MINUTES

1. CALL TO ORDER

Chairperson, Gabriel Jiménez, called the meeting to order at 9:01 a.m.

2. ROLL CALL

- 3. ORAL COMMUNICATIONS NONE
- <u>APPROVAL OF MINUTES</u>
 A motion was made by Debbie Baker and seconded by Francis Carbajal to approve the Minutes for the August 29, 2023 meeting.

5. COUNCIL LIAISON REPORT

Councilmember William K. Rounds provided a brief overview of the following:

- City Council did not have a meeting for the second meeting in the month of September due to a conference in Sacramento in which some of the Councilmembers attended.
- City Hall is currently having the roof replaced; it should be completed by November of 2023.
- The Relay for Life event took place on Saturday, September 23rd and it had an exceptional turnout.
- City Council approved a stop sign to be installed on Pioneer Boulevard and Houghton Avenue Whiteland Street.
- Due to the amount in the budget not being feasible and only receiving a monetary donation from Bob Archuleta, the Aquatic Center design slightly changed and the plan is to have it open for summer of 2024.

6. <u>PUBLIC WORKS DEPARTMENT REPORT</u> NONE

7. PLANNING DEPARTMENT DIRECTOR REPORT

Vince Velasco, Associate Planner, reported on the following:

a. There was \$3,500 contributed in August of 2023 for the art fees. The Department

of Planning & Development has collected a total of \$391,707.90 thus far for the 2023 calendar year.

- b. The building permit valuations refer to the estimated or projected value of a construction project for which a building permit is required. Attachment B in the September packet provided the members a chart showing the total permit valuations for each month in the 2023 calendar year. The art fees are only collected based on a 1% cumulative valuation for projects exceeding the \$300,000 threshold.
- c. The Department of Planning and Development will be having their 6th annual national community planning month photo contest. The photo contest begins on September 1st and will end October 31st. There are 3 categories for the photographs that are taken and they must be: a City location, City event, or City public art. The top entry for each category will receive a monetary prize of \$125, a feature in the All Things Santa Fe Springs newsletter, a mention on the City's social media channels, and be displayed at the City Library and the 2024 Art Fest.
- d. Mr. Velasco shared the proposed conceptual art design associated with the new development project at the northeast corner of Bloomfield Avenue and Imperial Highway. A request was submitted for a Raising Cane's restaurant to be built at this location. If approved, the applicant understands the requirements of the City's Heritage Artwork in Public Places Program (Ordinance No. 1054) and has prepared a conceptual design for the Heritage Arts Advisory Committee to consider and provide initial feedback. The conceptual art design that was shown to the members is the installment of illuminated channel letters on the northeast corner to prominently identify "Santa Fe Springs" within a designated landscape area. It is currently proposed to match and complement a similar installation at the northwest corner within the City of Norwalk boundaries.

A motion was made by Francis Carbajal and seconded by Hilda Zamora to approve the installment of illuminated channel letters on the northeast corner to prominently identify "Santa Fe Springs" within a designated landscape area and lighting to be installed. Two members were opposed of the motion and the other five members were in favor.

8. PRESENTATION

Executive Secretary, Ed Ramirez presented on the following:

2024 Art Fest Call to Artist and Guest Artist Selection

The 2024 Art Fest is scheduled on April 25th and 26th. Mr. Ramirez reviewed the featured artist of the upcoming event and proposed new guest artists that Art Consultant, Sandra Hahn, provided for the presentation.

For the 2024 Art Fest, there will be two featured artists – John Castillo and Roger Trivino. Mr. Castillo does astrophotography and Mr. Trivino is the artist who was voted by the advisory committee members and City Council for the people's choice award. Mr. Trivino has an extensive discipline in art painting. Mrs. Hahn is looking into having the guest artist be Emiliano Moreno, a fashion designer. Mrs. Hahn plans to incorporate some fashion into the Art Fest and would like to create immersive installations that individuals can walk into and enjoy. Mrs. Hahn is proposing to continue the Nuestra Vida component and bring back the tattoo and piercing artist. She is also considering a tattoo artist who does an indigenous or hand-poke style of tattooing to provide history

with tattooing. They are also proposing having a competition take place with Carlos Gallardo, the DJ, and other DJs as well. The theme will be similar to Comic Con for the Call to Artists flyer.

