RECOMMENDATION

BACKGROUND

The Santa Fe Springs Public Financing Authority (PFA) is a City entity that has periodically issued debt for the benefit of the Santa Fe Springs community. The following is a brief status report on the debt instruments currently outstanding that were issued through the PFA.

Bond Repayment

The City budget includes sufficient appropriations and adequate revenues are expected to be collected to meet the debt service obligations associated with the 2005 Water Revenue Bonds.

The former Community Development Commission (CDC) issued a number of tax allocation bonds before it was dissolved by State law effective February 1, 2012 which are administered by the City acting as Successor Agency under the oversight of the appointed Oversight Board. The Successor Agency no longer receives tax increment. Instead, distributions from the Redevelopment Property Tax Trust Fund (RPTTF) are received based on approved obligations. It is anticipated that sufficient allocations from the RPTTF will continue to be made to the Successor Agency to meet ongoing debt service obligations.

ITEM NO. 3B

Unspent Bond Proceeds

Under an approved Bond Expenditure Agreement, unspent bond proceeds of the former CDC in the amount of approximately \$19 million were transferred to the City in July 2014. The funds are to be spent in accordance with the original bond documents. The unspent proceeds continue to be a source of funding within the City's capital improvement program (CIP).

2016 Bond Refunding

In July 2016 the Successor Agency issued its 2016 Tax Allocation Refunding Bonds, which paid off several bond issuances of the former CDC. The bonds were originally issued through the Public Financing Authority and included the 2001 Series A, 2002 Series A, 2003 Series A, the current interest portion of the 2006 Series A, and 2006 Series B bond issuances.

BACKGROUND

The Santa Fe Springs Water Utility Authority (WUA) is a City entity that has issued debt for the benefit of the Santa Fe Springs community. The following is a brief status report on the debt instruments currently outstanding that were issued through the WUA.

<u>Water Revenue Bonds, 2013</u> Financing proceeds available for appropriation at 3/31/17 Outstanding principal at 3/31/17

None \$6,890,000

In May 2013 the Water Utility Authority issued the 2013 Water Revenue Bonds in the amount of \$6,890,000. The bonds refunded the existing 2003 Water Revenue Bonds (issued through the Public Financing Authority) and provided additional funds for water improvement projects in the amount of \$2,134,339. The funds were restricted for use on water system improvements. In August 2013 the Water Utility Authority Board appropriated the proceeds for the Equipping Water Well No. 12 Project and all proceeds were since used on this project.

The City budget includes sufficient appropriations and adequate revenues are expected to be collected to meet the debt service obligations associated with the 2013 Water Revenue Bonds.

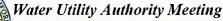
The WUA was formed in June of 2009. Water revenue bonds issued prior to this date were issued through the City of Santa Fe Springs Public Financing Authority.

Status Update of Water-Related Capital Improvement Projects

RECOMMENDATION

That the Water Utility Authority receive and file the report.

BACKGROUND

This report is for informational purposes only. The following is a listing of current active water projects.

Water Well No. 12 Engineering Design Services for Water Treatment System

At the July 28, 2016 City Council meeting, the Water Utility Authority Board directed staff to award a contract to Civiltec Engineering Inc. (Civiltec) to provide water production design services for Water Well No. 12. The design is complete along with specifications for the project. Currently staff are conducting a final review of the plans and specifications in preparation to move forward requesting Council authorization to advertise at a future meeting in May.

Water Well No. 1 - Destruction

At the October 27, 2016 City Council meeting, the Water Utility Authority Board directed staff to award a contract to General Pump Company (GPC) to provide well destruction services to Water Well No. 1. GPC is currently waiting for the well destruction permit through the State Water Resources Control Board (SWRCB) allowing them to proceed with the destruction of the well.

Interstate 5 Freeway Widening Water Main Relocation Project for the Florence Avenue Segment (Phase II)

At the April 13, 2017 City Council Meeting, the City Council directed staff to award a contract to G.J. Gentry General Engineering Inc., in the amount of \$647,390.00 to provide construction services to relocate all water mains and appurtenances in conflict with the work being conducted by Caltrans during the widening of the Interstate 5 Freeway project. Currently Caltrans and their contractor are preparing the Florence segment work zone to allow for G.J. Gentry to mobilize in the near future.

FISCAL IMPACT

The Water Well No. 12 Engineering Design Services for Water Treatment System is funded by Capital Improvement Plan Bond Funds. The Destruction of Water Well No. 1 is funded by Water Capital Improvement Plan Funds. The Interstate 5 Freeway Widening Water Main Relocation Project for the Florence Avenue Segment (Phase II) is funded through the State and the City will be reimbursed by Caltrans via Utility Agreements.

