Incident Response for May

Total calls for this period were 115. EMS related calls totaled 97, fire related calls were 5 (woods or wildland fires). There were 7 calls for non-emergency service (animal rescue, assist invalids, water removal, issue burn permits), 4 were for hazardous conditions (flammable liquid spill, down power lines, trees down), and 2 were for accidental alarm activations.

Mutual Aid calls for May were as follows. Winslow received mutual aid on several occasions: 2 transports and 18 paramedic intercepts requested with 12 paramedic intercepts provided. Additionally, Winslow received mutual aid from Vassalboro for a woods fire. The transports from Delta were the result of personnel previously dispatched to another emergency and our ambulance having routine maintenance performed. Winslow provided mutual aid to Waterville twice (once for a shed fire and once for a truck fire), once to China (for a building fire), and once to Vassalboro for a motor vehicle accident with entrapment.

Department News

One member of the department continues the paramedic program at KVCC. Unless the school limits in class participation due to Covid constraints the program will take one year to complete. The commitment of this employee demonstrates the level of resolve the members have for providing the highest level of care to our community.

I had the privilege of traveling with Honor Flight Maine to Washington, D.C. as a Guardian for a veteran visiting the war monuments. Each veteran that travels is accompanied by a guardian. We traveled Memorial Day weekend with a total of 90 other veterans and guardians. One of which was a World War II veteran. We visited the World War II memorial, the U.S. Air Force memorial, the Women's War memorial, Arlington National Cemetery, the Viet Nam memorial, the Korean War memorial, U.S. Navy memorial. Several women veterans were honored for their service at the Women's War memorial. And for only the second time in its history, Arlington National Cemetery allowed people to walk across the Tomb Plaza in front of the Tomb of the Unknown Soldier to lay Flowers of Remembrance. This was an extremely moving and memorable weekend.



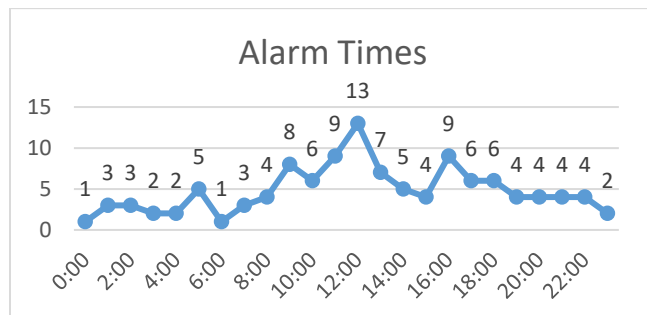
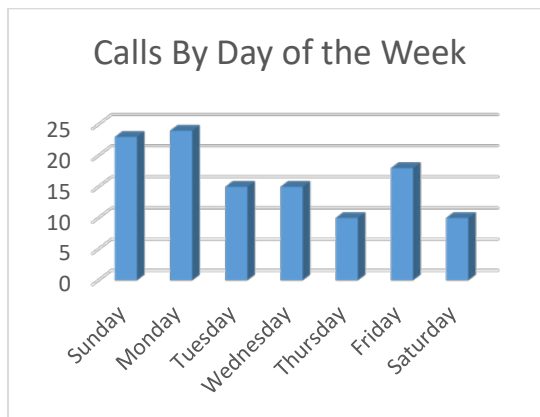
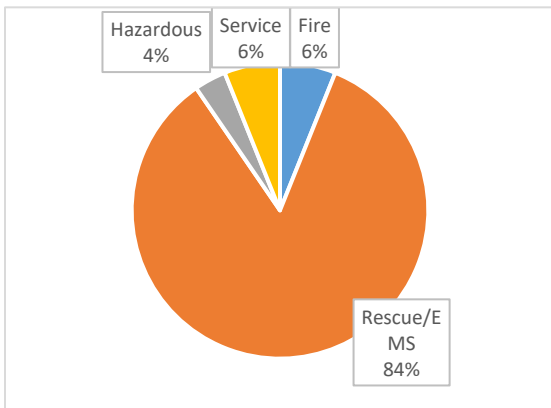
The following is a breakdown of the EMS transport service for the month and for year to date. There are approximately \$127,000 in accounts receivable currently outstanding. The table below indicates receipts and expenses associated with the service.

Contracted Services are costs associated with our mutual aid agreement with Delta and the fee for the medical billing service. The Per Diem line is the cost associated with hiring peak part time paramedics. The department budget has a line item for Part Time employees. It should also be noted that the ALS supplies are annually budgeted items that would have been expenditures incurred regardless of having a transport service.

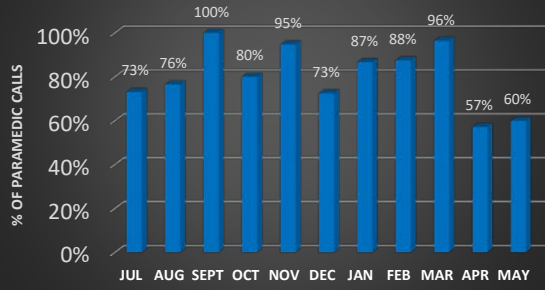
For the month of May, the department transported 54 patients.
