# Chinook Road Open

The Town Council held several public hearings during the summer to consider



whether to open Chinook Road in both directions or to continue with the original decision to open the road only for egress traffic (similar to Nootka). Several residents testified and a petition signed by 51 residents was presented for consideration.

### English Ivy -Hedera helix

English Ivy has a major impact on Woodway. You might be surprised to learn that the plant that many

view as an attractive accent to well manicured lawns is actually listed by the State as a Class C weed. It is an

ecological threat!

English ivy is a vigorous growing vine. It grows both as a ground cover and a climbing vine. As the ivy climbs in search of increased light, it engulfs and kills branches by blocking light from reaching the tree's leaves. This often leaves the tree with



just a small green "broccoli head," with the tree eventually succumbing entirely from the infestation. Before its death, however, the added weight of the vines makes trees much more susceptible to blow-over during high rain and wind events. Trees heavily draped with ivy can be hazardous if they are growing near

Pine Street for at least six months.



roads, walkways, homes and other populated areas.

To combat the ivy and protect our trees, the Public Works Department has begun to cut ivy from the base of all trees located within the Town's right of ways. You can help in this

process. If you have ivy growing on your trees, simply cut the ivy at the base of each tree.

It was decided to open Chinook in both directions as it

would not only be a convenience for neighbors residing

condominium construction along the western section of

drive carefully as they will encounter Pt. Edwards

in the Estates, but it would ease traffic in other neighborhoods as well (Algonquin and Park Road).

The Public Works Department has a goal of reducing and eventually eradicating invasive noxious weeds such as ivy from all of the Town's rights of way. We encourage all residents to join the Town in this effort. Take a good look in your own yards and consider ivy removal as a gardening priority. It will be a long term project but worth the effort.

### Traffic Count

The Public Works crew recently placed a traffic counting unit on various streets throughout the town. Here are the results:

- Algonouin averaged 765 vehicles per day with an average speed of 25.5 MPH.
- Woodway Park Road averaged 1720 vehicles per day with an average speed of 29.9 MPH.
- Timberlane had 1730 vehicles per day 28 MPH.
- 241st street saw 500 cars per day with an average speed of 25.7 MPH.

We will be looking at conducting regular traffic counts in the future as a tool in assigning police for traffic enforcement and in identifying areas for road maintenance.
