She stated, one of Ms. Hammer has ideas would be to establish a procedure on how to move the Airbnb community into compliance by creating rules regarding short term rentals and Lodgers Tax collection. Vice-Chairman Kelley gave an update on the City of Ruidoso, NM that they are not interested in renewing the contract with Airbnb to collect lodger tax. They have decided to collect the lodger's tax on their own. Vice-Chairman Kelley confirmed Gross Receipts Tax for NM is still charged by and collected through Airbnb when a reservation is made.

Linda DeMarino, Member - Made note to the two vacant board positions that still need to be filled; Lodging and Tourism. She also updated the board on the "Contract" she and Tammy Gardner, Executive Assistant has been delayed due to Member DeMarino has been out of town.

Vice-Chairman Kelley – Gave a report that the Lodgers Tax Funding Guidelines were presented and approved by the City Commission. She would now like to see all the approved Lodgers Tax forms be accessible through the City website.







CAMPING: Over 300 developed campsites are available at the three New Mexico State Parks and there are hundreds more, both with and without services, throughout the Gila National Forest.

There are HIKING TRAILS, nature walks and guided tours in the State Parks on the Byway. The Gila National Forest has hundreds of miles of hiking trails, as well as a number of interpretive trails;


22 miles of the Continental Divide Trail run through the Aldo Leopold Wilderness and can be accessed from Hwy. 59 near Beaverhead or from the Rocky Canyon Campground near San Lorenzo.





BICYCLE traffic is common along the byway. Local bicyclists often take their bikes by car out to a section of the byway, leave the car safely parked

along the side of the road and ride their bicycles for several miles and back to the car.



BEAVERHEAD, a forest service administrative site is the end of pavement for the Black Range entrance

to the Aldo Leopold Wilderness, part of the 3 million acre Gila National Forest. Motorized vehicles are not allowed in the Wilderness area but from here you can explore on foot, horseback or mountain bike. No camping is allowed in the administrative site but when the office is staffed,



information on facilities is available. Outdoor bath rooms are available year-round.










FOREST ROAD 150, is no longer a part of the Byway but it remains a side trip for those wit high clearance, 4-wheel drive and a sense c adventure. FR-150 travels through the Aldo Leopole Wilderness creating a loop back to the trail of th



Mtn Spirits Sceni Byway at Hwy 3. which will take yo to San Lorenzo an southern end of th Byway. Highlight FR-150 on clude a viev of Wall Lake Diamond Creek and Blac

Canyon Trails, several campgrounds and acces points to the Continental Divide Trail. FR-150 is close during the winter months.

CONTINENTAL DIVIDE NATIONAL SCENIC TRAIL

(CDNST), a side trip, crosses Rt. 59 near Beaverhead and cuts across the center ridge line of the Aldo Leopold Wilderness then into the Gila National Forest. The wild landscape with deep canyons, tree covered

peaks and spectacular vista points offer a rich and unique experience in nature. The area abounds with deer, elk, wild turkey, and birds plus mountain vegetation.









MONTICELLO BOX & OJO CALIENTE A side trip, about 9 miles north of the junction of NM 59 on NM 52, brings you to the site of the army camp for the Warm Springs Apache Reservation and the location where Geronimo was captured in 1877.

Located on private property, the site is visible from the dirt road where you can view the cut in the hill which is Monticello Box Canyon. The road through the box has been closed and the remains of the old fort have been destroyed. Please respect No Trespassing signs.







WINSTON The Winston Historic District's old houses, stores, and buildings date from the boom days of late 1800s silver mines. At its height the town had a population of about 1,500. This area, once home to Warm Spring Apaches, is now used for cattle grazing; open range cattle are often seen walking on the road. A Community Fiesta with a parade, barbecue, flea market, cow-chip poker and a dance is held yearly in June.






when silver chloride ore was discovered, at its height was home to three thousand residents. Like other silver-producing towns in the region, it was wiped out during the silver panic of 1893. Today, the old buildings are being restored and the Pioneer Store is now a world-class museum list-

ed on the New Mexico Office of Cultural Affairs' list of Historic Places. The Monte Cristo Saloon & Dance hall, next door to the Museum, is now a beautiful gallery and gift store.





from a local Apache chief, was settled by Hispanic farmers and ranchers in the 1850s. It became a stop for the stagecoach line and a resting place for travelers in the late 1800s, being midway between the railroad in



Engle and the mines near Chloride and Winston.

MONTICELLO is laid out in traditional Spanish style, with a church, stores and businesses surrounding a central plaza. The outer walls of the perimeter buildings were thick adobe with gunsight holes for defense, and the remains of the old adobe town walls are still visible. Today the land supports



organic farming and the plaza is a small community park. San Ignacio Catholic Mission, built in 1867, still stands on the north side and is used regularly. There are no stores or facilities available, and all buildings are on private property.

room facilities, restaurants, gas and diesel may be found in our larger communities.



