Sculpture Garden

This site was once the home of the native Tongva and a hot springs cure-all attraction with its own Santa Fe railroad spur. The Sculpture Garden was dedicated in 1999 and features art that incorporates design elements from fossils, flora and fauna, indigenous populations and the oil boom of Santa Fe Springs.



Heritage Springs Business Park


Once the site of the Tongva people, the artwork in this area celebrates their culture and way of life. In more recent times, the area also saw many oil blowouts and fires. The largest blowout, which occurred in 1921, left a crater 100 feet wide and 30 feet deep.



Get some fresh air, wear some good walking shoes and learn a bit about this city's public art by joining the Santa Fe Springs' Art Walk.

The Art Walk route incorporates
Heritage Park, the Heritage Springs
Sculpture Garden and the Heritage
Springs Business Park. These sites are
located in the heart of the city and
contain historic buildings, museum
exhibits, murals, fountains and
sculptures.

The Art in Public Places program celebrates art that reflects the City of Santa Fe Springs' history: from the indigenous people who settled here to the Spanish and Mexican cultures; from the Victorian agrarian society to the 1920's oil boom. All of the art pieces that are included in the Art Walk reflect this historic sensibility and celebration of the different cultures that created the City of Santa Fe Springs.

Water Trails 9 **By: Michael Amescua** Celebrates the beautiful Southern California scenery.




