NEW BUSINESS

Resolution SA-2016-003 – Approving the Successor Agency's Issuance of Refunding Bonds in Order to Refund Certain Outstanding Bonds of the Dissolved Redevelopment Agency of the City of Santa Fe Springs, Approving the Execution and Delivery of an Indenture of Trust Relating Thereto, Requesting Oversight Board Approval of the Issuance of the Refunding Bonds, Requesting Certain Determinations by the Oversight Board, and Providing for Other Matters Properly Relating Thereto

RECOMMENDATION

That the Successor Agency adopt Resolution No. SA-2016-003 approving and authorizing official actions and execution of documents related thereto.

BACKGROUND

The Successor Agency to the Santa Fe Springs Community Development Commission (the "Successor Agency") has assumed responsibility for repayment of all the outstanding bonds from the former Community Development Commission. Per Assembly Bill (AB) 1484, the Successor Agency may refund existing bonds, with approval of the Oversight Board and the State Department of Finance, for the purpose of creating debt service savings.

Prior to dissolution, the Santa Fe Springs Community Development Commission issued the following tax allocation bonds (the "Outstanding Bonds"):

- In 2001, \$28,845,000 of Series A Bonds (the "2001A Bonds"), of which \$13,695,000 is currently outstanding;
- In 2002, \$50,915,000 of Series A Bonds (the "2002A Bonds"), of which \$5,150,000 is currently outstanding;
- In 2003, \$6,530,000 of Series A Housing Taxable Revenue Bonds (the "2003A Bonds"), of which \$2,775,000 is currently outstanding;
- In 2006, \$4,710,000 of Series A Current Interest Bonds (the "2006A CIBs"), of which \$2,875,000 is currently outstanding;
- In 2006, \$22,948,493 of Series A Capital Appreciation Bonds (the "2006A CABs"), of which \$22,948,493 is currently outstanding;
- In 2006, \$18,760,000 of Series B Current Interest Bonds (the "2006B Bonds"), of which \$7,085,000 is currently outstanding; and
- In 2007, \$43,015,000 of Series A Bonds (the "2007A Bonds"), of which \$33,395,000 is currently outstanding.

With current municipal bond interest rates at historic lows, an opportunity exists to refund eligible outstanding bonds with lower interest bonds and realize future year savings. Of the above-listed bonds, the 2001A Bonds, 2002A Bonds, 2003A Bonds, 2006A CIBs, and the 2006B Bonds (the "Refunded Bonds") are eligible to be refunded

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with new tax allocation bonds (Proposed "2016 Bonds") in a principal amount not to exceed \$31.8 million, resulting in future year debt service savings of approximately \$3.23 million (or a present value savings of \$2.9 million based on current market conditions and rates at roughly 2.5% for this type of bond issue). The final repayment or maturity date (2024) of the Refunded Bonds would be matched by the 2016 Bonds. Certainly, the final savings depend upon market interest rates at the time the 2016 Bonds are priced.

Estimated annual savings amounts would be allocated to enforceable obligations, administrative costs and/or split among the various taxing entities, including the county, school districts, and the City's General Fund. It is important to note that the City's anticipated portion of the savings is very modest, totaling about \$225,000 or \$25,000 per year through 2024. This is consistent with the City's relatively low property tax share of seven percent (7%).

In addition to the projected savings benefits, the proposed bonds would provide an additional benefit of value. If issued as taxable bond securities (as opposed to taxexempt bonds), they would allow for more time flexibility in the expenditure of currently available bond proceeds that the City has earmarked for Capital Improvement Projects (CIPs).

The 2001A, 2002A, and 2003A Bonds are all currently callable (eligible for refunding) on any date with no premium to be paid. The 2006A CIBs and 2006B Bonds are eligible to be called on September 1, 2016, also with no premium. The 2006A CABs are non-

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callable (not eligible for refunding) and the 2007A Bonds cannot be refinanced until 2017.

At the time of this writing, the City Council Finance Subcommittee (consisting of Mayor Moore and Councilmember Sarno) are scheduled to convene prior to the City Council meeting to review the proposed refunding and make a recommendation to the City Council.

If approved this evening, this item will be presented to the Oversight Board at their meeting on April 20, 2016. Subsequently, if the board approves the refunding the item will be submitted to the State Department of Finance for final approval. Based on a preliminary schedule, it is anticipated that the Proposed 2016 Bonds would close by the third week of July 2016, at which time a redemption notice would be issued to fully redeem the refunded bonds.

The Successor Agency's financing team of Urban Futures, Inc. as municipal advisor and fiscal consultants, Jones Hall, a Professional Corporation, as bond and disclosure counsel, Stifel, Nicolaus & Company, Incorporated, as bond underwriter, and US Bank National Association, as trustee, are proposed. The related fees for all firms are entirely contingent upon a completion of the financing.