23. EXECUTIVE TEAM REPORTS

- Noe Negrete, Public Works Director, spoke about the Valley View and Florence segments of the I5 expansion project changing to one lane. He also spoke about last week's meeting with Caltrans to discuss the displeasure with some striping done on Florence Avenue; he will be asking to extend the left turn pocket towards the bridge on Studebaker onto Fairford Avenue; he noted there was a list of 45 changes the City provided to Caltrans to change. Caltrans agreed to make the requested changes, once changes are completed, he will be sending them to the City Council. Public Works will also be looking on the signals to make sure they are all synchronize. Lastly, he spoke about meeting with the church and school to make some additional changes on signage; plan to work on the striping by Valley View to change them; thanked Dino Torres, Director of Police Services and Whittier Police Department for assisting with the traffic.
- Council Member Moore inquired if one can still make a turn going east on Florence onto Fairford Avenue. He also inquired whether it will also remain open.
- Mr. Negrete stated it will remain open and one can still make a turn onto Fairford Avenue.
- Council Member Moore inquired whether one can make a left on Orr & Day.
- Mr. Negrete noted that one cannot make a left on Orr & Day, however, they are looking for alternatives.
- Council Member Zamora suggested to place restricted sign hours such as the schools have it.
- Council Member Moore also inquired why Darcy and Orr & Day was closed after 3:00 a.m.
- Mr. Negrete noted he would look into why it is closed around the time.
- Council Member Trujillo inquired if the second lane going south on Orr & Day to Telegraph can be made into a two-lane turn.
- Mr. Negrete stated that would not be possible.
- Wayne Morrell, Director of Planning spoke about the South Gate Taco Bell container restaurant; he noted this type of building was first brought forward by Council Member Moore. Mr. Morell also mentioned Long Beach, CA also has another shipping container that is used as a new dining area. He stated that he is looking into ways to bring this type of structure to Santa Fe Springs, and noted that the building code would need to be amended in order to have it allowed in the city of Santa Fe Springs.
- Dino Torres, Director of Police services introduced Rick Brown, Family and Youth Intervention Supervisor who gave a brief update on the Family and Youth Intervention Program.

Fire Station Headquarters – HVAC Improvements: Award of Contract

RECOMMENDATION

That the City Council take the following actions:

- Appropriate \$175,000.00 from the Bond Funds for Capital Projects to Fire Station Headquarters – HVAC Improvements Project (455-397-S016);
- Accept the bids; and
- Award a contract to Los Angeles Air Conditioning, Inc. of La Verne, California in the amount of \$266,000.00.

BACKGROUND

The City Council, at their meeting of June 23, 2016, rejected all bids submitted for the Fire Station Headquarters HVAC Improvements and authorized the City Engineer to re-advertise for construction bids. The original scope of work was reduced by changing the design to eliminate the one central HVAC unit including a full automation control system to the installation of three rooftop package units with manual controls. The original low bid with the central HVAC unit was \$339,837.00 and the proposed bid is \$266,000.00 equaling a savings of \$73,837.00.

Bids were opened on April 4, 2017 and a total of three (3) bids were received. The low bidder for the project is Los Angeles Air Conditioning, Inc. of La Verne, California in the amount of \$266,000.00. The following represents the bids received and the amount of each bid:

*Denotes the bid submitted by the contractor "Cinbad" was deemed nonresponsive as a result of not being on the Official Planholders list in accordance with the project specifications noted on page A-3 of the Notice Inviting Bids, and for not acquiring the Plans and Special Provisions directly from the City of Santa Fe Springs as required and noted on page A-3 of the Notice Inviting Bids.

The bid submitted by Los Angeles Air Conditioning, Inc. is 28.5% higher than the Engineer's Construction Cost Estimate of \$190,000.

The Department of Public Works has reviewed the bids and has determined the low bid submitted by Los Angeles Air Conditioning, Inc. to be responsive and responsible.

ITEM NO. 7

The Fire Station Headquarters – HVAC Improvements project is an approved Capital Improvement Project with an original budget of \$192,000.00. The approximate total project expenditures to date is \$50,000.00 due to re-design and re-bid costs, leaving a project balance of \$142,000.00. Staff is recommending an appropriation of \$175,000.00 from the Bond Funds Capital Projects to the Fire Station Headquarters -HVAC Improvements project (Account No. 455-397-S016) to cover the budget shortfall. The estimated cost of the project is \$367,000.00 which includes construction, contingency, engineering and inspection.

In June 2016 the Fire Station Headquarters Generator Replacement project was completed with a savings of approximately \$179,000.00. Staff is recommending using the savings from the Fire Station Headquarters Generator Replacement project to offset the shortfall with the Fire Station Headquarters – HVAC Improvements project.

This Contract Agreement is made and entered into the above-stated project this <u>27th</u> day of <u>April</u> <u>2017</u>, BY AND BETWEEN the City of Santa Fe Springs, as AGENCY, and <u>Los Angeles Air</u> <u>Conditioning, Inc.</u> as CONTRACTOR in the amount of <u>\$266,000.00</u>.

