### **MINUTES**

### 1. CALL TO ORDER

Chairperson Gabriel Jimenez called the meeting to order at 9:01 a.m.

### 4. APPROVAL OF MINUTES

A motion was made by A.J. Hayes and seconded by Laurie Rios to approve the minutes of July 26, 2022. The motion was carried unanimously.

### 8. EXECUTIVE SECRETARY REPORT

## a) Approval of Heritage Arts Fund (240 & 245) Financial Report – July 2022

Mr. Ramirez provided an overview of the Fiscal Year 2022/2023 financial report for the month of July 2022. Copies were distributed to members for their review. Balance: \$1.8 million.

A motion was made by A.J. Hayes and seconded by Francis Carbajal to approve the FY 2022/2023 financial report for the month of July 2022. The motion was carried unanimously.

### b) Fortitude Art Piece @ Golden Springs Development

Ed Ramirez reported that on Wednesday, August 3, 2022, he was notified by Faye Lengyl, Director of Industrial Property Management for the Golden Springs Development Company that the Fortitude Art Piece by artist Dee Clements was stolen. The art piece constructed of bronze is part of the Heritage Arts in Public Places program and is located on Carmenita Rd. and Foster Rd. A specific date could not been identified of the theft, however it is suspected it was stolen between July 10<sup>th</sup> and July 22, 2022. A police report was filed by Golden Springs Development Company and fortunately the art piece was insured. The Development Company will keep the City apprised on any developments to include updates on replacement of the art piece.

### 9. OLD BUSINESS

### a) City Council approval of FY 2022-2023 funds for City's Art in Public Places Art Education Grant Program Update

Mr. Ramirez reported the City Council approved the appropriation of funds for the FY 2022-2023 Art in Public Places Art Education Grants totaling \$49,539.00 at the August 2, 2022 council meeting.

As part of the approval, City Council denied the Department of Community Services applications for "Chalk it out" and "Digital Art 101 for Teens". The funding was applied to approve the Lakeview Elementary "Art in Action", Santa Fe High School "Forum Musical Festival and "Food Fun" applications.

Ms. Carbajal expressed concerns regarding the denial of funds for the "Chalk it out" and "Digital Art 101 for Teens" programs. Mr. Ramirez reported that the proposed Department of Community Services programs will be funded utilizing city general funds. He also informed the committee that staff prepared notification letters and is working with the City's Finance Department to provide payment to each approved applicant.

#### 10.2023 ART FEST SUBCOMMITTE REPORT

### a) Subcommittee Update

Ed Ramirez updated the Heritage Arts Advisory Committee (HAAC) on items discussed at their meeting held on August 25, 2022. The members of the HAAC recommended a \$10.00 entry fee for both the Art Fest and Preview Showcase Night, a \$35.00 paint and wine event, VIP Tickets for those that participated in Chamber Events, the time extension for the Preview Showcase Night, the participation of the food vendors during the Preview Showcase Night, fees for Artist to showcase their work, and to move the date for the Preview Showcase Night and the SFS Art Fest to April 28<sup>th</sup> with the Preview and Showcase night on April 27<sup>th</sup>.

### b) Art Fest Financial Report

Mr. Ramirez reviewed the 2022 Art Fest Financial Report with the committee.

### c) 2023 Art Consultant Professional Service Agreement

Mr. Ramirez reviewed the 2023 Art Consultant Professional Service Agreement with the HAAC Committee. The agreement will be submitted to City Council for approval at the September 6, 2022 council meeting.

#### 11. NEW BUSINESS

### a) Santa Fe Springs Oranges Mural Event

Ed Ramirez contacted Ms. McMenamin prior to the refurbishment to inform her that the entire Mural was being removed due to the dismantling and refurbishment of the boxcar and its deteriorating condition. Ms. McMenamin understood the circumstances and submitted an estimate for replication. The estimate totaling \$54,000.00 includes her recommendations on how the Mural shall be recreated.

HAAC members requested that Ed Ramirez negotiate with McMenamin's proposed contract and research other artists for cost comparison. Further follow up will be reported at a future HAAC meeting.