Documents to be Approved

Approval of the Resolution approving, authorizing and directing execution of certain tax allocation documents, authorizing and directing the sale of the 2016 Bonds, and requesting Oversight Board approval of the issuance and directing certain actions with respect thereto will authorize the execution of the following documents which are not included with the document due to their length, but are available for review in the City Clerk's Office:

- Indenture of Trust This document contains the terms of the Bonds, including payment and redemption provisions, definition and pledge of Special Tax Revenues to pay the 2016 Bonds, Rights and Duties of the Trustee, remedies upon a default in the payment of the 2016 Bonds, and final discharge of the 2016 Bonds and other related matters.
- **Escrow Deposit and Trust Agreement** This document contains the obligation of the underwriter to accept and pay for the 2016 Bonds, provided that all of the covenants and representations of the Successor Agency are met and certain other conditions excusing performance by the underwriter do not exist.

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FISCAL IMPACT

The Proposed 2016 Bonds will generate an estimated total debt service savings of \$3.23 million, net of all costs of issuance. The term of the 2016 Bonds will not exceed the existing term of the Refunded Bonds, and overall debt service will be reduced in each year until 2024, when the 2016 Bonds will be completely repaid.

The source of repayment of the 2016 Bonds would not change and continue to be limited to tax revenues deposited by the County into the Successor Agency's Redevelopment Property Tax Trust Fund.

If approved, the 2016 Bonds will not be a debt of the City, but a special limited obligation of the Successor Agency in the same manner as the existing bonds. Related costs of the Successor Agency will either be recovered through the 2016 Bond Proceeds if issued, or if not, through the annual Recognized Obligation Payments Schedule (ROPS) process.

RESOLUTION NO. SA-2016-003

A RESOLUTION OF THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF SANTA FE SPRINGS, ACTING AS THE SUCCESSOR AGENCY TO THE COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT COMMISSION OF THE CITY OF SANTA FE SPRINGS, APPROVING THE ISSUANCE OF BONDS IN ORDER TO REFUND CERTAIN OUTSTANDING BONDS OF THE FORMER COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT COMMISSION OF THE CITY OF SANTA FE SPRINGS, APPROVING THE EXECUTION AND DELIVERY OF AN INDENTURE OF TRUST AND AN ESCROW AGREEMENT, AND PROVIDING FOR OTHER MATTERS PROPERLY RELATING THERETO

WHEREAS, pursuant to Section 34172(a) of the California Health and Safety Code (unless otherwise noted, all Section references hereinafter being to such Code), the Community Development Commission of the City of Santa Fe Springs (the "Former Agency") has been dissolved and no longer exists as a public body, corporate and politic, and pursuant to Section 34173, the Successor Agency to the Community Development Commission of the City of Santa Fe Springs (the "Successor Agency") has become the successor entity to the Former Agency;

WHEREAS, prior to dissolution of the Former Agency, for the purpose of financing redevelopment activities of the Former Agency, the Former Agency issued the following outstanding series of bonds (the "Outstanding Bonds"):

- (i) \$28,845,000 initial principal amount Community Development Commission of the City of Santa Fe Springs Consolidated Redevelopment Project Tax Allocation Bonds, 2001 Series A (the "2001 Bonds"), issued pursuant to the Indenture of Trust, dated as of February 1, 1992 (the "Master Indenture"), by and between the Agency and U.S. Bank National Association, as successor trustee, as supplemented and amended by a Third Supplement to Indenture of Trust, dated as of July 1, 2001 (the "Third Supplement");
- (ii) \$50,915,000 initial principal amount Community Development Commission of the City of Santa Fe Springs Consolidated Redevelopment Project Tax Allocation Refunding Bonds, 2002 Series A (the "2002 Bonds") issued pursuant to the Master Indenture and a Fourth Supplement to Indenture of Trust, dated as of June 1, 2002 (the "Fourth Supplement");
- (iii) \$6,530,000 Community Development Commission of the City of Santa Fe Springs Consolidated Redevelopment Project Taxable Tax Allocation Refunding Bonds, 2003 Series A (Housing Tax Revenues) (the "2003 Bonds") issued pursuant to an Indenture of Trust, dated as of December 1, 1993, as supplemented by a Second Supplement to Indenture of Trust, dated as of July 1, 2003 (the "Housing Indenture");

- (iv) \$27,658,493.15 Community Development Commission of the City of Santa Fe Springs Consolidated Redevelopment Project Tax Allocation Bonds, 2006 Series A (the "2006A Bonds"), issued pursuant to the Master Indenture and a Fifth Supplement to Indenture of Trust, dated as of August 1, 2006 (the "Fifth Supplement"), a portion of which were issued as current interest bonds (the "2006A Current Interest Bonds") and a portion of which were issued as capital appreciation bonds (the "2006A Capital Appreciation Bonds");
- (v) \$18,760,000 Community Development Commission of the City of Santa Fe Springs Consolidated Redevelopment Project Taxable Tax Allocation Bonds, 2006 Series B (the "2006B Bonds"), issued pursuant to the Master Indenture and a Sixth Supplement to Indenture of Trust, dated as of August 1, 2006 (the "Sixth Supplement"); and
- (vi) \$43,015,000 Community Development Commission of the City of Santa Fe Springs Consolidated Redevelopment Project Tax Allocation Refunding Bonds, 2007 Series A ("2007 Bonds), issued pursuant to the Master Indenture and a Seventh Supplement to Indenture of Trust, dated as of June 1, 2007 (the "Seventh Supplement");