Due to construction that will be taking place at the Aquatic Center during the time of the 2024 Art Fest, Mr. Ramirez proposed having the event take place at Heritage Park instead of Clarke Estate due to logistical complications.

A motion was made by Francis Carbajal and seconded by John Mora to approve the 2024 Art Fest to take place at Heritage Park. The motion was carried unanimously.

9. 2023 ART FEST SUBCOMMITTEE REPORT - ED RAMIREZ

a) 2024 SFS Art Fest – Proposed Entertainment Discussion

Mr. Ramirez will be meeting with the subcommittee in October for the 2024 Art Fest proposed entertainment. The entertainment suggestions made by the HAAC were to explore tribute/cover bands, a reggae band, a Colombia group called Orquesta Canela, and a Journey tribute band named DSB. The advisory committee members also suggested to select genres of music by the end of October. Mr. Ramirez shared the best time to have the headliner perform would be between 8:00 – 9:30 p.m. as most guests begin to leave after 9:30 p.m.

10. EXECUTIVE SECRETARY REPORT

It is recommended that the Heritage Arts Advisory Committee (HAAC):

1. Receive and file.

FISCAL IMPACT

The annual amount of Art Education Grants is currently budgeted at \$50,000 per fiscal year in the Public Art & Education Program Activity (10511001-593000).

BACKGROUND

The Heritage Arts in Public Places Program has been funding art education programs for K-12 students in Santa Fe Springs for over 30 years. The Heritage Arts in Public Places Art Education Grant Program is administered by the Heritage Arts Advisory Committee (HAAC) in an advisory capacity. Funded by the Heritage Arts in Public Places program, the Heritage Arts Education Endowment Fund was established to support youth oriented art programs and events with Art Education Grants. Grants are provided to schools or organizations predominantly serving Santa Fe Springs students in grades K-12. Interested schools have the opportunity to submit applications annually requesting funds to help support their art education programs. Applicants must follow the Art Education Grant Guidelines when completing their applications. Grant applications are reviewed by the HAAC and recommended to the City Council for final approval.

The HAAC reviewed and recommended the approval of (28) Art Education Grant applications for Fiscal Year 2023-24 in the amount of \$58,364.97 at their meeting on July 25, 2023. At the August 1, 2023 council meeting, the City Council approved the 28 grant

applications in the amount of \$58,364.97.

City Council directed staff to have the HAAC review the existing Art Education Grant Guidelines to ensure that only schools located in Santa Fe Springs are awarded art grants. Staff was also directed to review the percentage of student residency of schools not located in Santa Fe Springs. Staff surveyed all schools within Santa Fe Springs and school districts.

At its August 29, 2023 meeting, the HAAC discussed and reviewed the 2023-2024 Art Education Grant Guidelines. The following are the recommendations were made by the HAAC and for the City Council's consideration:

- 1. All schools located in Santa Fe Springs serving students K-12, including the following schools not located in Santa Fe Springs: Cresson Elementary, Lakeland Elementary, Los Nietos Middle, and Pioneer High School who serve a percentage of Santa Fe Springs residents.
- 2. Under Section 15, add "Subject to the discretion of the Heritage Arts Advisory Committee and approval of City Council. Art grants may be used for the following allowable expenses, includes but not limited to:"
- 3. Under Section 15n, add "(i.e. cameras, digital cameras, devices, tablets, computers, etc.)."
- 4. Under Section 15o, add "battery operated tea lights"
- 5. Under Section 16b, add "(i.e. glue guns)"
- 6. Under Section 16d, add "electrical"
- 7. Under Section 16e, add "(i.e. printers, ink, other supplies for printer)"
- 8. Under Section 16t, add "theme park admission"

At the October 17, 2023, City Council meeting, City Council approved the Heritage Arts Advisories recommended revisions with one modification in permitting Section 16e for equipment (i.e. printers, 3D printers, ink, and other supplies for printer) as an allowable expense.

ART EDUCATION GRANT GUIDELINES

ELIGIBILITY CRITERIA

- Grants are provided to all schools serving students in grades K 12 located in Santa Fe Springs including Cresson Elementary, Lakeland Elementary, Los Nietos Middle, and Pioneer High School who serve a percentage of Santa Fe Springs residents.
- 2. Proposals must clearly explain how children's knowledge and awareness of art will be enhanced.
- 3. Proposals must clearly explain how the art grant will provide age and skills appropriate learning opportunities.
- 4. Art Education Programs must provide hands-on and/or learning projects that may culminate into exhibitions, productions, demonstrations, or art-related fieldtrips.
- 5. Project must be completed during the funding cycle.
- 6. For schools, projects may take place during regular school hours, and/or after school.
- 7. Only principals, teachers and/or program directors may apply for the grant. For teachers and program directors, the **principal** of your school or the **executive director** of your organization must review and sign the proposal. School and/or organization volunteers and/or aides are not eligible to apply. Contract artist(s) MAY NOT apply or sign applications.
- 8. Contract artist(s) must be over the age of 21.
- 9. Only one application per teacher/program director may be submitted. (*Except when a teacher/program director submits an application for two different schools.*) Principals may apply for one grant for their school.
- 10. It is expected that your art project is collaborative, both financially as well as in implementation. Failure to list how this will be accomplished and with whom could reduce or eliminate funding for your project. Parent group involvement, fundraising activities, and/or sponsorships are required. List all participants and/or funds contributed towards the project.

BUDGET (AMOUNT NOT TO EXCEED \$5,000)

- 11. The budget must clearly identify how the funds will be used.
- 12. Applicant MUST submit itemized budget template included in application.
- 13. Art grants must be spent for the approved program. Supplies must be used during the school year for which the grant was awarded. **Monies not spent must be returned**.
- 14. The grant may only be used for approved projects. <u>Any changes to the approved project must</u> <u>be submitted in writing and receive approval from the committee before implementation</u>.

Changes without approval could result in requesting the return of the grant funds and/or being disqualified from future grants.

15. Subject to the discretion of the Heritage Arts Advisory Committee and approval of City Council. Art grants may be used for the following allowable expenses, includes but not limited to:

- a. study units about art masters/meet the masters
- b. musical and theater productions (one per year)
- c. recorded music
- d. art/music educators (contract artists)
- e. cultural art
- f. art supplies (i.e. paint, crayons, art pencils, construction paper, glue, glitter, etc.)
- g. sheet music (must remain at school/organization)
- h. costume fabric
- i. art museum fieldtrips
- j. buses/transportation to field trips
- k. substitute teachers for required field trips
- I. concerts
- m. printing as award of art competition
- n. This item is only allowable for high schools: electronic devices* (i.e. cameras, digital cameras, devices, tablets, computers, etc.) and software* needed for digital art (devices and software to remain the property of the school organization and must remain on the premises at all times).

Examples of digital art: animations, videos, digital photography, digital collage, pixel art, etc.

- o. equipment (i.e. printers, 3D printers, ink, other supplies for printer)
- p. battery operated tea lights

16. Art grants **may not be used** for the following:

- a. food and/or refreshments
- b. tools (i.e. glue guns)
- c. lumber
- d. lights (electrical)
- e. knives or any other implement not allowed in schools
- f chaperone expenses
- g. P.A systems
- h. computer games
- i. window coverings
- j. stage curtains
- k. finished costumes
- I. mirrors
- m. audiovisual equipment
- n. shipping charges
- o. musical instruments
- p. printing (i.e. worksheets, flyers, programs, brochures)
- q. theater rental
- r. fundraising: grant funding may not be used to re-sell items funded by art grant
- s. theme park admission

- 17. Materials, devices and supplies purchased with an art grant become property of the school/organization. In the event that the teacher/applicant leaves employment at the school, school district or organization, the items purchased with the art grant must remain at the original school or organization and the successor of the art project must assume the oversight of the approved proposal.
- 18. All printed material related to the grant must list the Heritage Artwork in Public Places Program as a funder of the project(s).

