

Chief Noe Castillo Speaks at Special Olympics Brunch

Over the weekend of November 6th, Police Chief Noe Castillo was invited to speak at the Special Olympics Brunch on behalf of Rio Grande City Police Department for their exceptional fundraising efforts for the Special Olympics Texas - Rio Grande Valley Area.

Castillo shared that the collaborative efforts of the entire department along with the community outreach of two special individuals, Myda Garza and Angelina Villarreal, served as the key to their success. Also in attendance was Senator Eddie Lucio who shared tribulations during the write up of SB 776, which would provide adaptive sports programs in UIL for children with disabilities.

With a whooping \$2,418 out of a total of \$3,208 valley wide, Rio Grande City Police Department leads the valley in funds raised for the Special Olympics Torch Fundraiser 2021. Because of these efforts and the amount of community support, Special Olympics Texas corporate has selected the area to represent the entire Rio Grande Valley region in a state-wide virtual Torch Run production.

Entities involved include Roma ISD Police Department, Roma Police Department, and Starr County sheriff's office, Department of Public Safety Starr County, Rio Grande City Grulla ISD, La Grulla and Escobares Police Department.



Public Utilities Crewmen Fix Water Tower Leak





Over the first weekend of December, Public Utilities crew men went into the Eisenhower Rio Grande City water tank to initially fix a leak described to be "Pouring out like a shower," by Public Utilities director Elisa Beas. Once the crewman made their way in, the conditions of the cleanliness of the water tank were made evident. In addition to fixing the leak, the crewman spent their weekend cleaning and disinfecting the walls of the tank. The progress photos can be seen here.

The Public Utilities department has updated policy for incoming developers wishing to build an apartment complex. Complexes larger than a duplex are required to function from a centralized master water meter instead of individualized meters for each unit.

1. VFW Lift Station (A):

This project is complete pending pavement of the drive

2. BLUEBONNET Lift Station (F):

This project is complete pending pavement of the drive

3. BBVA Lift Station (E):

This project is complete pending pavement of the drive

4. LOS GARCIAS Lift Station (G):

A. Wet well, receiving MH, and the collector line is in the ground, the connection to the existing LS(MH) is ongoing with the contractor making effort to stabilize the area before continuing with excavation.

B. AEP has installed the new service pole and shifted power to the existing Ls to the new service pole temporarily

C. The integrity of the bottom of the existing LS has been ascertained and thus the ongoing operation to complete the connection to it continues as a viable option to re-directing the incoming flows from the five contributing lines.

D. A need for an extension of another 5 mos. to the contract was discussed. Change Order #5 will add time to extend the contract to May31, 2022.

5. SOLIS Lift Station (H):

This project is complete pending pavement of the drive. The required yard faucet is not yet active until a new meter application is made to Rio WSC by the City.

6. RIO MOTORS Lift Station (C):



Affordable and Sustainable





Currently, the City takes on about 1.4 million gallons of wastewater a day, barely making it under its maxxed out capacity of 1.5 million gallons. With the help of a grant funded by the Texas Water Development Board and North American Development Bank. The monies will be utilized to fund a full feasibility and environmental study that strategizes how to support the expected population growth of the community for the next 20 years. This could entail the addition of more lift stations and an estimation of the projected longevity of the projects proposed. In order to meet compliance for infrastructure to support more economic growth, the Rio Grande City Sanitation plant will be undergoing an expansion. During the December City Commission Meeting, an engineer will be selected to formulate the details of such a project. Other attributes involved include running a completely new sewage line from Hernandez street to Alvarez road. Homes and businesses in the area receive clean water from independent septic tanks or water treatment systems. Normally, residents and businesses receiving city water must provide access to allow maintenance of water meters located on the outskirt of the central property.

Border Town, A Little Market in a South Texas Border Town



From a very young age, Armando Peña Jr. grew up surrounded by business. Working at his father's Gulf Gas Station originally located in Roma, Texas, he saw his entrepreneurial father work towards realizing his goal of opening up a grocery store. Slowly incorporating beverages and snacks in that small gasoline station, Amando Sr. eventually opened the Riverview Family Center in 1978.

This would serve as a jumping off point for Amando Jr. As he saw the grit and determination his father displayed in achieving this long-term goal, he would use what he learned while attending Texas A & I Uniness? The easiest?

When I started running my father's company in 1981, things were relatively easy.

You would price the merchandise and the cashier would key in the price at the register; everything was simple. Nowadays, there is a lot of technology and it's really complex. Technology makes everything easier in the long run but a glitch potentially creates a major nightmare. That is the reason my sons are the driving force as they take on the technological aspect of this business. The easiest part is working with employees and wanting to serve our customers with good qualHow did you decide on the location for your business in Rio Grande City?

Do you believe there is some sort of pattern or formula to becoming a successful entrepreneur?

What's the best business advice anyone gave you? Keep it simple, stupid. One of my professors in college taught us that phrase and it's a very basic saying but it makes all the sense in the world. Everything we do, we try to keep things simple.

Describe the moment at which point you knew your venture might actually become a success. How do you differentiate yourself from your com-

versity and running his father's company for 28 years to envision his own group of retail stores.

