MAYOR'S MESSAGE

A CHANGE IN FIRE SERVICES

Woodway will be served by the Shoreline Fire Department beginning January 1, 2014. Let me tell you why.

Woodway, as well as most Washington State municipalities, pays a high sum for annual fire suppression and emergency medical care. Let's be honest, public safety services are a priority for communities and they are expensive due to the 24-hour availability and specialized services required. It is Woodway's highest expenditure, comprising more than a third of our annual operating budget.

Up until December, 2009, Woodway had contracted with the City of Edmonds for these services. That changed when Edmonds transferred their program to Fire District 1. At that time, Woodway approached both Shoreline Fire District and Fire District 1 in hopes of securing a fire/emergency services contract that was cost effective for our community. While both proposals were close in dollar amounts, Fire District 1 was selected because of their expertise in serving south Snohomish County cities as well as the prospect of forming a regional fire authority

This past August, both Shoreline Fire District and Fire District 1 were invited to submit proposals for service provision. Contract finances and response times were the primary focus of the Council's deliberations with the goal of selecting the best service program at the lowest cost. It was noted that Shoreline's proposal would reduce the average response times to a larger number of residents for a very competitive cost approximately \$50,000 per year LESS than our current contract

with Fire District 1. After careful consideration, the Shoreline proposal was approved.

Woodway residents will not do anything different. If you have an emergency, dial 911. Your call will automatically be routed to the Shoreline Fire Department.

If you have a locked entrance gate, you do need to do something and soon! Please contact Town Hall ASAP so that our staff can share this information with the Shoreline fire officials. There may be some properties that will need to modify their gate's security box in order to assure quick access for emergency vehicles. The safety of

your family starts with a phone call to Town

Hall.

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TOWN HALL DEDICATION AND GRAND OPENING

Mayor Nichols shared that she and the Council spent three years researching, discussing, and finally deciding to build a new facility.

The project had 3 primary goals:

- The facility must blend in with the residential neighborhood of 113th Place W. Our community did not want a cold municipal facility.
- The project must not drain

Woodway's financial resources. A bond with a remarkably low interest rate (2.7%) financed the construction. The debt service will be paid for with real estate taxes and a small portion of property taxes (less than 4% of the operating budget).

 The finished product would be a community resource, available to residents for private functions.






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STATE SUPREME COURT HOLDS HEARING ON POINT WELLS CASE

Late last month, the State Supreme Court held a hearing on our appeal of a Court of Appeals ruling that would allow the development of over 3,000 housing units and 100,000 square feet of commercial space on 30 developable acres at Point Wells. As you may recall, Woodway and Save Richmond Beach had argued that Snohomish County did not comply with a State Environmental Protection Act requirement to consider reasonable alternatives when rezoning Point Wells from an industrial zone to a mixed-use zone. The Court of Appeals overturned a trial court ruling that found Snohomish County's rezone of Point Wells unlawful.

We expect the Supreme Court to issue its ruling sometime in the first half of 2014. If we are successful, a development at Point Wells would have to be substantially smaller. If we are unsuccessful, we will evaluate specific environmental impacts of the proposed development to ensure, to the extent legally possible, that the project minimizes impacts on the surrounding neighborhood.



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DON'T REGRET BEING UNPREPARED!

Hurricane Haiyan, Superstorm Sandy...we imagine that this kind of disaster can never happen here... and then events like the Hanukkah Eve windstorm of 2006 or the 2001 Nisqually quake affect our region

significantly!



During the windstorm, almost half of the state lost power for as long as 6 days. The earthquake

made many buildings uninhabitable, bridges failed, and families had trouble reconnecting as phone lines were jammed.

My name is Amy Day, and I live here in Woodway. With an extensive background with the American Red Cross and trained as a Community Emergency Response Team member, I will be writing a series of articles to highlight specific disaster preparedness steps we can take so Woodway families can be ready!

During the next three months, let's make it a goal to put together a basic emergency kit for your family and store it in a handy place inside a waterproof container. You can create your own disaster kit or purchase them from the Red Cross, stores like Costco and Sam's Club, or from numerous on-line sources.

Important items to include in your kit are listed below.

Water

- 1 Gallon of Water per person per day
- Additional water for pets

Food

- Non-perishable food: two meals per person per day; choose foods that are easy to carry, nutritious, and ready-to-eat
- Food for pets

Emergency Kit

- Medical supplies and first aid manual
- Prescription medication, extra eyeglasses, contact lens solution, etc.
- Money and matches in a waterproof container
- Hygiene supplies
- Portable radio, flashlights and extra batteries
- Fire extinguisher
- Blanket and extra clothing
- Shovel and other useful tools
- Infant and small children's needs
- Household liquid bleach to purify drinking water (16 drops in 1 gallon of water, stir, and let sit for 30 minutes)
- Manual can opener

I encourage you to go to http://www.redcross.org/prepare/

location/home-family and go through the interactive Be Red Cross Ready Module. You can generate a customized list of needs based on the size of your family. It took me 15 minutes to go through the preparedness portion. You can also get a nice list from http://www.ready.gov/basic-disaster-supplies-kit. Different sites estimate the window before help arrives between three days and one week, so decide how much you will need for your family.

You might say, "We'll just go to a hotel", "The town has a plan", or "I'll just run to the store and stock up!" Sadly, I have lived through two large regional earthquakes, tornadoes, many blizzards, and severe windstorms. Many times gas pumps don't work, store shelves are empty, water is contaminated, and municipalities are overwhelmed making sure school kids are safe, nursing homes are habitable, and hospitals are still open for business. Officials will want to help but will simply be too overwhelmed to offer assistance for at least three days if not longer.

General Government: Authorized the mayor to sign the Inter-Jurisdictional Housing Interlocal Agreement. Approved Resolution #13-367, participating in dispute resolution pursuant to Snohomish County's planning policy JB-2. Approved Resolution #13-368, surplus property. Approved Resolution #13-369, authorizing the Town of Woodway to participate in the joint self-insured health and welfare benefit program to be administered by the Association of Washington Cities. Authorized the mayor to sign the 2014 legal services contract with Ogden Murphy Wallace. Reviewed the 2014 preliminary budget. Approved Resolution #13-370, increasing property taxes by 1%.