### b) \*Review, Discussion and Approval of Art Education Grant Guidelines

The HAAC reviewed, discussed, and made appropriate revisions to the FY 2023-24 Art Education Grant Guidelines. Approval of the 2023-2024 Art Education Guidelines will take place at the September 27, 2022 HAAC meeting.

### OLD BUSINESS

Review and Approve FY 2023-2024 Art Education Grant Guidelines

### **RECOMMENDATION**

Staff recommends that the Heritage Arts Advisory Committee:

 Review and approve revised Art Education Grant Guidelines for Fiscal Year 2023-24.

### BACKGROUND

The Art Education Grant Program is overseen by the Heritage Arts Advisory Committee in an advisory capacity. Funded by the Heritage Arts in Public Places program, the Heritage Arts Education Endowment Fund was established to support youth oriented arts programs and events with Art Education Grants. Interested schools in Santa Fe Springs have the opportunity to submit applications annually requesting funds to help support their art education programs. Applicants must follow the Art Education Grant Guidelines when completing their applications.

Art Education Grant Guidelines were previously adopted by the Heritage Arts Advisory Committee in order to provide applicants detailed instructions on how to prepare and submit their grant applications. Grant Guidelines also assist the committee when reviewing and approving proposals, as it helps ensure that complete proposals are awarded.

At the August 30, 2022 HAAC meeting, the HAAC reviewed and discussed the current Art Education Grant guidelines and made revisions to the FY 2023-24 Art Education Grant Guidelines.

Attached to this report are the revised FY 2023-2024 guidelines for review and approval. It is recommended that the committee review the document and be ready to approve at the September 27, 2022 HAAC meeting.

### **ART EDUCATION GRANT GUIDELINES**

### ELIGIBILITY

- 1. Grants are provided to schools or organizations predominantly serving Santa Fe Springs students in grades K 12.
- 2. Proposals must clearly explain how children's knowledge and awareness of art will be enhanced.
- 3. Proposals must clearly explain how the art grant will provide age and skills appropriate learning opportunities.
- 4. Art Education Programs must provide hands-on and/or learning projects that may culminate into exhibitions, productions, demonstrations, or art-related fieldtrips.
- 5. Project must be completed during the funding cycle.
- 6. For schools, projects may take place during regular school hours, and/or after school.
- 7. Only principals, teachers and/or program directors may apply for the grant. For teachers and program directors, the **principal** of your school or the **executive director** of your organization must review and sign the proposal. School and/or organization volunteers and/or aides are not eligible to apply. Contract artist(s) MAY NOT apply or sign applications.
- 8. Contract artist(s) must be over the age of 21.
- 9. Only one application per teacher/program director may be submitted. (*Except when a teacher/program director submits an application for two different schools.*) Principals may apply for one grant for their school.
- 10. It is expected that your art project is collaborative, both financially as well as in implementation. Failure to list how this will be accomplished and with whom could reduce or eliminate funding for your project. Parent group involvement, fundraising activities, and/or sponsorships are required. List all participants and/or funds contributed towards the project.

### BUDGET (AMOUNT NOT TO EXCEED \$5,000)

- 11. The budget must clearly identify how the funds will be used.
- 12. Applicant MUST submit itemized budget template included in application.
- 13. Art grants must be spent for the approved program. Supplies must be used during the school year for which the grant was awarded. **Monies not spent must be returned**.
- 14. The grant may only be used for approved projects. <u>Any changes to the approved project must be</u> <u>submitted in writing and receive approval from the committee before implementation</u>. Changes without approval could result in requesting the return of the grant funds and/or being disqualified from future grants.

- 15. Art grants may be used for the following allowable expenses:
  - a. study units about art masters/meet the masters
  - b. musical and theater productions (one per year)
  - c. recorded music
  - d. art/music educators (contract artists)
  - e. cultural art
  - f. art supplies (i.e. paint, crayons, art pencils, construction paper, glue, glitter, etc.)
  - g. sheet music (must remain at school/organization)
  - h. costume fabric
  - i. art museum fieldtrips
  - j. buses/transportation to field trips
  - k. substitute teachers for required field trips
  - l. concerts
  - m. printing as award of art competition
  - n. electronic devices\* (tablets, computers, etc.) and software\* needed for digital art (devices must remain on school grounds)