It was after the passing of his father, Amando Jr. along with his wife Dalina, and his children: Liana, Amando III and Reynaldo, set out and opened the first Border Town in Alto Bonito. This would lay the foundation of what would become a burgeoning empire of homegrown neighborhood markets in Starr County including two and another in construction in Rio Grande City.

Can you provide me with a description of your business?

How did you get started in this business? How did you get the background and skills necessary to run this type of business?

Does your business have a stated mission statement, the reason that this business exists?

What has been the hardest part of running a busi-

ity products, fresh produce and meats. How many employees do you have? How important have good employees been to your success?

It's everything. Our stores are located in small towns, in small neighborhoods and it's the same customers coming in and out every week, every day, to shop. Our employees go out of their way to welcome and serve them. They get to know our customers by name thus, establishing relationships and that makes all the difference in the world.

Company culture is the personality of a company and is defined by a variety of elements, including work environment, company mission, value, ethics, expectations and goals. What kind of culture exists in your organization? How did you establish this tone and why did you institute this particular type of culture? petitors?

Where do you see yourself and your business in 10 years? 20 years?

Geographically all of our stores are in a cluster, each one approximately a 10-minute drive from each other and that makes it easier to operate and visit. However our goal is to open a least one new grocery store per year .for the next 10 years and we plan to open in Zapata and Hidalgo County

Who is your role model?

What do you do in your non-work time? What are your hobbies?

I am an ordained minister and a deacon of the Catholic Church. So on weekends and weekday afternoons, I do ministry work. That is my vocation and I invest many hours in ministry. As for hobbies, I am a fisherman. I like to head out to Falcon Lake and for freshwater fishing.

Rio Grande City Fire Department Welcomes Two New Firefighters

Rio Grande City Fire Department received 2 new hires in the month of November, 2021.

Probationary firefighters are Ernesto Lopez, who previously was employed with our fire department between June 7, 2017 to October 14, 2019.

Probationary firefighter Hector A. Escoto, previously employed for the Roma Fire Department. We currently have 12 full time firefighters, 2 volunteer firefighters and 2 administrator/firefighters. A little information regarding dayto-day activities include the following: Every month a maintenance inspection on all fire trucks is completed. We currently have 2 engine trucks, 2 tankers, 2 brush units and 3 other trucks. The Department is in the process of receiving 2 additional engine trucks by the end of this month. Goals for the future of Rio Grande City Fire Department as stated by Fire Chief Manuel Muniz, include "making sure we are fully equipped both with needed apparatuses, PPE, fire equipment and that our firefighters are all up to date in certifications. We respond to different assortments of emergencies including calls from structure fires, vehicle fires, grass fires, medical calls, vehicle accidents to fire alarms and gas leaks. The list goes on." The Chief goes on to mention that anyone interested in becoming a firefighter can do so by attending any fire academy. Chief Muniz says that the most challenging aspect of being a firefighter is "not knowing what the day may bring in terms of calls. And also the challenges of working 24 hours a day." However, he concludes that he loves his job and continues to do it for both his family and community..







Rendering for New Public Safety Building


Plans are almost complete to house Rio Grande City's Police Department, Fire Department, and other additions. Laura Warren, lead architect with the Warre Group Architects, Inc advised, "we will have an updated revision before the end of December." With the population skyrocketing in the previous years and more commercial development underway, some may argue that this expansion to vital public safety resources is long overdue.

Temporary Signage Ordinance

A person may not place a handbill, poster, placard or other temporary sign in the historic sign district except inside a window or on a bulletin board and with the consent of the owner or the tenant. If a person files an application for a signed permit in the historic sign district and the application complies with all applicable regulations of this chapter and other building codes adopted by the city of real Grande in City then the planning Director will review the application and determine whether it complies with the resort sign district guidelines.

Free Tax Preparation

United Way's VITA Program provides free tax preparation for families in Hidalgo and Starr Counties. Every year, Rio Grande City staff joins in on providing free tax services to the community. In 2021, families saved an average of \$600,500 in tax preparations fees and received about \$5.2 million in federal tax refunds. December is Viral Safety Month

A Proclamation signing and informative session regarding Viral Safety Month, featuring City of Roma, Mayor Escobar, Mayor Villarreal, and Dr. Mussett, a Roma Family Practice Physician was held November 24, 2021 alongside Mayor of Roma, Jaime Escobar. The proclamation spreads across the month of December with high hopes it will reach a year-round awareness campaign effort. The campaign has been coined the name of Visualizing Hope [™] in an effort to provide a way to prevent the spread of Covid-19 by education regarding preventable measures, not limited to adding Vitamin D3 to your daily vitamins regimen. According to the program's pilot program on the City of Roma's website, Visualizing Hope [™] is a cutting edge public health initiative to lower the risk of COVID-19 mass spread by turning on the body's natural protections against the virus. The initiative tracks The Viral Safety Index inside various public buildings where people are likely to be infected. Numerous scientific studies show that when the absolute humidity of the air we breathe INDOORS is 10 g/ m³ or above, COVID-19 mass-spread ALL BUT DISAPPEARS. Dr. Mussett and Dr. have been published across many media outlets, including Forbes in late 2021.

The campaign highlights the following measures:
