9. PRESENTATION

Stay Gallery, Gabriel Enamorado, Co-Founder & Executive Director and Juliana Canty, Programs Director & Curator, presented on the following:

Stay Gallery in the City of Downey

In 2012, the Stay Gallery was established in the heart of downtown Downey. It is a community art gallery and creative space that has curated and organized more than 180 art exhibitions and has provided an outlet for local artists and students to display their creative talents. Mr. Enamorado and Ms. Canty provided an in-depth understanding of the various programs, exhibitions, special events, and resources the Stay Gallery offers within their community and surrounding Southeast communities of Los Angeles. The Stay Gallery is open Thursdays and Fridays from 2:00 – 7:00 p.m. and on Saturdays from 10:00 a.m. – 2:00 p.m.

Mr. Enamorado grew up in the City of Downey and his lifelong dedication to art led him on the journey of opening the Stay Gallery. Before opening the Stay Gallery, Mr. Enamorado and his friend would put together exhibitions until eventually the City of Downey reached out to them after enjoying the exhibitions they would put together. The recognition from the City of Downey led to collaborations on exhibitions and the offer of a building for the Stay Gallery as part of the downtown master plan. They began fundraising and sharing their story to the community to help build the space. Stay has served as a central gathering place and a resource for the community to engage in artistic, cultural, and creative experiences. It was a community effort to build the space.

The exhibitions are the bread and butter of the Stay Gallery. Artists can submit their submissions online and annual calls for submissions are also made. When reviewing the submissions, they look for the story in the art piece submitted which is then showcased alongside the artwork in the gallery. A variety of classes and programs are offered through the Stay Gallery, with the most popular one being the Family Painting class. The Family Painting class is a low cost class for families that is offered once a month, led by an artist, and all materials are provided. Stay partners with local producers, groups, and organizations to create new and engaging events for local communities. The Stay Gallery also collaborates with local schools to educate and allow students to creatively express themselves. Field trips are also available for schools to schedule for the students.

The Stay Gallery is a 501(c) organization and they can assist the City of Santa Fe Springs with applying for grants, the art educational grant program, and assisting with bringing in artists to the schools. The Stay Arts can provide some of the courses for the students. Several Santa Fe Springs residents also have their artwork displayed in the Stay Gallery.

The name "Stay" reflects a desire to encourage individuals to stay and be proud of their hometown. Stay Gallery is a thriving hub for artistic and cultural expression, actively engaging with local communities and fostering creativity. Overall, the Stay Gallery is a dynamic and inclusive space that goes beyond being just an art gallery by actively contributing to the cultural and educational enrichment of the community.

10. <u>ART FEST SUBCOMMITTEE REPORT – ED RAMIREZ</u>

a) 2024 SFS Art Fest Entertainment Update/New Layout Overview

Mr. Ramirez met with art consultant, Sandra Hahn, to determine the best approach to incorporate all of the components of the Art Fest at Heritage Park. Mr. Ramirez shared a new layout with the members of where all components will take place at the new venue for the event.

Mr. Ramirez met with the Art Fest Subcommittee earlier in the month of October to discuss musical entertainment. The following bands or groups were contacted for cost:

- Orquesta Canela is an all-female group from Colombia that will be charging \$20,000.
- A Johnny Cash cover band, Cash'd Out, from Las Vegas, Nevada is estimated for \$3,000 to \$5,000.
- A Van Halen tribute band, Fan Halen, is estimated for \$6,000.
- Led Zepagain is another tribute band that was contacted but have yet to hear back from on cost.
- Bruno and the Hooligans is a Bruno Mars tribute band that was also contacted but have yet to hear back from on cost.

An open mic component was suggested for the 2024 Art Fest. A motion was made by Hilda Zamora and seconded by Francis Carbajal to approve the booking of Cash'd Out and having an Open Mic component added to the 2024 Art Fest. The motion was carried unanimously.

11. EXECUTIVE SECRETARY REPORT

Executive Secretary, Ed Ramirez reported on the following:

a) Introduction of Kaili Torres, Management Analyst II, Department of Community Services

Ms. Torres grew up in the City of Downey and has worked in municipal government since she was 15 years old. She will be located at the Gus Velasco Neighborhood Center in her new role as a Management Analyst II. Ms. Torres will assist with the Art Education Grants and other tasks under the Heritage Arts in Public Places program.

b) Approval of Heritage Arts Fund (240 & 245) Financial Report – September 2023

 September 2023 – Mr. Ramirez provided an overview of the Fiscal Year 2023/2024 financial report for the period of September 2023. Copies were distributed to members for their review. Balance: \$2,678,747.00.