REQUIREMENTS – ART GRANT APPLICATION

- 19. All proposals <u>must</u> be typed. Hand written proposals will not be considered. You may download the application from our website at <u>www.sfsheritagearts.org</u>. Please do <u>not copy</u> <u>and paste from a previous application</u>.
- 20. Proposals must be emailed to <u>kailitorres@santafesprings.org</u>. Proposals are due <u>June 14,</u> <u>2024</u>.
- 21. Art Grant applications received after due date will be disqualified.
- 22. All supporting documentation must be submitted with the application. Incomplete proposals, and proposals with insufficient clarification <u>will not</u> be considered.

REQUIREMENTS – ART GRANT FINAL FINANCIAL REPORT

- 23. By accepting the funds, the school or organization agrees to submit a final report including a financial summary by the end of the school year. These reports are due no later than <u>May</u> <u>17, 2024</u>. Failure to submit the report will result in the disqualification of the school/organization from future grants. The final report form is available on our website at <u>www.sfsheritagearts.org</u>.
- 24. It is highly recommended you invite the Heritage Arts Advisory Committee to view your project by sending an email to Kaili Torres, Management Analyst II to the Heritage Arts Advisory Committee at <u>kailitorres@santafesprings.org</u>. In your email, include a schedule of program dates and times.
- 25. Final report must be typed. Hand written reports will not be considered.
- 26. Applicant must provide photographs and/or samples of the project. This documentation must be submitted with the final report. **Grant funds may not be used for this purpose**.
- 27. If any of these guidelines are deemed unmet, the Heritage Arts Advisory Committee may elect to disallow you from submitting any future Art Education Grant Applications.

BACKGROUND

In late 2021, the City entered into a Professional Services agreement with Silverlake Conservation LLC for the purpose of assessing all art pieces in the City that are part of the Heritage Arts in Public Places program. The assessment encompassed a full examination and condition of the City's artwork, field reports, and a conservation plan. The HAAC began to review and prioritize restoration of art pieces from the assessment report provided by Silverlake Conservation. The HAAC identified three City owned art pieces in major need of restoration based on the findings of the report. These art pieces were the Omni, Soaring Dreams, and Dancing Gabrielenos. City Council approved the restoration project at its April 18, 2023 City Council meeting.

With the three projects now complete, the HAAC will review the Silverlake Conservation Art Piece condition assessment overview report will prioritize and provide direction for the next City owned art pieces in need of refurbishment or maintenance. BACKGROUND

a. Fiestas Octubre

AJUA Jalisco, in collaboration with the Government of Jalisco, Mexico, is set to host Fiestas de Octubre, a culturally rich and vibrant event that promises to be a standout celebration in Santa Fe Springs. Scheduled to run from Saturday, November 4, through Sunday, November 5, 2023, along Telegraph Road and Norwalk Boulevard, this street festival will bring together Santa Fe Springs residents and visitors in a jubilant exploration of Mexican culture, with a special emphasis on the traditions of Jalisco. This cultural celebration will highlight the rich heritage Mexico, through music (featuring various musicians including El Tri), dance, food, and more. The event is expected to raise Santa Fe Springs' profile, draw thousands of attendees, and bring economic benefits to the city's businesses. City staff is working with event organizer to fine-tune details, street closures, alternative routes, and notices to the residential and business community.

b. Letters to Santa

Santa Claus will open his satellite post office at the City Library on Monday, November 13. c. Santa Home Visits

You could be one of the lucky families to receive a special evening visit from Santa Claus and his reindeer (weather permitting) on Saturday, December 9th or Saturday, December 16th if your name is drawn in the Santa Home Visit Lottery. When Santa visits your residence, he will be available for any pictures you wish to take (please be prepared to take your own photos), to deliver presents (if desired), and spread Christmas cheer. This contest is limited to Santa Fe Springs residents only (proof of residence required). One entry per household; residents can enter the lottery for both Saturdays, but once selected, the household will be removed from the next lottery. Residences that had a Santa Home Visit in 2022 are not eligible for this year's lottery. Registration closes on Sunday, November 26th @ 11:59 p.m. and the drawing will be held on Monday, November 27that 3:00 p.m. (for December 9) and 3:30 p.m. (for December 16). The lottery can be seen via Zoom (Zoom link provided with registration confirmation email). There is no cost to enter the lottery, however if selected, a fee of \$65 will be assessed for a Santa visit and must be paid by December 7th. Resident Registration Dates: 11/1-11/26/2023.