WHEREAS, Section 34177.5 authorizes the Successor Agency to issue refunding bonds pursuant to Article 11 (commencing with Section 53580) of Chapter 3 of Part 1 of Division 2 of Title 5 of the Government Code (the "Refunding Law") for the purpose of achieving debt service savings within the parameters set forth in Section 34177.5(a)(1) (the "Savings Parameters");

WHEREAS, the Successor Agency wishes to refund the 2001 Bonds, the 2002 Bonds, the 2006 Bonds, the 2006 Bonds (the "Refunded Outstanding Bonds"); and

WHEREAS, to determine compliance with the Savings Parameters for purposes of the issuance of the Successor Agency to the Community Development Commission of the City of Santa Fe Springs 2016 Subordinate Tax Allocation Refunding Bonds (Federally Taxable) (the "Refunding Bonds"), the Successor Agency has caused its municipal advisor, Urban Futures, Inc. (the "Municipal Advisor"), to prepare an analysis of the potential savings that will accrue to the Successor Agency and to applicable taxing entities as a result of the use of the proceeds of the Refunding Bonds to refund the Refunded Outstanding Bonds (the "Debt Service Savings Analysis");

WHEREAS, the Successor Agency desires at this time to approve the issuance of the Refunding Bonds and to approve the form of and authorize the execution and delivery of the Indenture of Trust providing for the issuance of the Refunding Bonds, which will be between the Successor Agency and U.S. Bank National Association, as trustee (the "Indenture"), and an Escrow Deposit and Trust Agreement, by and between

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the Successor Agency and U.S. Bank National Association, as escrow agent (the "Escrow Agreement");

WHEREAS, the Successor Agency has determined to sell the Refunding Bonds to Stifel, Nicolaus & Company, Incorporated (the "Underwriter");

WHEREAS, pursuant to Section 34179 of the Dissolution Act, an oversight board (the "Oversight Board") has been established for the Successor Agency;

WHEREAS, the Successor Agency wishes to request that the Oversight Board approve and direct the issuance of the Refunding Bonds pursuant to this Resolution and the Indenture:

WHEREAS, the Successor Agency further wishes to request that the Oversight Board make certain determinations described below on which the Successor Agency will rely in undertaking the refunding proceedings and the issuance of the Refunding Bonds;

WHEREAS, following approval by the Oversight Board of the issuance of the Refunding Bonds by the Successor Agency and upon submission of the Oversight Board Resolution to the California Department of Finance, the Successor Agency will, with the assistance of its Disclosure Counsel (defined below) and the Municipal Advisor, cause to be prepared a form of Official Statement describing the Refunding Bonds and containing material information relating to the Successor Agency and the Refunding Bonds, the preliminary form of which will be submitted to the Successor Agency for approval for distribution by the Underwriter to persons and institutions interested in purchasing the Refunding Bonds;

THE CITY COUNCIL ACTING AS SUCCESSOR AGENCY HEREBY RESOLVES AS FOLLOWS:

SECTION 1. <u>Determination of Savings</u>. The Successor Agency hereby determines that there are significant potential savings available to the Successor Agency and to applicable taxing entities in compliance with the Savings Parameters by the issuance by the Successor Agency of the Refunding Bonds to provide funds to refund and defease the Refunded Outstanding Bonds, all as evidenced by the Debt Service Savings Analysis on file with the Successor Agency, which Debt Service Savings Analysis is hereby approved.

SECTION 2. <u>Approval of Issuance of the Refunding Bonds</u>. The Successor Agency hereby authorizes and approves the issuance of the Refunding Bonds under the Law and the Refunding Law in the aggregate principal amount of not to exceed \$31,800,000, provided that the Refunding Bonds are in compliance with the Savings Parameters at the time of sale and delivery.

SECTION 3. Approval of Indenture. The Successor Agency hereby approves the Indenture prescribing the terms and provisions of the Refunding Bonds and the application of the proceeds of the Refunding Bonds. Each of the Mayor of the City of Santa Fe Springs, as Chair of the Successor Agency, the City Manager of the City of Santa Fe Springs, as the chief administrative officer of the Successor Agency, the Finance Director, as the chief financial officer of the Successor Agency, the City Attorney of the City, as the general counsel of the Successor Agency, or the written designee of any such officer (each, an "Authorized Officer"), is hereby authorized and directed to execute and deliver, and the Secretary of the Successor Agency is hereby authorized and directed to attest to, the Indenture for and in the name and on behalf of the Successor Agency, in substantially the form on file with the Successor Agency, with such changes therein, deletions therefrom and additions thereto as the Authorized Officer executing the same shall approve, such approval to be conclusively evidenced by the execution and delivery of the Indenture. The Successor Agency hereby authorizes the delivery and performance of the Indenture.

