Dear Salem Neighbors,

I hope you and your loved ones are having a great start to 2019! I must say, I am happy to be writing this letter for the Spring Newsletter! I am looking forward to a long-awaited Michigan Spring. With the heavy storms this year, it has been so nice hear about many of you reaching out to help out others. It is always encouraging to see Salem residents looking out for each other. Below are a few updates on happenings in Salem Township.

Chubb Rd and Five-Mile Paving Project.

At our January 8, 2019 board meeting the Washtenaw County Road Commission made a presentation to the Salem Township Board. They summarized the timeline of both projects that will run simultaneously. The tree removal process will begin in February and should end before March 31. The right of way acquisition plan will continue from March through April. The utility and culvert relocation portion, along with the railroad crossing redevelopment will begin in April and end in May. The final road construction and paving will commence in June and should wrap up by October 31. The total cost of this paving project is estimated at \$4 million. I would like to sincerely thank Advanced Disposal for their commitment of \$1 million towards the road project. Project will be funded as laid out below:

- \$1.3 Million from Salem Township
- \$1.0 Million from Advanced disposal

Balance to be paid by property owners on Chubb Rd and 5 Mile, with a special assessment.

Urban services district (USD)

At the end of last year, Salem Township heard from multiple media sources that we will be receiving another \$10 million Infrastructure Grant from the MEDC. This would bring the total grant money to \$20 million. As of today, the Township has received \$5 million from the first grant and has spent approximate \$900,000 of the grant money on engineering. It is important to note; these grants have been requested by the developer, not requested by the Township. We will keep you posted on the second grant as the information becomes available.

New Fire Truck Bid Acceptance

In December, after twelve months of discussions regarding the bid specifications and bid selection processes, the Board of Trustees accepted a bid for a new fire truck in the amount of \$566,548.00. The whole process should take approximately one year to complete.

Make sure you put our 40th Flag Day celebration on your calendars for Saturday, June 1st. It happens to fall on the first day of June and I would hate to have you miss it if you didn't hear about it in time. It is one of my favorite days of the year here in Salem, when we can all come together and have a great time. The volunteers of Salem Community Events go above and beyond every year to make sure the festivities are fun for all. I would love to see you there!

In closing, remember our Board of Trustees meetings are posted on the front page of our website for you to view at your convenience. We would love to have you join us in person at our meetings for information, refreshments and socializing with your neighbors.

As always, please feel free to reach out to me anytime you have questions or concerns. It has been my pleasure to hear from many of you in the past and I look forward to hearing from you again.

CLERK'S COMMENTARY: FROM THE DESK OF DEL WENSLEY

Legislative Update: Proposal 3

As you may have heard, Proposal 3 implementation bills became law. In December, Governor Snyder signed PAs 603-607 into law, streamlining voter registration and absentee voting. These new laws provide clarity on Proposal 3. These include automatic voter registration, registration by mail up to 15 days before an election, in-person registration extended to Election Day with proof of residency, and no reason absentee voting and statewide audit of election results.

Other new laws include:

PA 523 of 2018 – Prevents mysterious FOIA requests.

PAs 634-636 – Fireworks will now be limited to 12 days a year.

PA 533 of 2018 - Agricultural truck loads are exempt from truck route restrictions.

PAs 653- 654 of 2018 - Allows candidates for township office to either pay a filing fee or submit a nominating petition.

PA 631 of 2018 - Changes how the MDEQ defines inland lakes, streams and wetlands.


PA 660 of 2018 Property Tax Assessment reforms will require better accountability from township officials.

TREASURER'S UPDATE: FROM THE DESK OF DALE CONVERSE

I hope you were able to keep safe and warm during the cold spell and icy road conditions we experienced this winter. The Township received many calls and unfortunately had to refer the callers to contact the Washtenaw County Road Commission. Unfortunately, they were overwhelmed and were not able to treat our local roads until the following day.

The Treasurer's office has been informed that United Way of Washtenaw County will be offering free tax preparation services through their volunteer Income Tax Assistance Program and MyFreeTax.com for low income, all ages. For more information and to schedule an appointment visit uwgive.org/freetaxhelp or call (734) 677-7235. The Township office also has a list of other organizations that are offering free tax services for low income, all ages. The Township office was appraised that the 2020 United States Census is starting to be ramped up. We were informed that the Township's role will be to begin solicitating workers for office and in-field positions so that everyone will be counted. This year the Complete Count Committees will be opening field offices and develop a strategy and work plan. Next year the actual census will be completed. There are many full and part time positions available, most of which can be worked from your home. Training and I-Pads will be furnished. WASHTENAW COUNTY SHERIFF'S DEPARTMENT FROM THE DESK OF LIEUTENANT KEITH FLORES

We would like you to be aware of some phone scams we have seen lately. An informed public is less likely to be taken advantage of by scammers. Here are a few of the more frequent scams we are seeing:

- Victims receive a call from someone claiming to be with the Washtenaw County Sheriff's Office.
- Scammer leaves a message telling the victim that they have an issue that needs to be taken care of.
- Victims call back to a number that is set up to mimic our official phone service voicemail. After selecting the appropriate option, they are connected to a real person.
- From here there are several variations
 - The scammer informs them that they have missed jury duty and now have a warrant. In order to clear the warrant, they are told that they need to get a money card and call back. Upon calling back they are instructed to give the money card number and the scammers then have access to the funds. Two of the four have had this happen and it sounds like a 3rd may have had this same scam just today.
 - The other variation is that a grandparent is told that their grandchild is in jail and needs bond money. To do so the victim is asked to get a money card and call back and the same thing happens with the card numbers. One of ours had this happen to them.

Phone scams are nothing new. The voice mail system sounds very official and may cause lots of confusion. However, the Sheriff's Office would never call demanding money. An informed public is less likely to be taken advantage of by scammers. If something doesn't sound right, trust your gut and make a call to report it. If this occurs in your area, please call 911 to report the incident.

The next installment in our exploration of the early hamlets of Salem Township leads us to Riders. Riders was located near the intersections of Seven Mile, Angle, and Tower Roads. It is most famously now known as the location of the Salem-Walker Church and Cemetery. To stroll through the cemetery, you will see the tombstones dedicated to the members of the Rider and Walker families. Unfortunately, the hamlet never appears to have had any businesses, just farmsteads surrounding their local church and burial grounds. This lack of commercial activity probably lead to the hamlets eventual demise.

Grilled Avocado Salsa Chicken

Ingredients

- 1 cup balsamic vinegar
- ³/₄ cup honey
- 3 cloves garlic, minced
- 3 tablespoons olive oil
- 3 teaspoons Italian seasoning
- ¹/₂ teaspoon salt
- ¼ teaspoon pepper

- 6 boneless skinless chicken breasts
- 6 slices mozzarella cheese
- 3 avocados, diced
- 4 roma tomatoes, diced (any tomato will work)
- ¹/₂ cup fresh chopped basil
- salt and pepper
- balsamic vinegar for drizzling (optional)

Directions

- 1. In a medium mixing bowl, whisk the balsamic vinegar, honey, garlic, olive oil, Italian seasoning, and salt & pepper. Add the chicken breasts and coat. Marinate for at least one hour.
- 2. In a small mixing bowl, add avocado, tomato, basil and salt and pepper to taste. Set aside.
- 3. Heat the grill to medium high heat. Grill the chicken on each side about 6 minutes or until cooked throughout and not pink in center. Top with mozzarella cheese and avocado, tomato & basil mixture. Drizzle with balsamic vinegar and serve immediately.
