Dear Salem Neighbors,

I hope all is well with you and your family. Summer is quickly approaching and I am sure many of you are looking forward to it as much as I am. Hopefully we will have a beautiful Michigan summer here in Salem that we all can enjoy.

Often in the springtime, we receive many phone calls asking about our local road maintenance and upgrades. I like to take this opportunity to update you now. The Board of Trustees voted to fund many projects that were presented by the Washtenaw County Road Commission.

We have work planned for Chubb Rd (6 Mile Rd to 8 Mile Rd) and Brookville Rd (Curtis to Salem). These improvements include tree cutting, roadside berm removal, ditching and shaping the existing surface with six inches of limestone. Also, on Old North Territorial they will be completing a ditch draining project. Lastly, to address dust control, grading and brining will be applied to our gravel roads. Our goal in the next three years is to have all our local roads updated.

Washtenaw County Road Commission has begun repaving some of our major roads this year. They include 6 Mile Rd, between Angle and Currie and 8 Mile Rd, between Currie and Tower. They have also begun chip sealing 7 Mile Rd, between Angle and Napier.

Many of you have expressed frustration with the closed culverts on Currie and Chubb and I completely agree that these road closures have been a major inconvenience. I am happy to report that the repair on Chubb Rd between 6 Mile Rd and 7 Mile Rd is complete and open for traffic. The Currie Rd culvert repair is slated for July. I appreciate your patience with these projects.

We are currently working with Washtenaw County Road Commission to iron out a plan to re-pave Currie Rd from 6 Mile Rd to 8 Mile Rd this year, We will keep you posted on our progress planning this project.

The Washtenaw County Road Commission has launched "WCRC Fix It" an online platform that allows residents to report non-emergency

issues online at <u>wcroads.org/report</u>. Using the website, residents will identify where a road issue is located on a map, answer a few brief questions and submit the issue to the Road Commission. Citizens will be able to track their service requests and will be notified when the issue is resolved.

Lastly, please set aside June 3rd for our annual Flag Day festivities. The Salem Community Events volunteers always do an amazing job providing a fun filled day for our residents. Thanks to all the businesses and individuals who donate financially to make this event possible. The parade will start at 11:00 am with food and activities. Live music will begin at Salem Elementary at 7:00 pm, provided by the Flat Rockers. The day will end with a spectacular fireworks display at Salem Elementary, beginning at dusk, Flag Day is a great way to kick off the summer and come together as a community. I look forward to seeing you there.

In closing, I wish you and your families a wonderful summer season. Always feel free to contact any of our board members using our township email addresses provided on the back of this newsletter. We would love to have you join us for our monthly board meetings which are the 2nd Tuesday of every month at 7:00 pm. CLERK'S COMMENTARY: FROM THE DESK OF DEL WENSLEY

ANN ARBOR, MI - Aging Ann Arbor Public Schools buildings will be restored in the coming years after voters approved a tax increase on Tuesday, May 2 to raise \$200 million for the school district. AAPS' 2.5-mill, 10-year sinking fund proposal received the support of 70 percent of voters in Tuesday's special election, according to <u>unofficial results</u> from the Washtenaw County elections division. The proposal passed 9,566 to 4,008, with 10-percent voter turnout within the school district.

What is the Michigan Township Association?

The MTA Represents **1,240** local units of government that govern over 96% of Michigan's land area, in which over **58**% of Michigan's property values are located. Townships provide essential services to over **51**% of Michigan's citizens, and deliver the best value for local services.

Salem Township Functions:

State laws authorize Michigan townships to perform a wide variety of functions in two important categories: Mandated and Permissive.

Mandated Functions:

Mandated functions are activities that townships are required to perform. The three broadest mandated responsibilities are assessment administration, elections administration and tax collection, which are legally assigned functions of the supervisor, clerk and treasurer, respectively. In addition to these broad mandates, there are other, more narrow state requirements. Procedures for the township's financial administration, such as budgets, accounting, investments and deposits, are closely regulated by the state.

Permissive Functions

Beyond the mandated functions, Michigan townships are authorized to provide a wide variety of services that are generally expected from general purpose governmental entities. Virtually all townships provide fire protection and many also offer law enforcement as well. Parks and recreation programs, public water and sewer services, trash collection and recycling programs, sidewalks and trails, and cemeteries are other common township functions.

Townships have broad powers to enact and enforce ordinances. Zoning ordinances regulate land use, while many other "police power," non-zoning ordinances control activities that protect the health, safety and general welfare of the community.



TREASURER'S UPDATE: FROM THE DESK OF DALE CONVERSE


The Supervisor's article outlined the road projects that will be accomplished this year. The Executive officers did not allocate funding for the extra road projects as we were not aware of the needs at that time. We will have to amend the 2017 budget, but will also have to include funding for the culvert replacement that was approved in 2016. It is expected that the total amount of all the road projects that the Township is obligated to fund this year may exceed the total revenue we receive. If that situation exists, we have the Michigan CLASS account that currently has in excess of \$731,000 so that we should not have to draw on our investments.

The Road Commission only uses brine to control dust and stabilize the gravel surface as the cost of calcium chloride is three time the cost of brine. Last summer the brine was not effective in controlling the dust due to the lack of rain to activate the brine and mixed with the finer particles of the freshly grated surfaces. Salem Township was not alone as all Townships experienced the same dust complaints. Hopefully we will get the proper amount of rain this year after scraping and brine application to reduce the amount of dust.

Residents should be aware of issues and timing of the Township roads. We revised our web site and included the information we received from the Road Commission. We will update the site when we become aware of the timing when the projects will be completed.

The 2017 tax season is nearly here. This year we can expect a 0.9 % increase in our taxes due to the State CPI (consumer price index). The increase will be valid for all properties where there are no improvements or change of ownership.

CONSUMER ALERT: 'CAN YOU HEAR ME' SCAMS

The consumer's "Yes" response and thus obtains a voice signature. This signature can later be used by the scammers to pretend to be the consumer and authorize fraudulent charges via telephone. If you receive this type of call, immediately hang up. If you have already responded to this type of call, review all of your statements such as those from your bank, credit card lender, or Telephone Company for unauthorized charges. If you notice unauthorized charges on these and other types of statements, you have likely been a victim of "cramming".



Anyone who believes they have been targeted by this scam should immediately report the incident to their local enforcement agency, the Better Business Bureau's Scam Tracker and to the FCC Consumer Help Center. Consumers should always be on alert for telephone scams. The following tips can help ward off unwanted calls and scams **Phone Fraudsters Recording Consumers' Voice Responses:**

The Washtenaw County Sheriffs Office is alerting consumers to be on the lookout for scam callers seeking to get victims to say the word "yes" during a call and later use a recording of the response to authorize unwanted charges on the victim's utility or credit card account. According to complaints the FCC has received and public news reports, the fraudulent callers impersonate representatives from organizations that provide a service and may be familiar to the person receiving the call, such as a mortgage lender or utility, to establish a legitimate reason for trying to reach the consumer.

The scam begins when a consumer answers a call and the person at the end of the line asks, "Can you hear me?" The caller then records:


- Don't answer calls from unknown numbers. Let them go to voicemail.
- If you answer and the caller (often a recording) asks you to hit a button to stop receiving calls, just hang up. Stammers often use these tricks to identify, and then target, live respondents.
- If you receive a scam call, write down the number and file a complaint with the FCC so we can help identify and take appropriate action to help consumers targeted by illegal callers.
- Ask your phone service provider if it offers a robocall blocking service. If not, encourage your provider to offer one. You can also visit the FCC's website for information and resources on available robocall blocking tools to help reduce unwanted calls.

Blue Cheese Potato Salad

From the desk, or I should say kitchen of our Assessor, Bill Gunther.

Ingredients

- 5 lbs. Yukon Gold Potatoes
- 1 lb. Green Beans cut into 1' pieces
- 4 oz. Cream Cheese softened
- 1 8 oz. Bottle of Chunky Blue Cheese Dressing
- 1 ½ Cup Mayonnaise
- ½ tsp. Salt & ½ tsp. Pepper
- 1 med. Red Onion diced
- 3 cloves Garlic minced

Directions

- 1. Peel and cut potatoes to size (approx. ½"cubes).
- 2. Boil potatoes for 10 min. or to desired tenderness and rinse in cold water
- 3. Boil beans for 5 min. or to desired tenderness and rinse in cold water
- 4. Stir together Mayo, Cream Cheese, Dressing, and Salt & Pepper
- 5. Put Potatoes, Beans, Onion & Garlic in large bowl, then add Mayo mixture
- 6. Refrigerate until ready to serve
- 7. Garnish with fresh dill

LAND PRESERVATION AND CONSERVATION BOARD UPDATE

The Land Preservation and Conservation Board (LPCB) and the Board of Trustees (BOT) along with the Salem Township Planner held a joint meeting on January 17, 2017 to work on the future direction of land preservation in Salem.

The importance of "Keeping Salem a rural Community" was discussed and agreed upon. The BOT are willing to go after funding resources available to the Township through government agencies, reestablishing relationships and working with them. Also, they have funded the LPCB for operational expenditures.

At the regular March meeting, the LPCB had representatives from the Ann Arbor Greenbelt; Huron River Watershed Council; Land Legacy Conservancy; Southeast Michigan Land Conservancy and Washtenaw County Parks and Recreation Commission to discuss strategies for enhancing land preservation and funding opportunities in Salem Township and establishing a collaboration.