SECTION 4. <u>Approval of Escrow Agreement</u>. The form of the Escrow Agreement on file with the Successor Agency is hereby approved and the Authorized Officers are, each acting alone, hereby authorized and directed, for and in the name and on behalf of the Successor Agency, to execute and deliver the Escrow Agreement. The Successor Agency hereby authorizes the delivery and performance of its obligations under the Escrow Agreement.

SECTION 5. Oversight Board Approval of the Issuance of the Bonds. The Successor Agency hereby requests that the Oversight Board, as authorized by Section 34177.5(f) and Section 34180 of the Dissolution Act, approve and direct the issuance of the Refunding Bonds pursuant to Section 34177.5(a)(1) and this Resolution and the Indenture.

SECTION 6. <u>Determinations by the Oversight Board</u>. The Successor Agency requests that the Oversight Board make the following determinations upon which the Successor Agency will rely in undertaking the refunding proceedings and the issuance of the Refunding Bonds:

- (a) The Successor Agency is authorized, as provided in Section 34177.5(f), to recover its costs related to the issuance of the Refunding Bonds from the proceeds of the Refunding Bonds, including the cost of reimbursing the City for administrative staff time spent with respect to the authorization, issuance, sale and delivery of the Refunding Bonds;
- (b) The application of proceeds of the Refunding Bonds by the Successor Agency to the refunding and defeasance of all or a portion of the Refunded Outstanding Bonds, as well as the payment by the Successor Agency of costs of issuance of the Refunding Bonds, as provided in Section 34177.5(a), shall be implemented by the Successor Agency promptly upon sale and delivery of the Refunding Bonds,

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notwithstanding Section 34177.3 or any other provision of law to the contrary, without the approval of the Oversight Board, the California Department of Finance, the Los Angeles County Auditor-Controller or any other person or entity other than the Successor Agency;

(c) The Successor Agency shall be entitled to receive its full Administrative Cost Allowance under Section 34181(a)(3) without any deductions with respect to continuing costs related to the Refunding Bonds, such as trustee's fees, auditing and fiscal consultant fees and continuing disclosure and rating agency costs (collectively, "Continuing Costs of Issuance"), and such Continuing Costs of Issuance shall be payable from property tax revenues pursuant to Section 34183. In addition and as provided by Section 34177.5(f), if the Successor Agency is unable to complete the issuance of the Refunding Bonds for any reason, the Successor Agency shall, nevertheless, be entitled to recover its costs incurred with respect to the refunding proceedings from such property tax revenues pursuant to Section 34183 without reduction in its Administrative Cost Allowance.

SECTION 7. Filing of Debt Service Savings Analysis and Resolution. The Secretary of the Successor Agency is hereby authorized and directed to file the Debt Service Savings Analysis, together with a certified copy of this Resolution, with the Oversight Board, and, as provided in Section 34180(j), with the Los Angeles County Administrative Officer, the Los Angeles County Auditor-Controller and the California Department of Finance.

SECTION 8. <u>Sale of Refunding Bonds</u>. The Successor Agency hereby approves the sale of the Refunding Bonds by the Successor Agency to the Underwriter pursuant to the terms of a bond purchase agreement (the "Purchase Contract") to be entered into with the Underwriter. Following approval by the Oversight Board of the issuance of the Refunding Bonds by the Successor Agency and upon submission of the Oversight Board Resolution to the California Department of Finance, the Successor Agency will, with the assistance its Bond Counsel and the Municipal Advisor, work with the Underwriter to prepare a form of the Purchase Contract, the preliminary form of which will be submitted to the Successor Agency for approval. The Underwriter's discount (not including original issue discount) may not exceed 1.00% of the principal amount of the Refunding Bonds.

SECTION 9. <u>Issuance of Refunding Bonds in Whole or in Part</u>. It is the intent of the Successor Agency to sell and deliver the Refunding Bonds in whole, provided that there is compliance with the Savings Parameters. However, the Successor Agency will initially authorize the sale and delivery of the Refunding Bonds in whole or, if such Savings Parameters cannot be met with respect to the whole, then in part; provided that the Refunding Bonds so sold and delivered in part are in compliance with the Savings Parameters. The sale and delivery of the Refunding Bonds in part will in each instance provide sufficient funds only for the refunding of that portion of the Refunded Outstanding Bonds that meet the Savings Parameters. In the event the Refunding Bonds are initially sold in part, the Successor Agency intends to sell and deliver additional parts of the Refunding Bonds without the further approval of the Successor Agency or the Oversight

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Board, provided that in each such instance the Refunding Bonds so sold and delivered in part are in compliance with the Savings Parameters.