WITNESSETH that AGENCY and CONTRACTOR have mutually agreed as follows:

ARTICLE I

The contract documents for the aforesaid project shall consist of the Notice Inviting Sealed Bids, Instructions to Bidders, Proposal, General Specifications, Standard Specifications, Special Provisions, Plans, and all referenced specifications, details, standard drawings, CDBG contract provisions and forms, and appendices; together with this Contract Agreement and all required bonds, insurance certificates, permits, notices, and affidavits; and also including any and all addenda or supplemental agreements clarifying, or extending the work contemplated as may be required to ensure its completion in an acceptable manner. All of the provisions of said contract documents are made a part hereof as though fully set forth herein.

ARTICLE II

For and in consideration of the payments and agreements to be made and performed by AGENCY, CONTRACTOR agrees to furnish all materials and perform all work required for the above-stated project, and to fulfill all other obligations as set forth in the aforesaid contract documents.

ARTICLE III

CONTRACTOR agrees to receive and accept the prices set forth in the Proposal as full compensation for furnishing all materials, performing all work, and fulfilling all obligations hereunder. Said compensation shall cover all expenses, losses, damages, and consequences arising out of the nature of the work during its progress or prior to its acceptance including those for well and faithfully completing the work and the whole thereof in the manner and time specified in the aforesaid contract documents; and also including those arising from actions of the elements, unforeseen difficulties or obstructions encountered in the prosecution of the work, suspension or discontinuance of the work, and all other unknowns or risks of any description connected with the work.

ARTICLE IV

AGENCY hereby promises and agrees to employ, and does hereby employ, CONTRACTOR to provide the materials, do the work and fulfill the obligations according to the terms and conditions herein contained and referred to, for the prices aforesaid, and hereby contracts to pay the same at the time, in the manner, and upon the conditions set forth in the contract documents. No work or portion of the work shall be paid for until it is approved for payment by the City Engineer. Payment made for completed portions of the work shall not constitute final acceptance of those portions or of the completed project.

ARTICLE V

CONTRACTOR acknowledges the provisions of the State Labor Code requiring every employer to be insured against liability for Worker's Compensation or to undertake self-insurance in accordance with the provisions of that code and certifies compliance with such provisions. Contractor further acknowledges the provisions of the State Labor Code requiring every employer to pay at least the minimum prevailing rate of per diem wages for each craft classification or type of workman needed to execute this contract as determined by the Director of Labor Relations of the State of California. The Contractor is required to pay the higher of either the State or Federal Wages.

ARTICLE VI

CONTRACTOR agrees to indemnify, defend and hold harmless AGENCY and all of its officers and agents from any claims, demand or causes of action, including related expenses, attorney's fees, and costs, based on, arising out of, or in any way related to the work undertaken by CONTRACTOR hereunder.

ARTICLE VII

CONTRACTOR affirms that the signatures, titles and seals set forth hereinafter in execution of this Contract Agreement represent all individuals, firm members, partners, joint venturers, and/or corporate officers having principal interest herein.

<u>60th Anniversary Parade and 5K Run Traffic Control Plans Request for Approval</u> and 60th Anniversary Event Update

RECOMMENDATION

That the City Council:

- Hear an update on the 60th Anniversary events; and,
- Approve the traffic control plans prepared for the closure of the Telegraph Road off-ramps at the I-605 freeway and the traffic control plans prepared for the detouring of traffic along City streets around the 60th Anniversary Parade and 5K Run routes on Saturday May 6, 2017.

BACKGROUND

The City of Santa Fe Springs 60th Anniversary Parade and 5K run will be held on Saturday, May 6, 2017. The 60th Anniversary Parade will start at approximately 10:00 a.m. in front of Santa Fe High School. Participants will head north on the east side of Orr and Day Road and then turn right onto Pioneer Boulevard where it will head east/south on Pioneer Boulevard and end at Soaring Dreams Plaza (southwest intersection of Telegraph Road and Pioneer Boulevard). The 5K Run which will precede the parade and start at approximately 7:00 a.m. at Soaring Dreams Plaza and proceed north on the west side of Pioneer Boulevard and then turn left onto the east side of Orr and Day Road where the run will proceed south to Joslin Street. At Joslin Street, the runners will turn around and head back north on Orr and Day Road and then back to Pioneer Boulevard to the finish line at Soaring Dreams Plaza.

In consultation with the Joint Powers Insurance Authority, and In order to detour traffic through the area when the 5K Run and Parade are in progress, staff has prepared traffic control plans per the Work Area Traffic Control Handbook (WATCH) which conform to the standards and guidance of the California Manual of Uniform Traffic Control Devices (MUTCD) to indicate where warning signs, barricades, delineators, etc. are to be placed in order to direct traffic around the parade/run routes in an orderly manner. Staff has also procured an encroachment permit from Caltrans that allows the City to close the Telegraph Road off-ramps at the I-605 freeway where traffic control plans for the ramp closures were prepared by a licensed traffic Engineer.

