


City Hall Expected Closures

City Rescue Plan Funds Received

io Grande City received the first half of the city's portion of the American Recovery Plan on November 1st in the amount of \$1,797,810.95. Leonel Cantu, Rio Grande City Finance Director shares that the Commission plans to hold a workshop to learn about how the funds can be expended within the next couple of weeks.

The American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA) is a bill passed by the 117th United States Congress and signed into law by President Joe Biden. This bill is intended to strengthen communities that faced heavy economic losses during the pandemic. In addition to the \$65 billion in direct relief allocated to all 19,000 cities, towns and villages, ARPA also provides more than \$350 billion in competitive federal grants for local housing, health care, technology modernization, education, workforce, transportation, and economic development needs as stated by the National League of Cities organization.





Rio Grande City Public Utilities Ongoing Projects

- 1. The Lift Station project on HWY 83 and W Bluebonnet St is nearing the last phase of construction. This project will service areas in west Rio Grande City.
- 2. The Waste Water Treatment Plant Expansion and the West Side Sewer Line Extension is a project funded by the Texas Water Development Board and the North American Development Bank. This project will double the capacity of the wastewater treatment plant from 1.5 million gallons per day to 3 million gallons per day, and the sewer collection line will provide first time sewer service to areas west of Hernandez Road to Alvarez Road. - 3. Another project underway is the Street Improvements Project 2020-02 which is funded by the 2020 Certificate of Obligation Fund. This project will revitalize smooth traffic by fixing potholes, restructure road drainage, etc. The Engineer team currently working on developing this project is HALFF and Associates.

Paving the Way

Rio Grande City CISD Veterans Middle School Student Council students worked on a pilot program to test the walkability from the middle school towards Miriam Vale Park.

"I know parents have been calling in regards to the sidewalks. Following this project, kids have already told me they feel safer," says Rio Grande City Parks and Recreation director Frank Eguia.

Currently this area lacks sidewalks and visibly painted walkways. The purpose of this Community Challenge is to incite conversation and observe the behavior of not only the kids but of the community. The

demonstration will be on display for the week.

WOW incorporates interviews of students and interacting parties into feedback from surveys that are administered in the days following the initial demonstration to compose a full comprehensive study. The Community Challenge and other studies alike can be used to promote awareness and attract funds to address the needs of our growing city.

This specific collaborative project with WOW is made possible by a CDC Grant awarded to Texas A&M AgriLife Extension and Texas A&M Health Science Center School of Public Health which aims at achieving an increase in community wide practices that promote and support healthy behaviors and robust environments in need.

Red Flags

The US National Weather Service has officially declared Rio Grande City a

RED ZONE

e'd like to notify citizens that Rio Grande City is in a RED ZONE according to the, US National Weather Service. When low humidity combines with strong northern winds, fire warnings are more likely to occur. You may recall the fires that occurred earlier



this month in La Gloria and surrounding areas along FM 755, engulfing about 208 acres of brush. According to San Isidro Fire Department Chief Bernabe Benavidez, the area experienced temporary evacuations.

Rio Grande City Fire Department invites citizens to be mindful of these occurrences. A

Red Flag Warning means warm temperatures, very low humidities, and stronger winds are expected to combine to produce an increased risk of fire danger. During a Red flag Warning, please refrain from burning debris and brush. Outdoor burning is strongly discouraged. Any fire will likely spread rapidly.

Keep in mind that

- 1. If you are allowed to burn in your area, all burn barrels must be covered with a weighted metal cover, with holes no larger than 3/4 of an inch.
- 2. Do not throw cigarettes or matches out of a moving vehicle. They may ignite dry grass on the side of the road and become a wildfire.
- 3. Extinguish all outdoor fires properly. Drown fires with plenty of water and stir to make sure everything is cold to the touch. Dunk charcoal in water until cold. Do not throw live charcoal on the ground and leave it.
- 4. Never leave a fire unattended.
 Sparks or embers can blow into leaves or grass, ignite a fire, and quickly spread.

What Is a Red Flag Warning?