SECTION 10. <u>Municipal Bond Insurance and Reserve Fund Insurance Policy</u>. The Authorized Officers, each acting alone, are hereby authorized and directed to take all actions necessary to obtain a municipal bond insurance policy for the Refunding Bonds and a debt service reserve fund insurance policy for the Refunding Bonds from a municipal bond insurance company if it is determined, upon consultation with the Municipal Advisor and the Underwriter, that such municipal bond insurance policy and/or debt service reserve fund insurance policy will reduce the true interest costs with respect to the Refunding Bonds.

SECTION 11. Approval of Official Statement. Following approval by the Oversight Board of the issuance of the Refunding Bonds by the Successor Agency and upon submission of the Oversight Board Resolution to the California Department of Finance, the Successor Agency will, with the assistance its Disclosure Counsel and the Municipal Advisor, cause to be prepared a form of Official Statement describing the Refunding Bonds and containing material information relating to the Successor Agency and the Refunding Bonds, the preliminary form of which will be submitted to the Successor Agency for approval for distribution by the underwriter of the Refunding Bonds to persons and institutions interested in purchasing the Refunding Bonds.

SECTION 12. <u>Professional Services</u>. The Authorized Officers are hereby authorized to retain, in connection with the issuance of the Refunding Bonds, Urban Futures, Inc., as municipal advisor and as fiscal consultant, and the firm of Jones Hall, A Professional Law Corporation, as bond and disclosure counsel, and to execute professional services agreement with each such firm. Additionally, the selection of U.S. Bank National Association, as trustee for the Refunding Bonds, is hereby confirmed.

SECTION 13. Official Actions. The Authorized Officers and any and all other officers of the Successor Agency and the Commission are hereby authorized and directed, for and in the name and on behalf of the Successor Agency, to do any and all things and take any and all actions, which they, or any of them, may deem necessary or advisable in obtaining the requested approval by the California Department of Finance, and in the issuance, sale and delivery of the Refunding Bonds. Whenever in this Resolution any officer of the Successor Agency is directed to execute or countersign any document or take any action, such execution, countersigning or action may be taken on behalf of such officer by any person designated by such officer to act on his or her behalf in the case such officer is absent or unavailable.

SECTION 14. Effective Date. This Resolution shall take effect from and after the date of approval and adoption thereof.

BACKGROUND

The purpose of this item is for the City Council to consider the status of the General Plan Housing Element Annual Progress Report (APR) for 2014 and 2015, and the progress of its implementation, which needs to be reported to the California Department of Housing Community Development (HCD) and the Governor's Office of Planning and Research (OPR). Government Code Section 65400 establishes the requirement that each city and county prepare an annual report on the status of its General Plan, the Housing Element of its General Plan, and the actions taken towards completion of the programs and status of the local government's compliance with the deadlines in its housing element.

Except for the Land Use Element of the City's General Plan which was adopted in 1993, all other elements (Open Space/Conservation, Safety Element, Circulation Element, Noise Element, and Environmental Element) of the General Plan were adopted in 1994. Local governments are required to keep their General Plans current and internally consistent. There is no specific requirement that a local government update its General Plan on any particular timeline, with the exception of the Housing Element, which is required to be updated as prescribed by State Law. It should be noted that the City is currently reviewing proposals to update its General Plan.

The previous Housing Element 2008-2014 (4th Cycle), was adopted by the City on December 11, 2008 and certified by HCD on January 21, 2009. The City of Santa Fe Springs Housing Element 2014-2021(5th Cycle) was adopted by the City Council on

Date of Report: April 11, 2016 ITEM NO. 8 January 30, 2014 and certified by HCD on February 18, 2014. The Housing Element establishes the City's strategy for meeting community housing needs for the period 2013-2021 and is one of seven integral and interrelated elements of the General Plan.

The 2014 and 2015 Annual Reports reflect the City's progress during the first two years of the Regional Housing Need Allocation (RHNA) planning period (January 1, 2014 - October 1, 2021) for the 5th cycle Housing Element. The RHNA allocates the amount of housing growth each jurisdiction must plan for in their housing element by providing "adequate sites" through zoning. So long as a jurisdiction provides sufficient sites and does not impose constraints to development, it is not penalized for falling short of its RHNA target. However, pursuant to Government Code Section 65863, jurisdictions are required to maintain an adequate sites inventory throughout the planning period¹. For example, to the extent that high density sites identified as accommodating the lower income RHNA are developed with fewer units, the jurisdiction will need to make up any shortfall on other sites, including rezoning as necessary.

As presented in Table 1 below, Santa Fe Springs was allocated a total RHNA of 324 units for the planning period. During 2014 and 2015, a total of 207 residential building permits were issued. Review of sales and rent levels in these projects indicates all 207 units address the City's above moderate income RHNA needs. The City will need to continue to provide sites for a mix of single-family, multi-family and mixed use housing, supported by a variety of programs to enhance affordability, to accommodate its outstanding RHNA throughout the planning period.

and Housing Element during the Calendar Year 2014 and 2015 reporting periods. Many of the implementation measures of the Housing Element are ongoing and/or are scheduled to commence in 2016.

