damage to the front doors was estimated at \$2000. Red Bluff Outdoor Power was burglarized in September 2015 with similar circumstances.

Case Number: 16-357

On 01/28/16, Officers responded to the Red Bluff Apartments for a report of a male exposing himself. Upon arrival, Officers learned the 35 year old male of Red Bluff had repeatedly exposed himself (buttocks and anus) to an adult female and a 16 year old male. The adult male was arrested and booked at the Tehama County Jail for indecent exposure and 2 outstanding arrest warrants.

Case Number: 16-462

On 2/5/16, Officers were called to Vista School in regards to an adult man who grabbed a female juvenile's hand on her way to school. Officer contacted the 12 year old victim who reported while walking to school this morning, a man whom she did not know, approached her on the 700 block of Kimball Road. The man, later identified as an 83 year old of Red Bluff, did not say anything to the victim, but grabbed her hand and held it. After a couple of seconds, the victim saw a school bus drive by and was able to pull her hand away from the male. Officers searched the area and located the male walking through a field in the area. The male was arrested for annoying or molesting a child under 18 years with special circumstances and a parole violation. He was booked into the Tehama County Jail without bail. The male is currently required to register as a sex offender in accordance with Penal Code 290. He is on parole and has previous convictions for annoy or molest a child under 18 years of age and continuous sexual abuse of a child. He is a resident in the area where this incident occurred and at the time, was monitored by a parole ankle monitor as a condition of his release.

Case Number: 16-871

On 03/07/16 at approximately 1930 hours, officer responded to bathrooms at the Red Bluff City Park for a report of a female yelling for help. Upon arrival, officers contacted a 39 year old male from Red Bluff and his girlfriend. The investigation revealed the male had battered his girlfriend and prevented her from leaving the bathroom for approximately one hour. The male was arrested and book at the Tehama County Jail for felony domestic violence and felony false imprisonment with violence.

Case Number: 16-955

On 03/15/16 at 0628 hours, Officers responded to Motel 6 for a report of a physical disturbance between several subjects, one of which reportedly had a gun. Deputies from the TCSO and officers from CHP responded to the motel to assist. The victim reported contacting two male subjects near his parked vehicle (a 21 and 26 year old male both from Red Bluff). The victim learned the two subjects had entered his pickup and taken a firearm. The three men began fighting in the area and the police were called. Both males were subsequently arrested and booked at the Tehama County Jail for theft of a firearm and robbery.



Case Number: 16-960

On 03/15/16 at 1355 hours: Officers responded to the area of Givens Road south of the PG&E property for a report of a man spray painting gang graffiti in the area. Officers contacted a 27 year old male of Red Bluff who was carrying a can of spray paint and had fresh paint on several of his fingers. Officers noted the male had several gang related tattoos and was wearing clothing commonly associated with a local criminal street gang. The male admitted to "tagging the block" to represent his gang. He was arrested for being in possession of tools with the intent to commit vandalism and violating probation.

Case Number: 16-961

On 03/15/16 at 1344 hours: A 14 year old student of Salisbury High School was arrested and booked into juvenile hall after he brought brownies laced with marijuana to school and provided them to 4 other students. The 14 year old was booked for being in possession of marijuana on school grounds, contributing to the delinquency of a minor and child cruelty.

Case Number: 16-1029

On 03/17/16, the Red Bluff High School, School Resource Officer initiated an investigation regarding suspicious circumstances between a 14 year old male juvenile from Gerber and 21 year old male from Red Bluff. After a lengthy investigation, which included the review of over 26,000 text messages during an 8 month period, officers obtained 8 search warrants, which included four residences, three in Tehama County and one in Butte County, AT&T Cellular, Sprint Cellular, Verizon Cellular, and Facebook. On April 19, 2016 at about 7:00 A.M., officers served search warrants in the City of Red Bluff, Tehama County, and Butte County. During the service of those search warrants, numerous items were seized as evidence and four suspects were arrested for various sex acts with a minor.

Case Number: 16-1032

On 03/21/16, the Red Bluff High School, School Resource Officer began investigating allegations of sexual abuse involving minors on a school bus. A 16 year old male was subsequently arrested for 4 counts of sexual battery and 1 count of attempted oral copulation. The victim was a 15 year old female. The suspect was booked into juvenile hall.

Case Number: 16-2263

On 06/28/16, officers were dispatched to a residence on the 100 block of Gilmore Road regarding a sexual assault investigation. Officers contacted the victim, who reported on June 27, 2016 in the afternoon hours, she was sleeping inside a trailer. The victim woke up to a male known to her sexually assaulting her. The victim confronted the male, who immediately left the residence. At about 10:20 AM, officers contacted the suspect in this incident, who was identified as a 51 year old male from Red Bluff. The male was arrested for a single count of Oral copulation of an unconscious person. The male was booked into the Tehama County Jail where he was held on a \$50,000.00 bail.

