



FIGHTING FIRES FAST & FURIOUSLY

The Rio Grande City Fire Department's new fire fighting and emergency vehicles are ready to roll.

The Rio Grande City Fire Department recently received its highly anticipated Fire Tanker which was purchased by the City earlier this year, as well as a new 2021 F-550 Super Cab, Skeeter Brush Truck with 400 gallon water tank.

"Our RGC Fire Department & Emergency Management team received a beautiful addition to their fire squad that brings inventory equipment up to standards of our growing population," said Rio Grande City Public Relations Specialist Angelina R. Villarreal.

"We are grateful to provide service to those in need and are prepared to extinguish any fire that stands in the way of public safety," added Villarreal. "Thank you, citizens, Mayor Joel Villarreal and commissioners for making this possible."

On some occasions, a fire engine may be used to transport first responder firefighters, paramedics or EMTs to medical emergencies due to their proximity to the incident.

The standard fire engine transports firefighters to the scene, carries equipment needed by the firefighters for most firefighting scenarios, and may provide a limited supply of water with which to fight the fire.

The tools carried on the fire engine will vary greatly based on many factors including the size of the department and the usual situations the firefighters handle. For example, departments located near large bodies of water or rivers are likely to have some sort of water rescue equipment. Standard tools found on nearly all fire engines include ladders, hydraulic rescue tools (often referred to as the jaws of life), floodlights, fire hose, fire extinguishers, self-contained breathing apparatus, and thermal imaging cameras.

The exact layout of what is carried on an engine is decided by the needs of the department. For example, fire departments located in metropolitan areas will carry equipment to mitigate hazardous materials and effect technical rescues, while departments that operate in the wildland-urban interface will need the gear to deal with brush fires.

Some fire engines have a fixed deluge gun, also known as a master stream, which directs a heavy stream of water to wherever the operator points it. An additional feature of engines are their preconnected hose lines, commonly referred to as preconnects. The preconnects are attached to the engine's onboard water supply and allow firefighters to quickly mount an aggressive attack on the fire as soon as they arrive on scene.

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SWEETS, SAVING WINDSHIELDS

The Rio Grande City Public Utilities Department recently dedicated resources to update its mechanical street sweepers with new industrial bristols.

Newer street sweepers are capable of collecting small particles of debris. Many street sweepers produced today are PM10 and PM2.5 certified, meaning that they are capable of collecting and holding particulate matter sized less than 10µm and even down to 2.5µm. Despite advancements in

street sweeping technology, the mechanical broom type street sweeper accounts for approximately 90 percent of all street sweepers used in the United States today.

The very first street sweeping machine was patented in 1849 by its inventor, C.S. Bishop. For a long time, street sweepers were just rotating disks covered with wire bristles. These rotating disks served as mechanical brooms that swept the dirt on the streets.

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CALL BEFORE YOU RENOVATE

A home renovation is a great way to add value and satisfaction to your beloved abode. After all, who doesn't love stepping into a new room, a finished basement, or a renovated bathroom?

However, before "undertaking any of the character-building, heavylifting labor" The Rio Grande City Planning and Code Enforcement Dept. encourages residents to be sure to always acquire the propter permits.

Unpermitted work refers to any modifications made to the home that should have been permitted but were not.

Aside from a sunken property value, your biggest risk may lie in the job itself. Without the proper

permits, there's no guarantee that your contractors will execute a professional job. The results of this could be disastrous. For instance, if you sell, those substandard improvements might cause you trouble during a home inspection. Another area of concern is that any unpermitted additions may not be covered, and even violate your insurance policy. It is especially concerning if an accident or disaster occurred in that part of your home. If there's been a house fire caused by faulty wiring due to poor electrical work, or if someone fell and seriously injured themselves you could be facing a costly nightmare.

Failing to get permits could

cause the value of your home drop. Why? For starters, real estate information in your local municipality needs to be up to date to help maintain home values and stay current with taxes and insurance. Renovation permits will help ensure that your property

keeps up with the latest health and safety standards.

How To Keep your House Cool, While **Saving on Energy Costs** With temperatures reaching record highs, and energy prices being so unpredictable, here are a few tips to keep your house cooler when the thermometer creeps up and up, and ways to make your A/C use more efficient. Open windows at night. In

places and during times of year where it substantially cools at night (overnight temps in the mid-70s or lower), pop the windows open once the sun goes down. You'll be amazed at how quickly the warm air is replaced with cool, refreshing air.

Better yet, utilize fans (or a whole house fan if you have one) to create tunnels of cool air coming into your home. To get the most out of your efforts with this method. crack a window on the main floor of the house, while widely opening a window on the second floor on the opposite side of the home, with a fan in that one sucking air out. Since heat rises, you'll more quickly get the hot air out and cool air in. Keep blinds closed during the day. Up to 30% of unwanted heat in your home is coming through your windows via the greenhouse effect - sunlight and heat enter, but cannot escape. The remedy is to keep your blinds closed during the day; if this makes your home feel too much like a cave, focus especially on west- and south-facing windows. Doing this can actually

lower the mid-day temperature of your home by almost 20 degrees.

To make this action even more efficient, get light-colored blinds that will reflect rather than absorb the sun's heat, and open them again at night when it's cool. You can even place cardboard in the windows to further block heat from entering.

Your appliances may also be making your house warmer. The obvious is the oven, but all appliances throw off a lot of heat when running. Below are tips that will mitigate their heat output.

Do chores at night. Laundry machines throw off a lot of heat. The washer is running hot water, and driers are obviously using heated air which inevitably escapes and radiates out from the machine. Now, you can't get away with not doing laundry (hopefully), but you can ensure it's not heating your home during the hottest parts of the day. Do your laundry loads at night to keep things cooler. Also, regularly clean the dryer vent for a quicker cycle.

home. So what's one to do? Dust off the grill and get comfortable with it! You can grill many of the things you'd be making in an oven or on the stovetop — meat, pizza, veggies, fish, and even desserts like cobbler!

If you do use the stove, make sure to turn the fan on, especially if it vents to the exterior. If it just recirculates the air, it won't cool things much, but it will at least improve airflow.

Keep the furnace fan on. Most thermostats allow you to manually turn the fan on that blows hot air through your home in the winter. In the summer, that fan can be run on its own to circulate and more evenly distribute the cooler air from the basement or main level. It also acts as another way to keep the air flowing and moving, which makes you feel cooler. Change your AC filters regularly. Every 4-6 weeks, especially during the months of heaviest use, change out your air filters if you have an air conditioner (check them more frequently if you're running the furnace fan). A dirty filter not only reduces air quality, but also efficiency of airflow. Know your filter size, and always have a few on hand.



Your dishwasher also puts out a lot of heat. Like with laundry, run it at night to minimize the heating effect. If you have a quiet model, start it before you go to bed and you'll wake up with clean dishes! Skip the oven/stove; grill more. Any usage of the oven or even the stove-top is going to heat your