In order to obtain insurance coverage for these two events from the California Joint Powers Insurance Authority (CJPIA), the CJPIA requires that the City Council approve the traffic control plans for both the freeway ramp closures as well as for the City street closures Parade/5K route.

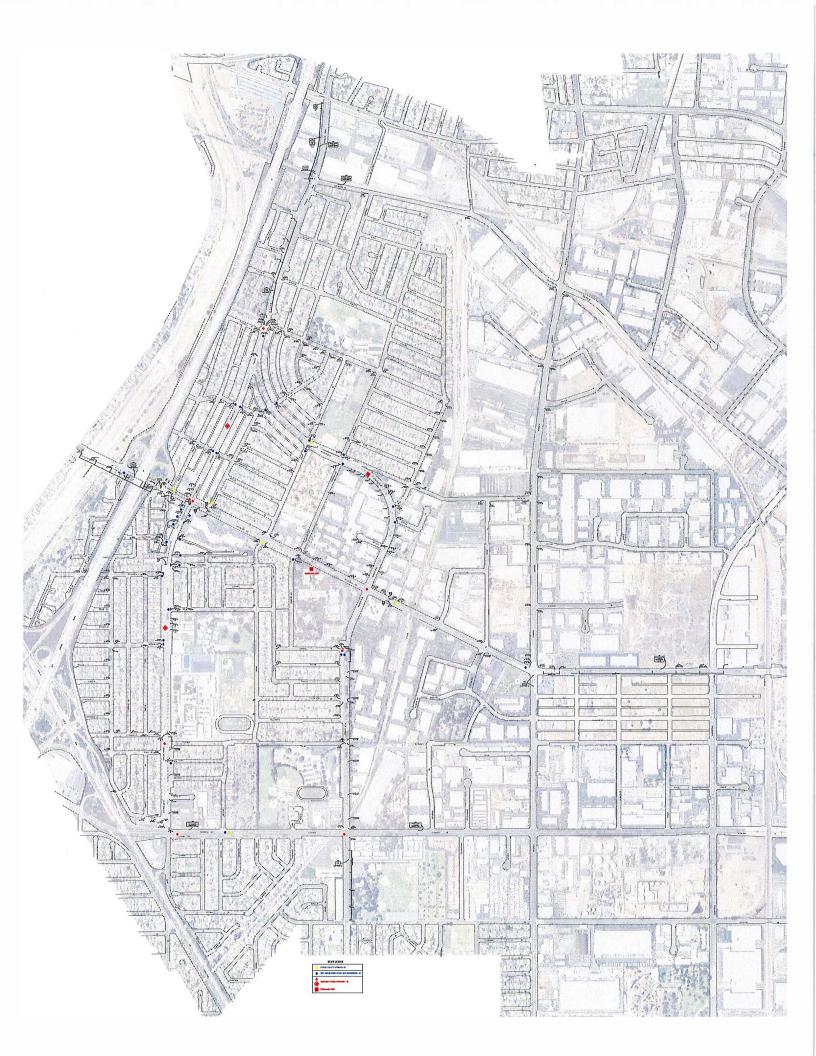

BACKGROUND

Every year in the month of May, Americans across the nation celebrate Mental Health Awareness Month. The outreach calls attention to strategies and methods that help all Americans achieve wellness, good mental and overall health.

That is why this year's theme for Mental Health Awareness Month is "Risky Business". It is a call to educate ourselves and others about habits and behaviors that increase the risk of developing or exacerbating mental illnesses, or could be signs of mental health problems themselves. Activities like compulsive sex, recreational drug use, obsessive internet use, excessive spending, or disordered exercise patterns can all be behaviors that disrupt someone's mental health and potentially lead them down a path towards crisis.

Mental Health Awareness (MHA) Month was started 68 years ago by Mental Health America, to raise awareness about mental health conditions and the importance of good mental health for everyone. Last year, Mental Health Month materials were seen and used by 22.3 million people, with more than 8,500 entities downloading MHA's toolkit.

It is important to understand early symptoms of mental illness and know when certain behaviors are potentially signs of something more. We need to speak up early and educate people about risky behavior and its connection to mental illness, and do so in a compassionate, judgement-free way.

This May, Santa Fe Springs is encouraging people to educate themselves about behaviors and activities that could be harmful to recovery – and to speak up without shame using the hashtag "#riskybusiness" so that others can learn if their behaviors are something to examine. Posting the hashtag is a way to speak up, to educate without judgment, and to share your point of view or story with people who may be suffering and help others figure out if they too are showing signs of a mental illness.