Update on the City-Wide Street Pavement Evaluation and Analysis

RECOMMENDATION

That the City Council adopt the three-year street improvement plan as identified by the City wide Street Pavement Evaluation and Analysis study and as recommended by the Capital Improvement Plan (CIP) Subcommittee.

BACKGROUND

Staff will make a presentation to inform the City Council as to the current status of City-wide Street Pavement Evaluation and Analysis.

At its meeting of July 9, 2015 Council awarded a contract to Anderson Penna (AP) to provide engineering services for pavement/sidewalk evaluation and analysis. The field work and site investigations were completed late last year. The CIP Subcommittee and staff have been sorting through the analysis and recommendations provided by AP. In particular, the CIP Subcommittee and staff have been deliberating on the evaluation and prioritization of the street improvements.

AP evaluated and analyzed each road segment in the city, approximately 108 miles. Each street was given a ranking from 1 to 5, with 1 being the worst street and 5 being the best street. The table below provides a rating per each category.

Street Rating	<u>Percentage</u>
1	6%
2	12%
3	36%
4	33%
5	13%

Approximately, 82% of the streets are in fair to good to excellent condition (Ratings 3, 4 and 5). Only 6% of the streets are in poor condition (Rating of No. 1).

FISCAL IMPACT

Staff worked with the CIP Subcommittee and recommends allocating \$15 million dollars of Bond CIP Funds. The funds are to be spent over a three year period. The CIP Subcommittee is recommending a three-year street improvement plan (see attached). The proposal is spend approximately \$15 million in Bond CIP

Funds and approximately \$2.7 in UUT CIP Funds. As the streets are improved, identified sidewalk repairs will be included as part of the street improvement projects. The CIP Subcommittee further recommended to construct all residential streets within year one. Should any savings be materialized, the CIP Subcommittee working with staff have selected the streets that can be grinded and overlaid with those funds.

<u>Water Well No. 12 – Engineering Design Services for a Water Treatment System – Authorization to Advertise Request for Proposals</u>

RECOMMENDATION

That the City Council authorize the City Engineer to advertise for Request for Proposals for Engineering Design Services for a Water Treatment System for Water Well No. 12.

BACKGROUND

Following completion of Water Well No. 12 in June 2015, the well was operated to test the water quality for State of California Division of Drinking Water (DDW) standards. The initial water quality tests met DDW standards.

However, more recent water quality tests results revealed high levels of Iron (producing a "brownish" color), Hydrogen Sulfide (producing an undesirable odor) and high water temperature (approximately 84°F). Continued testing has not resulted in a change in the water quality. As a result, Staff is recommending that the water from Water Well No. 12 not be pumped into the City's water distribution system until these issues can be addressed.

Staff has reviewed several alternatives for addressing the Iron and Hydrogen Sulfide issues and determined that installation of a water treatment system retrofit to Water Well No. 12 to be the most viable alternative.

The estimated cost for Engineering Design services for the water treatment system is \$140,000. The total estimated cost of the project is \$2 million (including design, construction and construction management/inspection).

Proposed funding for this project is the Utility Users Tax (UUT) Capital Improvement Plan Fund. Staff will recommend an appropriation from the UUT CIP Fund when the City Council considers a contract award for Engineering Design Services for a Water Treatment System for Water Well No. 12 at a future meeting.

<u>Stormwater Program Compliance Professional Services – Award of Contract</u>

RECOMMENDATION

That the City Council award a contract to John L. Hunter and Associates to provide Stormwater Program Compliance Professional Services.

BACKGROUND

On December 28, 2012 the National Pollutant Discharge Elimination System (NPDES) Municipal Separate Storm Sewer Systems (MS4), Order No. R4-2012-0175 (MS4 Permit) permit became effective despite strong opposition from many of the cities within the County. The permit greatly increases the City's requirements for compliance. Among other things, it specifically; introduced Numerical Effluent Limitations as the ultimate standard, established new monitoring requirements, and introduced the Concept of Watershed Management Programs (WMP).

Continuing to perform this service with in-house staff has proven to be difficult to interpret the Permit language and inefficient in our plan checking capacity. In an effort to comply with the Permit and better serve our community, staff sent a Request for Proposals (RFP) to three Engineering/Environmental Consulting firms, John L. Hunter and Associates, Willdan and CWE.

A three member panel reviewed and evaluated each of the (3) three proposals based on the firms understanding of the work to be done, the project managers experience with similar kind of work, and the firms relevant project experience, etc.

After evaluating the proposals, Staff recommends awarding the contract to John L. Hunter and Associates (John Hunter) due to the firms experienced staff and relevant project experience. Attached is a summary of the evaluation committee's rankings of the proposals (Attachment 1). The proposals submitted to the City and the evaluation score sheets are on file in the Public Works Department.

FISCAL IMPACT

The City shall enter into a professional services contract for a not-to-exceed fee of \$18,855.00. Funding for the Stormwater Program Compliance Professional Services is included in the approved Public Works Department FY 15/16 budget. Attachment 3 is a schedule of hourly rates for John L. Hunter and Associates.

THIS AGREEMENT, made and entered into this 14th day of April 2016 by and between the CITY OF SANTA FE SPRINGS (CITY), and John L. Hunter & Associates, (CONSULTANT) is entered into in consideration of the mutual covenants and promises contained herein. The Parties do mutually agree as follows:

- 1. CONSULTANT will provide services (SERVICES) as outlined in attached proposal and shall organize, supervise, prepare and complete said SERVICES as set forth therein.
- 2. CITY shall compensate CONSULTANT for the SERVICES as detailed in the proposal, dated 10/18/15 (attached hereto), in the total amount not to-exceed of \$18,855.00. CONSULTANT shall not receive additional compensation in excess of the above amount unless previously approved in writing by the CITY. Such compensation shall become payable on a periodic time schedule as approved and agreed to by CITY and the CONSULTANT.
- 3. CONSULTANT hereby acknowledges that obtaining a City business license may be required to perform the SERVICES specified in this Agreement.
- 4. The parties hereto acknowledge and agree that the relationship between CITY and CONSULTANT is one of principal and independent CONSUL ANT and no other. CONSULTANT is solely responsible for all labor and expenses associated with the performance of the SERVICES. Nothing contained in the Agreement shall create or be construed as creating a partnership, joint venture, employment relationship, or any other relationship except as set forth between the parties. This includes, but is not limited to the application of the Federal Insurance Contribution Act, the Social Security Act, the Federal Unemployment Tax Act, the provision of the Internal Revenue Code, the State Revenue and Taxation Code relating to income tax withholding at the source of income, the Workers' Compensation Insurance Code, 401(k) and other benefit payments and third party liability claims. CONSULTANT specifically acknowledges that CITY is not required to, nor shall, provide Worker's Compensation Benefits Insurance for CONSULTANT. Notwithstanding the above, CONSULTANT hereby specifically waives any claims and/or demands for such benefits.
- 5. CONSULTANT shall defend, indemnify, hold free and harmless the CITY and its appointed and elected officials, officers, employees and agents from and against any and all damages to property or injuries to or death of any person or persons, including attorney fees and shall defend, indemnify, save and hold harmless CITY and its appointed and elected officials, officers, employees and agents from any and all claims, demands, suits, actions or proceedings of any kind or nature, including but not by way of limitation, all civil claims, worker's' compensation claims, and all other claims resulting from or arising our out of the negligent or willful acts, errors or omission of CONSULTANT, in the performance of the Agreement.
- 6. CONSULTANT will not be required to follow or establish a regular or daily work schedule. Any advice given to the CONSULTANT regarding the accomplishment of SERVICES shall be considered a suggestion only, not an instruction. The CITY retains the right to inspect, stop, or alter the work of the CONSULTANT to assure its conformity with this Agreement.
- 7. CONSULTANT shall comply with CITY's Harassment Policy. CITY prohibits any and all harassment in any form.
- 8. CONSULTANT shall obtain the following forms of insurance and provide City with copies therewith:
 a. Commercial General Liability Insurance with minimum limits of one million dollars
 (\$1,000,000) per occurrence and,
 - b. Automobile Insurance covering all bodily injury and property damage incurred during the performance of this Agreement, with a minimum coverage of \$500,000 combined single limit per accident. Such automobile insurance shall include all vehicles used, whether or not owned by

c. CONSULTANT shall comply with Workers' Compensation insurance laws of California.



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A. Statement of Qualifications

1. Approach and Timeline

John L. Hunter & Associates (JLHA) has aided municipalities in compliance with NPDES MS4 Permit provisions since the first issuance of these permits in the 1990s. Through these years of experience, JLHA has developed a distinct, yet multifaceted approach. This approach has proven successful to date — of the multiple Regional Board MS4 Program audits that JLHA has participated in, none resulted in Permit violations. The key to this success is attributed to:

- 1) Our proactive approach when developing a compliance strategy. In the past JLHA has assisted cities with compliance in response to fines issued by the Regional Board due to significant MS4 NPDES program deficiencies. Resolution No. 9507 Authorizing Participation in a Joint Service Delivery Cost Comparison Project with Cities in the Gateway Cities Council of Governments

RECOMMENDATION

That the City Council

- Adopt Resolution No. 9507 authorizing participation in a joint service delivery cost comparison project with cities in the Gateway Cities Council of Governments ("COG"); and,
- 2) Appropriate \$10,000 from the General Fund to 2100-4400 for the project.

