

In 2016, it's estimated that just under 30% of cancers diagnosed in women will be breast cancers.

Today, a woman diagnosed with breast cancer at an advanced state has a 27% chance of being alive in 5 years. With early detection, you can increase your chances to 98%.



The American Cancer Society invests more in breast cancer research than any other cancer type. Society-funded research has led to the development of potentially lifesaving breast cancer drugs, as well as the discovery of genes linked to breast cancer.



There are nearly 3 million breast cancer survivors in the U.S. The American Cancer Society recommends a baseline mammogram between the ages of 35-40 and then once yearly thereafter. Monthly self-exams are also recommended for women over the age of 20. Screening guidelines vary by age, so talk with your physician.

In September, the EDC met with prospective clients in the hospitality, medical and service industries to discuss site selection, the development process and workforce needs

### You May be Eligible for Free Child Care

f you work in a restaurant, hotel, retail, or in other service industries, you may be eligible for free child care under a new program offered by the Texas Workforce Commission (TWC).

TWC together with Workforce Solutions is offering funds to qualifying families starting next year, but the time to sign up is now.

"TWC's child care assistance program provides an important subsidy many Texas families use to enter the workforce" said TWC Chairman Bryan Daniel.

The Service Industry Recovery program

targets low-wage workers in the arts, entertainment and recreation industry, as well as accommodations, food services and retail trade — industries which were most impacted by the pandemic.

"This much needed resource is a huge step forward in providing stability for our service workers and the industry in general," said Dalinda Guillen, RGC EDC Executive Director. "I encourage employers whose staff may be eligible to benefit from this new program to share this information with their employees."



"It's important to learn the different sounds of smoke and carbon monoxide alarms. When an alarm makes noise – a beeping sound or a chirping sound – you must take action!" Rio Grande City Fire Department Chief Manuel Muniz. "Make sure everyone in the home understands the sounds of the alarms and knows how to respond. To learn the sounds of your specific smoke and carbon monoxide alarms, check the manufacturer's instructions that came in the box, or search the brand and model online."

The Rio Grande City Fire Department is virtually hosting an educational video in support of this year's Fire Prevention Week campaign, "Learn the Sounds of Fire Safety", the video will be furnished to the counseling departments of the school districts in our community. 
1. A continuous set of three loud beeps -



- beep, beep, beep means smoke or fire. Get out and call 911, and remain outside.
- 2. A single chirp every 30 or 60 seconds means the battery is low and must be changed.
- All smoke alarms must be replaced after 10 years.
- 4. Chirping that continues after the battery has been replaced means the alarm is at the end of its life and should be replaced.
- Make sure your smoke and CO alarms meet the needs of all your family members, including those with sensory or physical disabilities.

National Night Out is a community-police awareness-raising event in the United States, held the first Tuesday of October in Texas. The event has been held annually since 1984, and is sponsored by the National Association of Town Watch in the United States. National Night Out began simply with neighbors turning on their porch lights and sitting in front of their homes. The first National Night Out involved 2.5 million residents across 400 communities in 23 states; National Night Out 2016 involved 38 million residents in 16,000 communities across the United States.

#### **MAKING THE GRADE**

he Rio Grande City Public Library has been accredited by the Texas State Library and Archives Commission and will be a fully qualified member of the Texas Library System for State Fiscal Year 2021-22 fiscal year.

"We are honored to have met the standards to become an accredited library for over 10 years. This is possible with the hard work and support of the City of Rio Grande City Mayor, City Commission, Administration, Library Staff and Community", said Norma Gomez Fultz, Library Director.

Accredited libraries are eligible to apply for E-rate, can apply for competitive grants and eligible to participate in the state-wide Interlibrary Loan (ILL) program. Accredited libraries can participate in the TexShare databases consortium at a discounted rate. They provide full-text articles from journals, newspapers, magazines, and many other sources. Entire books can be read online. Database topics include homework help for students, health information, business information, biography and genealogy, as well as literature and archival information. Examples are Chilton Library, Job & Career Accelerator, Learning Express, Sanborn Maps, Hobbies & Crafts, Home Improvement, and Consumer Health Source.

### **TRAINING DAYS**



arlier this month, City of Rio Grande City, Main Street Coordinator, Sara Hernandez, attended a Main Street Training in Seguin, Texas. At this three day event, Ms. Hernandez, and other experienced and novice main street coordinators throughout the state, were able to brainstorm, discuss, and strategize ways to revitalize many of our small town main streets. Throughout the week, there were discussions on a variety of topics, but most noteworthy were those concerning strategic planning, or rather, the physical inventory of historic buildings. This in depth discussion ended with the "majority approved" suggestion for coordinators to look into having an independent company evaluate

and inventory buildings in downtown areas

in order to determine their contribution to the city's or town's historic standards. During one of several walking tours, the attendees visited several locations which displayed great renovation work in their buildings. Several establishments were able to successfully replace all antiquated and/ or faulty electrical and

phone wiring with new, underground wiring. This juxtaposition of the historic with the new streamlined technology allowed for a clutterfree street, and a more enjoyable main street experience. The attendees also participated in a photo contest, which allowed them to look at their surroundings through a different lens. This exercise was geared to helping the participants have a different vision from "what is" to "what can be" in their own main streets. Finally the training ended with more varied discussions on how to take a seemingly community "eyesore" and transform it into a jewel of a town or city's main street. All in all, this event proved that Texas Main Streets are worth the effort to renovate and revitalize! It's good for commerce and community!



### IT'S ALL PART OF THE PLAN

he City of Rio Grande City is working with Texas A&M AgriLife Extension on a Municipal Comprehensive plan that aims at targeting strategic growth, leaving a lasting impact in Rio Grande City for years to come. One may ask, what is a comprehensive plan? It is an official planning document that must be adopted by city ordinance that links existing city plans, regulations, and initiatives. A comprehensive plan becomes the basis for policy and zoning. The first meeting with Team Adelante was held September 21st in the Economic Development conference room. A cocktail of sixteen community members make up Team Adelante.

The planning process has four phases and the city is currently in phase 1-- Visions and Values. The remaining phases are 'Big Ideas, 'Land Use and Development' and 'Recommendations and Presentations'. Each phase of the planning process will have one public meeting, in three separate locations creating three opportunities where community members may participate.

During the first phase of the Comprehensive Plan, three open public meetings are scheduled for the evening of Monday, October 25th at Rio Grande City High School Cafeteria at 5:30 PM, Tuesday, October 26th at South Texas College at 12 PM and the evening of Tuesday, October 26th at Ringgold Elementary Cafeteria at 5:30 PM, tentatively. The public is encouraged to attend and provide insight on community concerns and provide feedback.

In total, there will be 12 general open public meetings covering the four phases. Looking to the future, the next Team Adelante task force meeting is on Tuesday, October 12th.

eing able to use her skills as a future medical professional in her own community is a special privilege for Sayan De Leon. Among those students tasked with assisting with vaccinations for COVID-19 recently at South Texas College's Starr County Campus, De Leon says she has volunteered her time throughout the county to help residents in need.

Born and raised in Rio Grande City, De Leon says she comes from a family of nurses. Her mother is a nurse, which inspired her to pursue a career helping people.