Case Number: 16-1657

On 06/30/16, as part of an ongoing drug investigation, Officers from the Red Bluff Police Department and Agents from the Tehama County District Attorney's Bureau of Investigations served a search warrant on David Avenue. Officers contacted a 52 year old and his 50 year old wife inside of the apartment. Officers located illegal narcotics and other evidentiary items. A six year old child was also inside of the apartment. Both adults were arrested for felony child endangerment, maintaining a place for drug sales/use, transportation of narcotics, marijuana sales, possession of cocaine base for sales, possession of a controlled substance, possession of drug paraphernalia, and possession of a controlled substance without a prescription. The residents were taken to the Tehama County Jail where they were held on \$169,000 bail.

Case Number: 16-2581

On 07/21/16, Investigators were called to the marina near the Elk's lodge regarding a deceased person. A citizen called the police department and reported finding a deceased person in some bushes at the south end of the marina. The person was a male adult, who appeared to have been deceased for several days. The male's identity was unknown at the time of his discovery. After an investigation by the Tehama County Deputy Coroner it was learned the male was a 50 year old out of Sacramento. He was a transient in Red Bluff and it was determined his death was from exposure and not foul play.



Case Number: 16-3634

On 10//13/16, RBPD Officers were dispatched to the intersection of Antelope Blvd. and Main St. in reference to a collision. It was determined the vehicle had been involved in a vehicle pursuit with California Highway Patrol (CHP) earlier in the morning, but CHP had discontinued the pursuit. RBPD Officers investigated the collision and officers from CHP conducted a criminal investigation. The 19 year old driver from Cucamonga was arrested by CHP and booked at the Tehama County Jail for unspecified charges.

Case Number: 16-3748

On 10/21/16, Red Bluff Officers were dispatched to the Belle Mill Laundromat, 142 Belle Mill Rd., in reference to a subject refusing to leave the premises. Officers arrived on scene and contacted a 19 year old male from Red Bluff. The male was asked multiple times to leave the business because it was closed. The male refused. While attempting to arrest the male for trespassing, he violently resisted and physically assaulted two officers causing injury to both. The male was finally subdued and booked at the Tehama County Jail for multiple offenses. The police officers involved in the altercation received minor injuries.

Case Number: 16-3747

On 10/21/16, Red Bluff Officers were dispatched to the area of Washington St. and Jefferson St. in reference to a stabbing. Officers arrived on scene and located a conscious male adult lying on the north side of Willow St. west of Main Street. The victim had suffered multiple stab wounds. The victim told officers he had been stabbed by a 29 year old Red Bluff resident. During the investigation the suspect was located and detained near Umpqua Bank. He was later booked into the Tehama County Jail for suspicion of attempted homicide.

Case Number: 16-3620

On 10/12/16, a 15 year old Red Bluff High School student was arrested after posting threats on social media regarding a school shooting. He referenced the Columbine shooting and talked about getting his "revenge today." When contacted by officers, the 15 year old said he made the posts as a joke and was just doing it to be funny. He was arrested for criminal threats and booked into juvenile hall.

Case Number: 16-3870

On 11/03/16, a 53 year old male was arrested for sexually assaulting a friend's 11 year old son over a five year period. As a result of the multi-agency investigation, the male was arrested for fourteen different charges. Shortly after information of the male's arrest was made public, two other victims contacted the Red Bluff Police Department and reported that they had also been sexually assaulted by the male several years prior. This case is currently pending trial.

Case Number: 16-4441

On 12/21/16, a 23 year old female from Corning CA contacted the Red Bluff Police Department to report she had been forcibly sexually assaulted and raped by a 25 year old male from Red Bluff. During this incident the male was in possession of a firearm. While holding the firearm, the male made the victim get into his vehicle and drive with him around Red Bluff. Out of fear for her life, the victim did not resist as the male drove her back to his house. At his residence, the male sexually assaulted and raped the victim. During the investigation, officers located and arrested the male. He was booked into the Tehama County Jail for Rape by force or fear (Felony) False imprisonment (Felony) Penetration foreign object (Felony) Kidnapping with intent to commit sexual assault (Felony) Assault to commit rape (Felony) Oral copulation (Felony) Domestic violence (Felony) Child endangerment (Felony). He was held on \$915,000 bail.

Case Number: 16-4513

On 12/28/2016, at about 8:16 PM, officers from the Red Bluff Police Department along with medical personnel were dispatched to Red Bluff High School football field for a report of an unresponsive female. Upon arrival, officers located an unresponsive 42 year old female. Life saving efforts by officers and medical personnel were unsuccessful. The toxicology report showed a toxic level of methamphetamine in her system. Detectives from the Red Bluff Police Department and Tehama County District Attorney Investigators Office investigated the circumstances surrounding the female's death. She was not associated with the Red Bluff High School or attending any events on campus during this incident.