This section of the Byway runs south inside the Rio Grande valley, which has for centuries been an agricultural and transportation corridor along the Rio Grande the fourth longest river in the world. Interstate 25, the major north-south road in New Mexico, runs parallel to the Rio Grande and provides easy access to the river towns which have most of the County's population and services. The non-urban roads in this area are state-maintained highways with two 12-foot-wide paved driving lanes and intermittent shoulders

of New Mexico's newest cities, is named for an ancient volcanic cone which sits in the lake and resembles an elephant's head. Elephant Butte Dam, the largest at the time of construction (1911-1916), was the first in the US for flood control and irrigation. It is New Mexico's

largest and most popular lake with outdoor recreation and events throughout the year. Elephant Butte Lake State Park has full park services, excellent fishing, swimming and water sports. Come in



Side Trip to Percha Dam State Park Just south of Caballo Lake, Percha Dam State Park is a quiet, serene getaway under the shade of tall cottonwoods,



Russian olives, and salt cedars. Along with the 2 other State Parks on the Byway, Percha is designated an Audubon Important Birding Area and is one of the top 5 birding sites in New Mexico. It is spectacular during the spring and autumn migration seasons.


Full park services are available and this is a popular area for fishing.











Leaving Caballo, the Byway runs west for about 50 miles on Highway 152, ascending from the Rio Grande Valley through



ranch country, over the pine-forested Black Range Mountains through Emory Pass, and then descending toward scrub-dotted slopes. During rare times of severe weather these roads may be closed, and stay closed until cleared. Parts of this road run through open


range where cattle have the legal right-of-way.

HILLSBORO was founded in 1877 when gold and silver



KINGSTON is another old mining town of the 1880s, with a wild and wooly reputation. The Percha Bank Museum and Art Gallery is open by appointment 575-895-5652. The Schoolhouse Museum is open 2 weekends a month. Sadie Orchard's first brothel was on Virtue Ave, and Mark Twain and

Butch Cassidy and gang were frequent visitors. Walking Tour Guides are available at the historic Black Range Lodge. Kingston's Historic District features several buildings and the town bell, cast from ore from local mines. The old cemetery outside the town is still in use.











From Kingston to **EMORY PASS** the road gains nearly 3000 feet in altitude over nine miles, and crests at Emory Pass. This magnificent viewpoint at above



8,000 feet overlooks mountains, valleys and Caballo Lake over 50 miles to the east. An extensive system of trails offers pleasant hikes through cool forested mountains or along shady streams.

along shady streams. Backpackers will find plenty of beautiful, wild, rugged, and remote country for long trips in quiet solitude.







Leaving Emory Pass, the terrain changes from towering pines on the mountains and cliffs overshadowing the road to gentle slopes, with juniper, cedar and scrub oak, until it reaches the Mimbres River Valley at **SAN LORENZO** where

the Geronimo Trail National Scenic Byway ends and the Trail of the Mountain

ENGLE lies on the Jornada del Muerto, the roughest section of the El Camino Real. Built in 1879 as a station on the Atchison, Topeka and Santa Fe Railroad, Engle became a

thriving cattle town and shipping point for ore and supplies. The area east of town was restricted by the U.S. government when it created White Sands Missile Range in 1945, and that spelled the end. The headquarters of the historic Armendaris Ranch are located in Engle, which is also the town nearest Spaceport America.

PASEO DEL RIO/FISH HATCHERY PARK.

location of a fish hatchery 1930s-1950s, is a part of

Elephant Butte Lake State Park and provides a more remote, less crowded atmosphere for day use and camping. There are no sewer or electric services offered but there is a comfort station with showers.











me vinage of Cavano is the gateway to Caballo Lake and Percha Dam State Parks. The town and the lake are both named after the mountains and the mountains were named for the herds of wild horses found to be



descendants of the horses brought here in the late 1500 Sierra de los Caballos literally means "Mountain C The Horses." The original community of Caballe dating back to 1908, is under water. In 1938, when the lake behind Caballo Dam began to fill, it covered th homes of settlers. These families moved their homes t the foothills on the west side of the Rio Grande, when they continued to raise livestock.









Side Trip to Caballo Lake State Park At 18 mile long, this is the second largest body of water

in New Mexico. Caballo Lake State Park offe family-oriented and mostly ADA-accessible services, picnicking, nature trails, swimming & boating. Popular with people who like to fish active rivers year-round, the lake also atracts windsurfers from April through October, particularly, near the dam.











"Mesa, mountain and forest, valley and desert and rolling upland - silence and the mellow sunlight over all" Eugene Manlove Rhodes "A Nu

formed in 1884, with Hillsboro the County Seat. The ruins the old Victorian-style courthouse still stand. The village features the Black Range Museum (open by appointment), the 130-year-old General Store (now a restaurant), lodging, shops, a winery and art galleries. The Hillsboro Historical Society has a center open on weekends. The Hillsboro Community Center sponsors high-quality musical events throughout the year.











From Hillsboro you can take a side trip to **LAKE VALLEY**, a ghost town about 18 miles south. Named in 1878 for ancient lake beds nearby, this silver mining town had a heyday population of over 4000 people. Today Lake Valley is cared for by the Bureau of Land

Management, and remains fairly intact. Weathered wooden buildings, a school, a garage and several houses still survive. This was the location of the Bridal Chamber Mine, one of the richest veins of silver ever discovered.