BACKGROUND: The City is a member of the COG, a consortium of cities located in southeast Los Angeles County, whose mission is to promote regional planning and cooperation. The COG has several committees including the City Manager Policy Advisory Committee. The City Managers in this group meet on a monthly basis to discuss regional issues, one of which was the need for better data for cost comparisons and benchmarking.

The Project originated from these discussions after a smaller group of City Managers began exploring the idea of sharing cost delivery data amongst the group. In total, seven cities (Downey, La Mirada, Norwalk, Pico Rivera, Santa Fe Springs, South Gate and Wittier) have expressed interest in participating in the Project. The intent of this Project is to equip the City with service delivery comparative data, best practices and bench marking tools in respect to comparable cities in the southeast Los Angeles County region.

The group conducted three meetings and two rounds of surveys to determine which services would be studied in the first phase of this Project. First, each city was asked to submit 10-15 services that would be included in the comparison analysis. The initial survey offered a total of 40 unique services, from which a top 20 listing of services were compiled based on total number of initial votes. Finally, cities were asked to select 10 of the 20 services which would represent the first phase of the Project. Based on the voting, those services included:

- Financial Auditing Services
- HVAC Maintenance
- Janitorial Services
- Median Landscaping
- Park Landscaping

- Plan Checking & Inspections
- Towing
- Tree Trimming & Maintenance
- Solid Waste & Recycling
- Street Sweeping

To get a true comparison of the actual cost to deliver each service, the group agreed to hire a consultant who could perform this complex cost analysis. Because some services are provided internally by a city and others are provided externally by a

consultant or contractor, a proper comparison will take into account multiple factors, variables and mechanisms to determine the actual cost of service delivery for each of the services listed above. In addition, a consultant who is a service delivery expert will be able to provide an analysis of best practices and recommendations for potential economies of scale for the group cities participating in this Project. The final report will become a valuable tool for City Councils to on contract negotiations, exploring alternative service delivery methods and achieving benchmarks set in the region for the respective cities.

In so much as it is a goal of the City to provide effective and cost efficient services to the community, this Project will better position City Council and staff to negotiate future contracts with service providers, explore alternative service delivery options and simply learn from the experiences of nearby cities. Currently, comparing service delivery is handled by staff on a case by case basis and may not compare internal services to cities that provide the services externally. Having a true cost analysis of services provided city-by-city in the southeast Los Angeles County region will provide a more robust tool for the City and other cities participating in this Project in providing effective services, as well as further Good Governance and transparency.

COG staff has agreed to release a Request for Proposals on behalf of the group cities and hold fiduciary responsibility for the project. The City Managers from the group will select which consultant will be hired based on the submittals and assume full administrative control of the Project. The Project was taken to the COG Board of Directors and approved at its meeting of April 6, 2016.

The group cities have been asked to obtain authorization for participating in the Project in accordance with its own protocols, and appropriate \$10,000 each for the first phase of the comparison analysis. In addition, a Memorandum of Agreement between the COG and group cities will be executed. Completion of a final report is expected to take 2-3 months and will be shared with the City Council once it is finalized.

FISCAL IMPACT: This phase of the Project will cost Santa Fe Springs \$10,000. This Project will allow Santa Fe Springs staff the ability to make better informed recommendations to the City Council on providing effective services to the community.

RECOMMENDATION

BACKGROUND

Peace Over Violence has been committed to social service, social change and social justice with innovative programs that include Emergency, Intervention, Prevention, Education and Advocacy services to victims of domestic violence and sexual assaults.

"Sexual Assault Awareness Month" is in April and Peace Over Violence has declared Wednesday, April 27, 2016 as "Denim Day" in Los Angeles County and nationwide. All municipalities in Los Angeles County and nationwide are invited to be a part of Denim Day, a sexual assault prevention and education campaign in support of raising awareness about the need to end sexual violence. Millions of supporters around the country and globally are expected to participate.

Organized annually, "Denim Day" recalls an Italian Supreme Court case that sparked international outrage when judges did not convict a rapist because the victim wore jeans. The judges ruled that because the victim was wearing jeans, she must have helped her attacker remove them, thus implying consent. People are encouraged to wear jeans to support survivors of sexual assault and raise awareness around sexual violence issues and communicate the message that there is "no excuse and never an invitation to rape."

Santa Fe Springs is proud to participate in this effort to promote awareness by wearing denim on Wednesday, April 27. The Santa Fe Springs City Council encourages all City employees to make a social statement and wear denim jeans this day in support of such a worthwhile cause.

WHEREAS, "Sexual Assault Awareness Month" and "Denim Day" are intended to draw attention to the fact that rape and sexual assault remains a serious issue in our society. It is everyone's responsibility not only to speak out, but also to take action against this injustice; and

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that I, Richard J. Moore, Mayor of the City of Santa Fe Springs, on behalf of the City Council hereby proclaim the month of April as

SEXUAL ASSAULT AWARENESS MONTH and April 27, 2016 as DENIM DAY IN SANTA FE SPRINGS