Examples of digital art: animations, videos, digital photography, digital collage, pixel art, etc. \*expense only allowable for high schools

#### 16. Art grants may not be used for the following:

- a. food and/or refreshments
- b. tools
- c. lumber
- d. lights
- e. equipment
- f. knives or any other implement not allowed in schools
- g. chaperone expenses
- h. P.A systems
- i. computer games
- j. window coverings
- k. stage curtains
- 1. finished costumes
- m. mirrors
- n. audiovisual equipment
- o. shipping charges
- p. musical instruments
- q. printing (i.e. worksheets, flyers, programs, brochures)
- r. theater rental
- s. fundraising: grant funding may not be used to re-sell items funded by art grant
- 17. Materials, devices and supplies purchased with an art grant become property of the school/organization. In the event that the teacher/applicant leaves employment at the school, school district or organization, the items purchased with the art grant must remain at the original school or organization and the successor of the art project must assume the oversight of the approved proposal.
- 18. All printed material related to the grant must list the Heritage Artwork in Public Places Program as a funder of the project(s).

### **REQUIREMENTS – ART GRANT APPLICATION**

- 19. All proposals <u>must</u> be typed. Hand written proposals will not be considered. You may download the application from our website at <u>www.sfsheritagearts.org</u>. Please do <u>not copy and paste from a</u> <u>previous application</u>.
- 20. Proposals must be emailed to <u>RubyPicon@santafesprings.org</u>. Proposals are due <u>June 16, 2023</u>.
- 21. Art Grant applications received after due date will be disqualified.
- 22. All supporting documentation must be submitted with the application. Incomplete proposals, and proposals with insufficient clarification <u>will not</u> be considered.

### REQUIREMENTS – ART GRANT FINAL FINANCIAL REPORT

- 23. By accepting the funds, the school or organization agrees to submit a final report including a financial summary by the end of the school year. These reports are due no later than <u>May 19, 2023</u>. Failure to submit the report will result in the disqualification of the school/organization from future grants. The final report form is available on our website at <u>www.sfsheritagearts.org</u>.
- 24. It is highly recommended you invite the Heritage Arts Advisory Committee to view your project by sending an email to Edmund Ramirez, Executive Secretary to the Heritage Arts Advisory Committee at <u>EdmundRamirez@santafesprings.org</u>. In your email, include a schedule of program dates and times.
- 25. Final report must be typed. Hand written reports will not be considered.
- 26. Applicant must provide photographs and/or samples of the project. This documentation must be submitted with the final report. Grant funds may not be used for this purpose.
- 27. If any of these guidelines are deemed unmet, the Heritage Arts Advisory Committee may elect to disallow you from submitting any future Art Education Grant Applications.

### Halloween Carnival & Haunted House Update

The annual Haunted House event has traditionally been held at the Activity Center in Santa Fe Springs. As a result of the State of Emergency imposed by the COVID-19 pandemic, the Haunted House was cancelled in 2020 and 2021. In previous years, the Haunted House is traditionally assembled in-house by City staff. Unfortunately, due to various unrelated maintenance tasks and other ongoing projects, the City does not have the staffing levels to support the assembly of the Haunted House. An administrative decision was made to publicly solicit bids for the assembly and removal of the Haunted House by a contractor. On July 21, 2022, the City received a total of one bid for this project, in the amount of \$52,800. The bid was presented to the City Council on August 16, 2022. At that meeting, the City Council gave direction to not move forward with the Haunted House and bring back options to enhance the Halloween carnival.

The annual Halloween Carnival will take place on Saturday, October 29, 2022 at Los Nietos Park beginning at 5 p.m. Fun and exciting activities are planned for the entire family in a safe environment. Children will have the opportunity to win candy and prizes at free game booths and have fun at the no-cost inflatable play zone. There will also be photo opportunities available for \$3. The on-stage costume parade will begin at 6:30 p.m. and medals will be presented to everyone who participates.

### Creepy in the Park After Dark Lantern Tour

Join members of the Heritage Park Paranormal Society as they scour the park for ghostly visitors. Admission is free but donations are always welcome. This event is hosted by the Santa Fe Springs Historical and Community Preservation Advisory Committee. The event will be held on Friday, October 21 at 7 p.m. at Heritage Park.

