

Mini-Grant Application 2023-24

Deadline: October 23, 2023



The Williamsville Education Foundation, Inc., believes that investing directly in the creativity and commitment of teachers is one of the best ways to improve student learning and achievement. The Foundation's Mini-Grant Program was introduced in 2001 to help foster and support innovative approaches by teachers that enrich learning opportunities for children.

Since the Mini-Grant Program began, the Foundation has provided nearly \$85,000 to help support a diverse spectrum of educational enrichment activities for Williamsville students. The awards, up to \$500 each, fund worthwhile classroom projects, programs or activities that might otherwise not be possible because of limited school budgets (please see reverse side for a partial list of past awards).

All grant applications are reviewed and considered by a selection committee of the Williamsville Education Foundation Board, which then presents its recommendations to the full board for deliberation and approval. Grants are announced and awarded in January.

We are now accepting proposals from faculty members for the 2023-24 school year. The deadline for submission is OCTOBER 23, 2023.

Requests for mini-grant funds must include:

- A letter describing the project/item/activity
- Cost quote no more than \$500
- Expected outcome and how it relates to curriculum and student learning
- Timeline for implementation
(Note – the distribution of funds usually takes place in January)
- A copy of this cover sheet with your building principal's signature and Assistant Superintendent's signature

Please note: Furniture including chairs, tables, etc. will not be considered.

Successful applicants will be asked to provide feedback to the WEF Board about how the mini-grant funds affected learning outcomes for students.