Red Flag Warnings alert fire managers on federal lands to conditions that are highly unfavorable for prescribed burns and that may lead to especially dangerous wildfire growth. To issue a Red Flag Warning, we need the following:



Ten-hour fuels of 8% or less. This parameter describes how much water is held by small vegetation such as grass, leaves, and mulch that take only about ten hours to respond to changes in dry/wet conditions.



Relative humidity (RH) less than 25% for several hours. RH depicts how much water is in the air, relative to the temperature of the air.



Winds 20 feet off the ground of at least 15 mph for several

Red Flag Warnings are usually only issued during the spring and fall fire weather seasons, February 15 – April 30 and October 1 - December 15. When warnings are issued, officials know to curtail planned burns and to be on the lookout for wildfires.







Rio Grande City would like to remind citizens that according to the Texas Health and Safety Code if you get caught illegally dumping, you can face steep fines up to thousands of dollars or possibly even jail time. While penalties vary from state to state, illegal dumping in Texas is considered a serious crime and can be very costly.

Build Back Better Regional Challenge



ayor Joel Villarreal writes to the U.S. Economic Development Administration (EDA) Selection Review Committee as a Coalition Partner in support of the South Texas Development Council (STDC) as the Lead Institution for the Build Back Better Regional Challenge on behalf of Rio Grande City. The entities selected will recieve a BBBRC Grant that could provide the improvements needed for regional infrastructure.

The Build Back Better Regional Challenge was designed to assist communities nationwide in their efforts to build back better by accelerating the economic recovery from the coronavirus pandemic and building local economies that will be resilient to future economic unexpected occurrences.

In the letter submitted by Rio Grande City with STDC's Phase 1 application, it is stated that "since 1848, Rio Grande City has been a destination to achieve the American Dream. [The] mission is to provide quality municipal services in partnership with citizens to build a progressive city and to provide a better quality of life for all residents." If the STDC were to be selected for this grant, it would upgrade the overall economic and living standard of not only the city but the entire region.

The \$1 billion Build Back Better Regional Challenge will provide a transformational investment to approximately 20-30 regions across the country that want to reboot their economies, according to the EDA. These regions will have the opportunity to grow new regional industry clusters or scale existing ones through planning, infrastructure, innovation and entrepreneurship, workforce development, access to capital, and more. There are two phases to this grant:

Phase 1: 50-60 regional coalitions of partnering entities will be awarded ~\$500,000 in technical assistance funds to develop and support three to eight projects to grow a regional growth cluster.

Phase 2: EDA will award 20-30 regional coalitions \$25 million to \$75 million, and up to \$100 million, to implement those projects.

Rio Grande City vowed to support the project by providing resources about said opportunities to the public, supporting the planning process in any consulting capacity necessary, and contributing valuable and necessary information in regards to community statistics.

Sustainable Energy

io Grande City Mayor and ERCOT TML Advisory board member Joel Villarreal along with other city leaders, state leaders, current and former regulators met with ERCOT to identify important improvements in the Texas electric grid.

"Energy reliability is absolutely critical to the ever expanding needs of all Texans," said Mayor Joel Villarreal in response to questions about energy grid developments.

ERCOT interim President and CEO Brad Jones submitted a "Roadmap to Improving Grid Reliability," earlier this year, following several devastating weathering events taking place in Texas.

This letter along with the roadmap procedures provides details of a variety of improvements to enhance the reliability and adequacy of the Texas power grid.

In creating this Roadmap, recent legislation, such as Senate Bill 2 and Senate Bill 3, have provided the committee direction. In collaboration with the Public Utility Commission, ERCOT plans to implement Governor Abbott's directives to ensure the continued reliability of the Texas electric grid.

Temporary Signage Ordinance

A person may not place a handbill, poster, placard or other temporary sign in the historic sign district except inside a window or on a bulletin board and with the consent of the owner or the tenant. If a person files an application for a signed permit in the historic sign district and the application complies with all applicable regulations of this chapter and other building codes adopted by the city of real Grande in City then the planning Director will review the application and determine whether it complies with the resort sign district guidelines.