### Aquatic Center Update

Staff held the final community engagement meeting on Wednesday, August 24, 2022 via zoom. The Aquatic Center Survey opened on June 1, 2022 and closed on August 28, 2022. Staff collected 394 survey responses, as well as various feedback from the community engagement activities. Throughout the summer, and at the direction of City Council, staff met with six advisory committees and held a separate meeting with former lifeguards, a meeting with the teens, and a meeting with the older adults at the Gus Velasco Neighborhood Center. Staff will be compiling the results over the next several weeks to present to the community and City Council. Additionally, staff solicited Request for Proposals (RFP) to provide design, architecture and engineering Services for the Santa Fe Springs Aquatic Center. A total of four proposals were received. Staff is in the process of reviewing and evaluating each proposal based on project-specific criteria. A recommendation for an award of contract will be brought at a future City Council meeting.

### Youth Basketball League

The Youth Basketball program is designed to expose children ages 7 to 13 to the fundamental skills of basketball within a recreational league setting. The program allows children to experience teamwork and sportsmanship. Registration will begin on November 1, 2022.

### **Hoopstars Clinic**

The Hoopstars Clinic is designed to teach the fundamental skills of basketball while building interpersonal relations through teamwork and an appreciation for physical activity. Participants will learn sport-specific offensive and defensive positions, basic game concepts, and fundamental skills, such as dribbling, passing, and shooting. Registration will begin on November 1, 2022.

### Holiday Basketball Toy Drive Tournament

The City will be hosting a Holiday Basketball Toy Drive Tournament on December 10 and 11, 2022, at the Activity Center. The cost to participate is \$125 per team and each player must bring 1 unwrapped toy valued at \$10 or more. All toys will be donated to the City's Neighborly Elf Program.

### T.E.E.N.S. and The Club Programs

The Club and T.E.E.N.S. program will offer a variety of activities in September and October. Below is a listing of each of those activities:

- Self Defense for Teens: September 28, 2022, 6:00-8:00 p.m.
- Cooking Skills: October 12, 2022, 6:00-8:00 p.m.
- Tech Tues Tinkercard 3D Software: October 18, 2022, 4:00-5:30 p.m.
- Halloween Games & Activities: October 17-21, 2022, 4:00-5:30 p.m.
- Scary Pizza Night: October 26, 2022, 6:00-8:00 p.m.

### Adult & Pediatric First Aid/CPR/AED Courses

This course is for ages 13 and older. The Red Cross course incorporates the latest science and teaches students to recognize and care for a variety of first aid emergencies such as burns, cuts, scrapes, sudden illness, head, neck, back injuries, heat and cold emergencies, and how to respond to berating and cardiac emergencies to help victims of any age – adults (12 years and older) and pediatric (infants and children up to 12 years of age). There are 2 options for this course. You can take the certification course for a fee of \$75 and receive a certificate for First Aid/CPR/AED from the American Red Cross upon successful completion, or you can take this as an information course for \$40 (but you will not receive a certificate). Courses will be offered on October 15, 2022 and November 12, 2022.

### New Adaptive Recreation Programming

One of the goals of the Community Services Department that was established in March of this year, was to offer adaptive recreation programming to community members that have a disability. Staff has been working in collaboration with the Library and Family and Human Services staff to create new offerings. Offerings will begin in January 2023 and will include a weekly activity out of Town Center Hall (Thursday Club), and monthly themed dances. More details will be available on the Winter Quarterly.

### Holiday Basket Program Volunteer Orientation

In preparation of the fast approaching holidays, Family and Human Services Division will be holding the Holiday Basket Program Volunteer orientation on Wednesday, October 26, at 5:30 p.m. at the Gus Velasco Neighborhood Center. The orientation will provide an overview of the holiday events and review the Volunteer Policy & Procedures handbook approved by City Council in March 2018. Family and Human Services (FHS) Manager Ed Ramirez and Community Services Supervisor, Jose Carrillo will facilitate the orientation to include case management staff. Topics to be discussed during the orientation include the donation policy, the roles of volunteers and staff, code of conduct, client assessment, referral, and approval process. The orientation will also provide volunteers the various duties and applicant process of ongoing volunteers.