A motion was made by Debbie Baker and seconded by Francis Carbajal to approve the Fiscal Year 2023/2024 financial report for the period ending in September 2023. The motion was carried unanimously.

12. OLD BUSINESS

a) City Council Approval of Revised Heritage Artwork in Public Places Program – Art Education Grant Guidelines

An update was provided to the members in regards to the revised Art Education Grant Guidelines for the fiscal year 2024-2025. City Council approved the recommended revisions with one modification in permitting Section 16e for equipment (i.e. printers, 3D printers, ink, and other supplies for printer) as an allowable expense. Staff will submit the HAAC's recommended increase of the art education grant funding from \$50,000 to \$60,000 during the fiscal year 2024-2025 budget process.

a) Conservation Art Piece Condition Assessment Prioritization

The HAAC reviewed the condition assessment report provided by the Silverlake Conservation on the art pieces in the City. Mr. Ramirez will provide photos and add a column to the list stating which art pieces are City owned or privately owned to better identify the next art pieces that will need restoration.

FISCAL IMPACT

The annual amount of funding currently budgeted for art conservation \$100,000.00 per fiscal year in the Public Art & Education Program Activity (10511001-593000).

BACKGROUND

In late 2021, the City entered into a Professional Services agreement with Silverlake Conservation LLC for the purpose of assessing all art pieces in the City that are part of the Heritage Arts in Public Places program. The assessment encompassed a full examination and condition of the City's artwork, field reports, and a conservation plan. The HAAC began to review and prioritize restoration of art pieces from the assessment report provided by Silverlake Conservation. The HAAC identified three City owned art pieces in major need of restoration based on the findings of the report. These art pieces were the Omni, Soaring Dreams, and Dancing Gabrielenos. City Council approved the restoration project at its April 18, 2023 City Council meeting.

With the three projects now complete, the HAAC will review the Silverlake Conservation Art Piece condition assessment overview report and provide direction to staff for the next City owned art pieces in need of refurbishment or maintenance. Executive Secretary, Ramirez will facilitate the prioritization of art pieces recommended by the committee members.

FISCAL IMPACT

The Traffic Signal Box program is budgeted under the Heritage Arts in Public Places program fund (10511001).

BACKGROUND

At their February 25, 2014 HAAC meeting, the Heritage Arts Advisory Committee approved and recommended to City Council the first traffic signal cabinet art work under the proposed pilot program of a Traffic Signal Box Program. The Advisory identified 11 traffic signal box locations along the Telegraph Rd. Rd. corridor. The first traffic box artwork was placed on the northeast corner of Telegraph Road and Orr and Day Road. The proposed art theme was a classic youthful "All American City" scene set in 1957, featuring a 1957 Chevy, teens, and the Santa Fe Springs Mall in the background.

Years following the HAAC recommended the following traffic signal boxes and were completed: 1) "Red Ribbon Parade" (on the northwest corner of Telegraph Road and Jersey Ave.); 2) the City's 60th Anniversary (on the corner of Telegraph Road and Pioneer Blvd.); and 4) "Book Titles" (on the corner of Alburtis Ave. and Telegraph Rd.). In 2019, the HAAC approved a 5th traffic signal box not originally on the planned 11 boxes along Telegraph which was the Fire-Rescue 60th Anniversary located directly across from Fire Station #4 on Telegraph Rd. The artwork consisted of the Fire-Rescue logo displayed on

the street side of the box and different apparatuses from the last few eras wrapping around the three other sides

The art on the traffic signal boxes continues to enhance the City's aesthetics, as well as reduce maintenance costs associated with graffiti removal. These paintings have an anti-graffiti sealant which deters graffiti. Since the initial installation of art work there have been minimal graffiti issues.

Now that the COVID-19 pandemic is behind us, staff is recommending to resume the installation of artwork on traffic signal boxes and have discussion on the next project. A power point presentation will be shown to the members.






